

Seventh: To see if the town will vote to publish a History of Hanover, manuscript for which was nearly completed by Professor John K. Lord prior to his death, and to take any action with reference thereto.

Eighth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

ABSTRACTS FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, held pursuant to warrant, on Tuesday the 9th day of March, 1926, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, at the Nugget Theater in said town, the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, the Moderator. After the reading of the warrant under which the meeting was called proceeded to the election of town officers and other business as follows:

Under the Fourth Article of the warrant it was *Voted*:

That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll Taxes provided by law, the Town raise the sum of Twenty-four thousand two hundred (\$24,200) dollars and appropriate said sum and all other moneys, which may be paid into the Treasury and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended, in accordance with the budget and report as presented by the Selectmen.

Voted .

That authority is hereby granted the Selectmen to borrow on notes issued for not over one year, an amount not to exceed twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars in addition to what shall be raised otherwise.

Voted:

To pass over the Fifth article in the warrant.

Under the sixth article of the warrant it was voted:

To price and appropriate the sum of two hundred or

To raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for the benefit of the Etna Fire Association.

Under the seventh article in the warrant the following motion was introduced:

"That the Town of Hanover, N. H., in conjunction with the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., build and equip a Municipal Building at a total cost not to exceed sixty thousand (\$60,000.00) dollars, said building to be along the general lines indicated by the architect's drawings as exhibited at this meeting by the Committee on Municipal Building and to be located upon the present Precinct property at the corner of Main Street and Allen Lane."

Upon the foregoing motion discussion ensued participated in by Perley R. Bugbee, Frank A. Musgrove, Professor J. P. Richardson, H. D. Foster, F. E. Austin and others.

A vive voice vote was taken upon the motion but the Moderator was unable to decide and called for rising vote which resulted as follows:

In favor of the motion, 65 votes.

Against the motion, 116 votes and the motion was declared lost.

Upon motion:

Foted:

That the Selectmen be authorized and requested to join with the Precinct Commissioners in providing for an investigation and report concerning (1) The needs of the Town and Precinct for major objects of new construction and equipment over the next several years. (2) Estimates of the cost of such objects of outlay. (3) Ways and means of financing such outlay, and that for the expenses of such investigation and report the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00.

Upon motion of Prof. L. B. Richardson:

That the Selectmen be requested to confer, before final settlement of their budget, with the officers of such other divisions of the Town as adopt in their annual meeting a resolution similar to this. The purpose of this conference shall be the discussion of the recommended appropriations as a whole, the proper correlation of the recommendations of the officers of each division with those of the others.

That the Selectmen be requested to take the initiative in calling this meeting.

That a summary of the recommendations of each of the groups of officers participating in this conference, arrived at after consideration of the information there obtained, be published in a separate section of the Town report. This section shall contain the total of the budget and other recommendations of each participating division, with an estimate of its effect upon the tax rate, and a summary giv-

ing the combined effect of all the estimates and the resulting total tax rate within each of the divisions of the Town. As a basis of comparison, similar figures for the previous year shall also be included in this section of the report.

That until action to the contrary be taken, the procedure thus outlined be considered as the established policy of the Town.

Upon Motion:

Voted:

That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the Town Library in addition to the amount specified in the budget.

Voted to pass over the eighth and ninth articles in the warrant.

Upon motion

Voted:

That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the treasury.

Upon motion:

Foted:

That the Town discontinue that portion of the highway leading from the four corners known as the Mason four corners, (meaning the first four corners northerly from the reservoir on the road leading northerly between the reservoirs) to the buildings on the Pinneo farm so called, or such portion of said road as in the judgment of the Selectmen is expedient.

Voted:

That the Selectmen either directly or through a Committee appointed by them, investigate the question of the desirability of establishing a town forest and report to the next town meeting.

Voted:

That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of five per cent be allowed the taxpayer if paid on or before July 15, 1926, and a discount of three per cent if paid on or before September 15, 1926.

The following communication from Prof. W. A. Adams was handed in and read to the meeting by the Moderator:

To Town and Precinct officers of the Town of Hanover.

Dear Sirs:

It is my personal opinion that a college town like Hanover. (older, I believe, than our National Government), ought to have an adequate Town Hall building. I have lived here since the fall of 1899, and this opinion then is based upon some observation.

My reasons are those of every thoughtful citizen; I mention a few of them.

In order that Hanover may the sooner realize its bes self, higher possibility.

Religion is unusually well housed in its three churches.

Education (perhaps our chief avenue to usefulness in the world) is on the whole wonderfully well housed, both in College and Schools.

Nature aided by Mr. Tuck and others has certainly done nobly.

Public betterment has certainly made a fine beginning and is constantly growing. But on the side of housing our local government we lag behind lamentably.

If we could only house appropriately this very important set of interests we might, in my opinion, deem ourselves on the road to small town distinction. To national affairs we have given Webster, Choate and Salmon P. Chase; President Tucker and President Hopkins also (in no small degree); is it not high time then for us to develop our lagging housing place for local government. We have good citizenry, many excellent town officers etc., etc. Hasn't the time now finally come to house this important side of our town activity? I for one think so.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, on Wednesday, the 29th day of September, 1926 at seven forty-five o'clock in the evening the following subjects were acted upon:

The first article in the warrant was to see what action the town will take regarding needed repairs on Ledyard Bridge. The Municipal Finance Committee made a lengthy report upon the condition of the bridge and moved:

That the town approve the repairing and improving of Ledyard Bridge by the installation of wood arches, strengthened abutments and pier, the addition of a sidewalk on the north side of the present structure, the strengthening of the floor system and other changes incidental to the foregoing, substantially in accordance with the advice of Mr. J. P. Snow, engineer, and the recommendation of the Municipal Finance Committee, and that the Selectmen be authorized and instructed to take such steps as may be necessary for carrying out this work.

A vote was taken upon the foregoing motion and it was by the Moderator, declared in the affirmative.

Upon the second article in the warrant which was: "To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the highway leading northerly from the buildings on what is known as the William Wardrobe farm near Hanover Center, to the highway passing by the buildings owned or occupied by Roy Rennie near the Hanover and Lyme town line." Discussion ensued

A vote being taken upon the question it was decided in the negative.

Voted:

"That the Moderator appoint a committee to prepare resolutions in regard to the death of Dr. W. J. Tucker, that a copy be sent to Mrs. Tucker and a like copy filed with the Town Clerk of Hanover."

The Moderator appointed the Selectmen as the Committee.

Voted to adjourn.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN OF HANOVER

The Selectmen of the Town of Hanover herewith present their annual report.

In accordance with the programme outlined at the last town meeting construction was started on the Trunk Line at the point near the foot of County Hill where the construction of the previous year terminated. Since this work was to be done under Federal Aid it was necessary to keep a less grade than could be done on the present location of the highway without incurring too great an expense. Accordingly the road for about 1,900 feet southerly from the top of the hill was relocated somewhat to the north and on the side of the hill. This will make the maximum grade not over 8 per cent and will remove one of the hardest grades from Hanover to the White Mountains.

The section under construction will extend to the school-house and will leave about 1.17 miles which will need to be rebuilt soon in order to complete the reconstruction to the Hanover-Lyme town line.

Due to the delay in obtaining Federal approval for the project, construction was not started until September so that the work will have to be completed during the present year. From one aspect this was favorable since thereby it was possible to finance the extensive repairs which became imperative at Ledyard Bridge and which are of the nature of new construction.

The repairs to Ledyard Bridge have been made in accordance with the recommendations of the Committee appointed by the Selectmen following the vote at the last annual town meeting and the vote of the special town meeting. The work included the construction of four timber arches and the installation of so much new material in the floor system that it is practically new construction. The work which is

nearly completed will make the bridge safe for the loads specified by the State for new bridges. In addition, a side-walk has been placed on the northerly side of the bridge to make passage of the bridge safe and comfortable for pedestrians. It is believed that the renovated bridge will serve traffic for from fifteen to twenty-five or more years.

The State Aid road in Etna, including a concrete bridge over Mink Brook near Mr. Will Paine's house was finished early in the year and makes it possible to travel in comfort at any season of the year from Etna to the Hanover-Lebanon State Aid road at Cutting's Corner.

A new steel I-Beam bridge has been erected to replace a weakened wooden bridge on the Ruddsboro Road near Mr Frank Emerson's house. The policy of widening roads and ditches and removing boulders and ledges has been continued. The tractor and snow plow are proving effective in plowing roads and more demands are made each year for such work.

The experimental wooden snow fence which has been used for two winters on the Trunk Line near Mr. W. W. Cumming's house has proved so effective in preventing drifts that the Selectmen have placed an item of \$200 in the budget for purchasing picket fencing which will cost less than the wooden fencing. If this fencing proves satisfactory it is planned to purchase more fencing each year.

While the Selectmen were authorized to borrow \$20,000 on temporary notes only \$2,000 had been issued on January 31, 1927, and but \$156.72 had been paid for interest during the year.

In accordance with the vote at the last town meeting the Selectmen met with the other governmental groups to consider the needs of each group in preparing their budgets. A consolidated statement of the proposed budget and the effect on taxation is shown on page 21.

TRUSTEES' REPORT ON TOWN LIBRARY

The Trustees feel called upon again to raise the question,—how much interest are our fellow townsmen taking in their library?—Let no one forget that the allowance receivable from State funds was fixed, about two years ago, at \$184., and the income from funds in charge of the town trustee is shown in this year's report as \$25.50, total \$209.50. If that were all we might as well close the building,—for a glance at our report shows that the running expenses (omitting payment of last year's note) was about \$195.00. At last town meeting the meager \$209.50 was supplemented by an extra voted sum of \$75.00, giving us a total of \$325., plus interest from trust funds.

The estimate for the ensuing year, submitted herewith, includes insurance, bills now due and running expenses,—leaving only \$140. for new books, periodicals and rebinding. Surely this is a very small sum to meet the demands,—throughout an entire year,—which are constantly made for the best of the new publications.—We have been obliged to deny ourselves the purchase of some which would have been valuable additions to the library.

It may be said that there is abundance of literature of the highest class in the library, and that some of it is too much neglected. Be that as it may, the trustees are not responsible for the preferences of the readers, and we respectfully submit that an allowance of \$200. over and above funds allowed by law and the investments, is a modest request made in the interest of all concerned.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN

1926

During the year 1926 fifteen permits for burning were issued. Another year has passed and we had no forest fires for which every one is thankful. We hope the habit of procuring a permit to burn will increase. Every one so doing and complying with the law saves himself costs by taxation. Every forest fire in the state we all help pay for. It's up to you to be careful. Your attention is called to the following:

SECT. 12. No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission first hand from the owner thereof or from the owner's agent.

SECT. 13. No person shall kindle a fire or burn brush in or near woodland, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the forest fire warden, or the presence of the forest fire warden or person appointed to represent him.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TOWN FOREST

The committee on town forest, appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with the vote at the last annual town meeting, have corresponded with the state authorities interested in forestry and with Philip W. Ayres, Forester of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests.

The general plan of having town forests in order to secure for the future adequate timber supply is sound. Two considerations however make it seem at present not feasible to recommend an appropriation for this purpose. First, the demands upon the financial resources of the community are already large and likely to become larger. Second, already some provision for tree planting has been made by the Pine Park in the village and by the Water Company near the reservoir. The objection as to financial burden should disappear in time; and moreover the ultimate result of a town forest should be of financial advantage to the town. The Pine Park and Reservoir reservations are largely for beauty and watershed protection and not likely to yield any large timber production.

There remains therefore the desirability of providing at some time and in some way for a town forest for timber production for the future.

Your committee therefore makes these suggestions:

First, we recommend that the Selectmen take any opportunity to make it known that they in behalf of the town would welcome gifts to the town of land for timber production. The expense for planting land with young trees is slight, through arrangements which can be made with the state forestry agencies, and the expense would be far more than met in the future by the value of the timber.

Second, we recommend that the selectmen and any others interested take opportunity as it presents itself for bringing

to the attention of owners of land the desirability of planning along long lines for the future in matter of need of timber, and thus gradually helping to develop in the town the planting and growing of timber on private lands for the ultimate benefit of the community and the Commonwealth.

Your committee desires to promote the first suggestion by proposing the following motion to the town:

Voted, upon the suggestion of the Committee on Town Forest, that the Selectmen be requested to take any feasible measures to bring to the attention of land owners the desirability of gifts of land to the town for a town forest.





STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Village Precinct in the town of Hanover, in the county of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Precinct affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre, in said Village, on Thursday the tenth day of March, 1927, at 8:30 P. M., o'clock, to vote on the following subjects:

First: To choose by ballot a moderator to preside over said meeting.

Second: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for the term of one year.

Third: To hear the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer, and Auditor and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To choose by ballot a Treasurer and Auditor each to serve for the term of one year and one Precinct Commissioner to serve for three years.

Fifth: To raise such sums of money as shall be necessary to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the current year, including a Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department, Street Lighting Department, and all other necessary departments, and to pay outstanding notes.

Sixth: To see if the Precinct will vote to build any so called permanent highway and raise and appropriate the money therefore.

Seventh: To see if the Precinct will purchase all or any part of 100 shares of capital stock of the Hanover Water Works Company, being the balance of the Precinct's proportion of the new stock in the Water Company issued in 1924, and to take any action in connection therewith.

Eighth: To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

Hanover, N. H. March 26, 1926.

A meeting of the legal voters of the Village Precinct of Hanover was called to order by Frank A. Musgrove at seven thirty (7.30) o'clock P. M.

The warrant was read by the clerk:

- Article 1. Frank A. Musgrove was elected moderator for one year.
- Article 2. Ira W. Leavitt was elected clerk for one year.
- Article 3. Voted to accept and place on file the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer and Auditor as printed in the annual report for the year 1926.
- Article 4. Alfred W. Guyer was elected Treasurer for one year. Robert W. Elsasser was elected Auditor for one year. Arthur P. Fairfield was elected Precinct Commissioner for three years.
- Article 5. Voted that the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., raise and appropriate the sum of seventeen thousand three hundred and ninety-five dollars (\$17,395.00) to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the current year according to the items set forth in the budget.
- Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to defray any expenses of decorating the graves of soldiers and sailors who have served in the army or navy of the United States in time of war, the same to be given to and expended by any committee appointed by the American Legion for this purpose.
- Article 7. The motion, that the Village Precinct of Hanover raise and appropriate the sum of forty-five hun-

dred dollars (\$4,500.00) and that a further sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) be borrowed on a note for one year or such part thereof as may be necessary for the permanent improvement of South Park Street was not carried.

Article 8. Voted that the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., hereby authorizes the Precinct Commissioners to purchase or lease land and the right of way thereto for the purpose of disposing of waste materials, and further authorizes the Precinct Commissioners to erect an incinerator or other structure for the treatment or destruction of such waste material, and further authorizes the Precinct Commissioners to borrow money on the notes of the Village Precinct for carrying out the provisions of this vote.

Article 9. Voted to pass over this article of the warrant.

Article 10. Voted to pass over article ten of the warrant.

Article 11. Voted that the Precinct Commissioners be and hereby are authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the Village Precinct before taxes are raised, collected and paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Village Precinct.

Voted that upon all taxes on personal property and upon real estate, paid on or before the 15th day of July, 1926, a discount of five percent be allowed the tax payer and that upon all taxes on personal property and real estate, paid on or before the 15th day of September, 1926, a discount of three percent be allowed the tax payer.

Voted that the Precinct Commissioners be requested to confer before final settlement of their budget with the officers of such other divisions of the town as adopted in their annual meetings a resolution similar to this. The purpose of this conference shall be the discussion of the recom-

mended appropriations as a whole, and the proper correlation of the recommendations of the officers of each division with those of the others. That a summary of the recommendations of each of the groups of officers participating in this conference arrived at, after consideration of the information there obtained, be published in a separate section of the town report. This section shall contain the total of the budget and other recommendations of each participating division, with an estimate of its effect upon the tax rate, and a summary giving the combined effect of all the estimates and the resulting total tax rate within each division of the town. As a basis of comparison similar figures for previous years shall also be included in this section of the report. That until action to the contrary be taken the procedure thus outlined be considered as an established policy of the Precinct.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 8.45 o'clock P. M.

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department consists of a Volunteer Company of twenty-five men with apparatus as follows:

One three ton International truck equipped with fifteen hundred feet of good rubber lined hose, a forty gallon chemical tank, and all other fixtures of a modern fire fighting weapon, including a motor driven pump.

One double tank Ford Chemical also well equipped to do quick and good work where a fire does not have to have water poured upon it.

One hose truck with a thousand feet of serviceable hose. One hook and ladder truck with one fifty foot extension ladder and two thirty-five foot ladders.

The fire alarm system has been thoroughly overhauled during the year and new insulated wires strung all over town and twelve new alarm boxes have been added. A new storage battery has been installed at the fire house with automatic electric charging device of the very latest design.

It is proposed to add another larger Fire Truck sometime during the ensuing year, but at the present time all equipment is in the best and most satisfactory condition that it has ever been.

HANOVER TOWN SCHOOL MEETING

March 13, 1926

At a meeting of voters qualified to vote in district affairs the following actions were taken:

- 1. Harley H. Camp elected Moderator for one year.
- 2. Flora H. Camp, Clerk for one year; Frank G. Emerson, Treasurer; Harvey N. Camp, Auditor, all for one year.
- 3. Nathaniel A. Emerson was chosen for Board of Education for three years.
- 4. Reports of Agents, Auditors and other committees to be accepted as printed in the reports.
- 5. Moved and seconded to raise the sum of \$3,726.47 asked, for the support of elementary schools.
- 6. Voted to raise \$3,988.03 as asked for in the budget to carry on school work for the coming year.
 - 7. Voted to pass over Article 7.
- 8. The following motion by Charles Haskins was passed: To rescind the vote of April 15, 1922 to mail reports seven days before meeting.

A motion by Lena Ferson to have a report of each meeting printed in the Town Report was carried.

A motion was made and after discussion was carried to have the school buildings in Town District insured.

Voted to put lightning rods on North Neighborhood school house; also Pinneo District, so-called.

Voted that the Board of Education be requested to set the date of the annual meeting of the Town School District on the same day as that of the annual Town meeting. After discussion an estimate of \$110 was made for the rodding of the two aforesaid school buildings. Therefore the motion was made and carried to raise the sum of \$300 the part of such sum as may seem fit to use for rodding the two school buildings afore mentioned, and insuring school buildings in School District.

Moved that the Board of Education of the Hanover Town School District be requested to confer, before final settlement of their budget, with the officers of such other divisions of the Town as adopted in their annual meeting a resolution similar to this:

"The purpose of this conference shall be the discussion of the recommended appropriations as a whole, and the proper correlation of the recommendations of the officers of each division with those of the others.

"That a summary of the recommendations of each of the groups of officers participating in this conference, arrived at after consideration of the information there obtained be published in a separate section of the Town Report. This section shall contain the total of the budget and other recommendations of each participating division, with an estimate of its effect upon the tax rate, and a summary giving the combined effect of all the estimates and the resulting total tax rate within each division of the town. As a basis of comparison, similar figures for previous years shall also be included in this section of the report."

That, until action to the contrary be taken, the procedure thus outlined be considered as an established policy of the Hanover Town School District.

This motion was carried.

Motion was made and carried to adjourn.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Hanover Town School District:

I submit herewith my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

The year closed in June with the graduation of an unusually large class from the Eighth grade, nearly all of whom entered high school in September.

Teachers

Miss Mildred Hill, a graduate of Plymouth Normal, and a teacher of considerable experience, succeeded Miss Forbes at the Center, and Mrs. Low, now Mrs. Ferson, was transferred from the Arvin to the North Neighborhood, the Arvin school being closed for the year on account of the fewness of pupils. These constitute all the changes in the teaching force for the year. This fact of so few changes has contributed much toward the wellbeing of the schools. The more stable the teaching force becomes, the more regular and methodical the work becomes.

Buildings

Several of the buildings are in need of considerable repairs. It is in the interest of economy to keep the buildings in good condition, but it is still more important to render them in every way fit to promote the health and comfort of the children. The seating, the lighting, the ventilation, and the sanitary conditions are of prime importance, and should receive very careful attention. No expense within reason should be spared in the effort to render the buildings reasonably correct in these particulars. Much may

be done to improve the situation in these matters at several of the schools.

Health Supervision

The work in health supervision is exceedingly important, and we have been fortunate in having much good work done with little expense to the district. The arrangement whereby the community nurse provided by the Red Cross acted also as school nurse is no longer in effect. The services of the present Hanover school nurse, who has assisted Dr. French in his work in the schools in the Town district, have been entirely gratuitous. Her salary is paid in full by the Special school district. The three districts of this supervisory union should unite to employ a nurse to do the work of the entire union, and Hanover Special district would be glad to co-operate with Lyme and Hanover Town district in making this arrangement. I would earnestly recommend that this be done.

Attendance

In another place will be found a summary of the attendance for the year ending June, 1926, and certain comments are there made.

It wish to call further attention to two facts, first, the unnecessary amount of tardiness, and, second, the relatively low percentage of attendance. The tardiness is almost wholly inexcusable, and ought never to occur. The absences are largely due to sickness, but a very considerable number are entirely inexcusable. This irregularity of attendance interferes seriously with the work of the schools, and our standard of accomplishment has suffered much because of it.

I hope we may have the full co-orperation of the homes in the matter of improving the attendance record of the schools.

State Aid

We have been receiving from the state more than \$5000 a year as state aid. This has paid considerably more than half of the cost of our elementary schools. We are now facing the probable loss of this aid. The law provides that in a town having two or more districts, neither shall receive any state aid if a \$5 tax on a thousand of the equalized valuation of the whole town would pay the necessary expenses for all elementary schools of the town. This point is practically reached, and the State Department is looking into the matter. In fact the amount of state aid that will be received the coming year will be about half the amount estimated in the budget, and probably none at all thereafter. There is only one way to escape a very greatly increased school tax, and that is by combining the two districts of the town, and thus jointly supporting the schools of the entire town. I would suggest the advisability of taking steps at once to do this. The best procedure would be for the Town District to vote to petition the State Board to unite the districts.

I would suggest, therefore, an article be put in the warrant relative to the matter. This, at least, will give an opportunity to discuss the question.

Finances

The fiscal year closed June 30 with a relatively small balance on hand. Two items of expense have materially increased, namely the transportation of pupils, and the high school tuition. As a result, the present year will close with a very little, if any, balance.

If we lose the state aid, and the districts are not united, it will become necessary to raise much more than we have been raising, causing a very serious tax burden. This should probably be avoided.

Conclusion

The work of the schools during the present year is going along very satisfactorily. There has been some interruption on account of sickness, particularly at Etna. The teachers are without exception doing good work, and the pupils are responding in good spirits. The year's work should be excellently done.

I would suggest that parents and friends visit the schools often. Your interest manifested in this way will inspire both the teacher and the pupils.
