

ABSTRACT FROM THE TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, March 8, 1938 the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, Moderator.

The Town Warrant was read by the clerk.

The Town Report was accepted as printed.

Elections:

For three years:

Horace E. Hurlbutt, Selectman.
L. Morse Merritt, Library Trustee.

James Spencer, William H. Hart, and Daniel O. Hoyt, Fence Viewers.

William H. Hart, Andrew B. Elder, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

Voted: That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll taxes provided by law, the sum of twenty-four thousand four hundred ninety dollars (\$24,490.00) be raised and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the treasury, and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended, according to the budget, and report, as printed by the Selectmen.

Motion made and seconded that the Town of Hanover adopt the so-called Australian System for the election of town officers. Proceeded to ballot using the check list. Total number of votes cast, one hundred

eighty-nine (189). Sixty-seven (67) being cast in the affirmative and one hundred twenty-two (122) in the negative.

Voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property paid within 15 days after the date of the tax bills or on or before July 15, 1938, whichever is the later date, a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayers; and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the treasury.

Voted: That three per cent discount allowed by the Selectmen on real and personal property taxes paid before the 15th of September for the year 1937 be approved.

For Delegates to the Constitutional Convention.

Alfred W. Guyer had 124 votes. Malcolm Keir had 124 votes. Charles A. Holden had 110 votes.

SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT HANOVER FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee was established in 1932 by concurrent action of the Town, Precinct, and School District "to provide an organization to secure a more unified financial program for the three Hanover municipal units." The Committee is now made up as follows:

In 1938 the second term of James P. Richardson expired. The appointing moderators have established the precedent of not appointing any member of the Committee for more than two consecutive terms. Professor Richardson had served the people of Hanover as Chairman of the Finance Committee faithfully and well from the time the committee was organized. A real debt of gratitude is due him. The Committee records its sincere regret that his term has expired.

RESULTS FOR THE YEAR 1938-39

The hurricane of September 20 required substantial additional expenditures on the part of both the Town and Precinct. A portion of this cost was provided from Federal funds through WPA. The figures given in the Town and Precinct reports do not include any portion of such Federal expenditure.

As a result of these hurricane expenditures the Town expenditures exceeded the budget but the excess was covered by receipts in excess of the estimates and the books of the Town were finally closed with a balance on hand of \$1,141.24. The entire amount due the schools was paid, thereby eliminating the confusion which has sometimes existed in a full understanding of Town finances. This leaves funds in the hands

of the School Board to complete the payments to the close of the school fiscal year June 30.

The Precinct Commissioners exceeded their budget only slightly and such excess is largely represented in the item of accounts due from others. The accounts show temporary borrowings of \$600 not paid during the year and the amount is included among the items to be paid in the coming year.

It is expected that when the school year ends the School Board will carry over a small balance in addition to making an expenditure for equipment of \$450 not included in the budget approved last year but recently approved by this Committee.

The total payments on indebtedness during the year for the three units, including the payment of the balance due the schools aggregated \$24,950 with new indebtedness incurred during the year amounting to \$600. In figuring net reduction of debt, allowance should be made for \$3,035 reduction in the balances carried forward from the previous year.

The following Consolidated Statement for the year 1938-9 represents an attempt to show the results of operating each of the three units after eliminating current loans from both sides of the accounts and eliminating offsetting items of work done for other parties. These totals can be compared with the budgets adopted last year. The school figures, being for the year ending June 30, 1939, are the budget figures for the year, adjusted for known changes. The last column gives totals after adjusting for transactions between the units, that is what the figures would show if the three municipal units were operated as one whole.

The Committee has reviewed the estimates for the year 1939-40 with representatives of the Selectmen, the Precinct Commissioners and the School Board and has suggested various changes in the estimates as originally presented which changes have been accepted by the different boards. The revised budgets are reported by the three units and have been approved by this Committee.

ESTIMATES FOR 1939-40

No major changes are involved. There is an increase in amounts to be raised for schools in accordance with the explanation given in previous reports. The amount received from the sale of the Allen Street property which has been applied in the reduction of indebtedness over the past two years is now exhausted and the payment of bonds continues at the same rate as heretofore. Some increase in income has made it possible to avoid increasing taxes by the full amount represented in this item. The total expenses of operating the schools, although providing for some increases in certain items has been held at substantially the same figure as last year.

The Precinct tax calls for the same amount as last year. It does not include provision for any sidewalk construction during the year but permits the Commissioners' making a start on the resurfacing of Main Street. One of the tractors for plowing the sidewalks requires replacement and an item is included for that.

Allowance is made for increase in both the State and County taxes. While these have not yet been fixed, the increased proportion of the total to be assessed against the Town of Hanover according to the State Tax Commissioners' figures will result in a higher cost to the Town if the State and County taxes remain the same. If the Legislature should

reduce the State Tax, as has been proposed, some reduction might be anticipated in that item. The budget as presented includes an item of \$550 for the net cost of replacement of a pickup truck and provides \$3500 for a continuation during the year 1939-40 of the special provision made in the previous year for reconstruction of Town roads.

The following Consolidated Budget for 1939-40 brings into one tabulation a summary of the figures of the three units with a total excluding transactions between the units.

TAX RATES

The Precinct tax rate remains the same at 56c. The tax rate for the schools figures 4c more than last year, \$1.51 per \$100 as against \$1.47. The Town tax rate is figured at a reduction of 2c, \$1.07 as against \$1.09. If the taxes are voted in accordance with the recommendations, the total tax rate would figure \$3.14 within the Precinct and \$2.58 in the Town outside the Precinct, a net of 2c more than the actual assessment of last year. The new rates would be the same as the estimates of last year, the variation between the budgets and the assessment being due to a small reduction in the County tax from the estimate and in the ruling received from the State Tax Commission that the item of sinking fund for the future purchase of equipment was not a proper budget item.

SPECIAL ITEMS

The Committee has discussed with the representative of a group desiring the Precinct to assume responsibility for garbage collection some of the problems involved in any such proposal. The Committee believes that the present arrangement is fair and reasonable and that at any time when the responsibility for this may be undertaken by the Precinct there will be involved also the question of rubbish collection and that in all probability any solution will require some form of disposal plant. This should call for a careful study before final action is taken. The Committee suggested to the petitioners the possibility of the appointment at the Precinct meeting of a special committee to study the whole matter and make a report at the next meeting of the Precinct. If such a program were to be followed the Finance Committee would appreciate instruction being given the special committee to file

a report with the Finance Committee not later than February 1 in order that whatever recommendation the committee might make could be given consideration in connection with the study of the budgets for the succeeding year.

A request has been received for expenditures on a Moose Mountain road which has been subject to gates and bars and now desired to serve Moose Mountain Lodge erected by Julian B. and Parke Leslie. The Committee favors the Town expending up to \$1,000 in putting this road into condition on the understanding that the road will continue to be subject to gates and bars and that the Leslies shall agree to take care of the maintenance, the expenditure to be made from the \$3500 budget item for road reconstruction.

GENERAL

In earlier years the Committee held public hearings on the budget. None has been held this year. If at any time any demand for such hearing should develop, the Committee will be glad to resume the practice of holding such.

This year, the Committee has welcomed the opportunity of discussing particular projects with persons interested therein and will be glad to continue this practice whenever there is any occasion for it. The Committee will also welcome the receipt of suggestions at any time from any of the interested citizens of Hanover.

From time to time suggestions have been made as to the desirability of making provision for an executive assistant to the Selectmen and the Precinct Commissioners. The Finance Committee understands that these two Boards are contemplating the possibility of providing additional assistance for the Town Clerk to make it possible for him to devote more of his efforts to Town and Precinct affairs in his present capacity as an assistant to these Boards. The Committee believe that such a program can be worked out without immediately increasing the budget appropriation over that now provided and at modest extra cost in the future.

The Committee also understands that a program is being worked out to pay an annual salary to the Judge of the Municipal Court with an arrangement under which fees collected will be turned into the municipal treasuries in the same general way which has worked satisfactorily with other municipal officers in recent years. The net result will involve no additional cost.

As pointed out in previous reports the indebtedness incurred for the new High School building and for Ledyard Bridge brought the total debt of Hanover to a very high figure. Special legislation was required to go beyond the normal debt limit. At the time, and since, it has been advocated that new undertakings which would involve substantial borrowing should be deferred until the debt had been materially reduced. It will not be reduced to \$100,000 until 1944. Any other policy than that outlined would involve a rate of taxation greater than Hanover has experienced.

HANOVER TOWN LIBRARY—1939 REPORT

The library has been open on one hundred library days during the past year. There has been an encouraging increase in the general circulation. The average for a single library days was an output of thirty-eight books. On one day there were more than one hundred books loaned. A total of three thousand five hundred and thirty-two books were borrowed. This number includes the adult and juvenile books circulated. Apparently, folks read more for recreation than education, as fiction continues to be in more demand. A selection of the better and more popular non-fiction books have been purchased. The reading public will be glad to know that books on any subject, which are not in our library, are procurable through the State Library and Public Library Commission at Concord. Miss Spencer is always glad to get your requests for this special service. More than one hundred books have been received and circulated through these two agencies during the past year.

Some books have been given to the library. The trustees take this opportunity to say "Thank you" to those who have contributed.

Our magazine subscription list has been changed some. "World Horizons" has not been renewed, as it has failed to be in demand. "Newsweek" has been substituted for "Time." Some issues of "Time" were very objectionable, because of the extensive liquor advertising.

Miss Spencer attended the annual Fall meeting of the District Librarians held at Enfield in October. Miss Pratt from the Public Library Commission has visited our library. Her suggestions and help are always appreciated.

The assistant librarian has been working with Miss Spencer in continuing with the work of re-numbering, classifying and cataloging the books. This is somewhat of a task, but will make a very fine improvement in our library in every way.

The trustees have requested the Finance Committee to include a sum of money in the annual budget as a special appropriation for the purchase of a new stove. This new heater is badly needed. This is the first time since the library was built in 1905 that the town has been asked to spend money for heating equipment. The one in use was given by interested friends and was second hand at that time.

The regular work of varnishing the floors and cleaning has been

done, which keeps the interior of our building looking well.

The library and librarian are here to serve you and help you. It is your privilege to take advantage of this service.

Library hours: Wednesdays and Saturdays, 2-5 P.M. except on holidays. Wednesday evenings, 7-8:30 o'clock.

Report of Secretary

1939

The Etna Fire Association has responded to nineteen calls in the year 1938. There were thirteen chimney fires; one waste paper basket; one stove pipe; one grass and forest fire; one set of farm buildings; one gas pump explosion and fire, and also one re-call to wet down ruins.

The John Elder Farm buildings at Hanover Center were destroyed, only the tool shed being saved.

The Fire Association has used the following equipment fighting fires during the past year.

600 feet of three-quarter inch hose.

1700 feet of inch and a half hose.

400 feet of ladders

251 gallons of chemicals

There were twelve times when it was necessary for only one truck to respond; seven times the two trucks responded to calls.

The Association has held meetings at stated intervals. There has been a noticeable increase in the general up-keep. A carefully prepared statement and budget has recently been sent to the Finance Committee.

This coming season the Fire Hazard will be most critical. All can help the situation and assure the safety of life and property by being Fire Prevention minded, using extreme precaution with the use of matches, cigarettes and all inflammable material.

Do Not Burn Brush without a permit and read carefully the following synopsis of the Forest Fire Law.

Synopsis of Forest Fire Permit Law (Chapter 191, Public Laws)

No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission from the owner, agent or caretaker thereof.

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut over lands or where the fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required, and also any person, by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay to the owner all damages done by such fire.

When permission has been obtained from the land owner, camp or cooking fires may be kindled without permission of the Forest Fire Warden (unless such permission is required by city or town), at suitable times and in suitable places where they will not endanger woodlands.

Upon failure to totally extinguish such fires the parties responsible are subject to the same liabilities and penalties as are prescribed for other fires.

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200, or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire wilfully, or in a careless or imprudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year, or both.

Pursuant to a rather careful study of how the Community may be better protected from the hazards of fire, the Engineers strongly recommend the urgent need for more hydrants at various places in the precinct, as well as the addition of several more fire-alarm boxes.

Through the generosity of G. W. Rand & Son, the Department has acquired an ambulance which, with the help of donations by many citizens of Hanover, and by the services of members of the Department, has been created into an excellent First Aid Unit. Many members of the Hanover Volunteer Hose Company have taken the Red Cross course in First Aid and are prepared to serve the Community.

As a result of the hurricane of last September, a serious fire hazard has been created in the woodlands. In order to prevent serious fires in these districts, the public is requested to be very careful when using matches, building fires, or smoking in these areas. The engineers feel that two or three members of the Department should receive special training in the fighting of these fires, and that special equipment for such fires should be procured and kept at the station headquarters.

As was stated in the report of last year, new and improved equipment will be needed very soon.

The Hanover Volunteer Hose Company wishes to thank the citizens for their help and cooperation during the past year. This service was of particular value during the hurricane, and the subsequent period of rehabilitation.

It is the aim of the Engineers, and of the individual members of the Department, to see that the equipment is modern and adequate, and that its members are trained in their work, with the hope that the Community will be served by as loyal and as efficient an organization as those of the past.

REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

February 1, 1939

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.

The total number of contagious diseases reported during the past year was 130. Practically all of these cases occurred in the first half of the year. Two cases of scarlet fever occurred in the first half of the year and three in the past month. No other cases have appeared as contacts from these.

Milk licenses as usual were issued through the Town Clerk's Office. Fewer dairy inspections and milk sample examinations were made than in the past. The State this year appears to have been more active in dairy inspection in this section than it has regularly been in the past.

Nine nuisances were reported and all investigated.

The water examinations of Storrs Pond showed that the water was of a satisfactory quality at the time of taking samples.

Investigation as to the effectiveness of the washing of drinking glasses in public restaurants, the college and hospital has been in progress for some four months and will be continued.

REPORT OF PINE PARK MANAGER FOR THE PRECINCT OF HANOVER — FEBRUARY 15, 1939

To the Voters of the Precinct of Hanover:

The Pine Park consists of about 90 acres of woodland lying beyond and adjoining the property of the Hanover Country Club, notably along the ridge bordering the Connecticut River, and on the riverside flats below the ridge, and in the area of the Vale of Tempe. Still containing, despite the damage of the hurricane, some of the most beautiful pine trees in this part of the Country, and being easily accessible from the village for walks and excursions, it is one of the valuable possessions of the community. Part of the property was purchased by the subscription of several public-spirited citizens early in the present century; the remainder was a legacy of the late Mrs. Emily H. Hitchcock. Legal ownership is vested in a board of five trustees but the active management is carried on by two managers, one representing Dartmouth College and the other representing the Precinct of Hanover. The manager for Dartmouth College is Mr. Halsey C. Edgerton, the Treasurer of Dartmouth College.

The major problem with which the managers have been concerned during the past year has been that occasioned by the hurricane of September 21, 1938. The extent of the damage was very considerable and the need of immediate action pressing, both because of the fire hazard and because the fallen and damaged pine would deteriorate rapidly unless given attention this winter. The services of Mr. H. J. Sevigny of Lebanon, were promptly engaged and a portable saw mill installed on the Brookside Farm. As the problem was one common to the properties of Dartmouth College, the Hanover Country Club, and the Pine Park Association, the work of logging, transporting, sawing and stacking has been treated as a unit, and the costs will be allocated. The work has been financed by the College, and so far as Pine Park is concerned, assisted by the trustee's advancing the limited funds in their possession. Progress has been satisfactory and the work is now well advanced. It is hoped that the sawed timber will eventually be sold for a sum sufficient to yield more than the costs of the operation.

It should be noted that the operation now in progress is simply that of removing all timber that is down or injured that is worth sawing up. Much brush, stumps, and unusable timber will remain, presenting the

double problem of fire hazard and unsightliness. This situation must be given attention as soon as conditions permit. The managers have no money at their disposal for the purpose. The limited funds of the Pine Park Association will be completely tied up for some time to come pending the sale of the timber now being sawed and stored. The managers therefore contemplate an early appeal to the community for subscriptions to a fund to begin the work of cleaning up the Park, and it is hoped that the need and the worthiness of the objective will lead to a generous response. No estimate of the cost of the work is possible, but all the money we can obtain by this subscription will be applied to the purpose, and we hope that it will be sufficient to do at least the most immediately necessary clean-up work.

In closing I should like to express my appreciation for the services rendered by my associate, Mr. Edgerton, in the recent emergency. His immediate grasp of the problems involved, his successful efforts to obtain the assistance of the Trustees of the College in financing the lumbering operation, and his active supervision of the work as it progressed are appreciated by all the friends of Pine Park.

PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL MEETING

Hanover, New Hampshire March 15, 1938

The annual meeting of Hanover School District was called to order at seven and one-half o'clock in the evening at Grade School Hall in Hanover, New Hampshire, by the Moderator, William H. Murray. Articles of the Warrant which had been duly posted according to law, were read by the Clerk, Raymond B. Baird.

Article 1: On the motion of John P. Amsden, duly seconded, William H. Murray was unanimously elected Moderator for the ensuing year and was duly sworn before assuming office.

Article II: On the motion of Roscoe C. Nichols, duly seconded, Raymond B. Baird was unanimously elected Clerk for the ensuing year and was duly sworn before assuming office. On the motion of Horace E. Hurlbutt, duly seconded, Alfred W. Guyer was unanimously elected Treasurer for the ensuing year. On the motion of Albert W. Conner, duly seconded, Earle C. Gordon was unanimously elected Auditor for the ensuing year.

Article III: On the motion of Adna D. Storrs, duly seconded, Robert J. Putnam was re-elected a member of the Board of Education or the Hanover School District, for a term of three years. On the motion of Arthur B. Meservey, duly seconded, John B. Stearns was elected a member of the Board of Education for the Hanover School District for a term of three years. On the motion of Alfred W. Guyer, duly seconded, F. Manning Moody was re-elected a member of the Board of Education for the Hanover School District, for a term of three years.

Article IV: On the motion of Arthur H. Chivers, duly seconded, it was voted: That the Annual Report of Agents, Auditors, Committees or other officers hereto chosen be accepted as printed and placed on file.

Article V: On the motion of F. Manning Moody, duly seconded, it was voted: That Articles V and VI be considered together.

Articles V and VI: On the motion of F. Manning Moody, duly seconded, it was voted: That the District raise and appropriate in addi-

tion to the amount required by law, together with the unexpended balance and the receipts of the department including the balance on the sale of the old high school, \$59,086.75 for school purposes as follows: \$11,000.00 for the payment of bonds; \$210.00 for the salaries of the School Board and other officers of the District; and \$47,876.75 for general expenses and improvements as set forth in the budget.

Article VII: On the motion of Robert J. Putnam, duly seconded, it was voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property paid within 15 days after the date of the tax bills or on or before July 15, 1938, whichever is the later date, a discount of three percent be allowed the tax payers.

Voted: To adjourn.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hanover:

This report, written in accordance with your regulations and the statute requirements, covers a period of achievement in the work of the schools of Hanover which has hardly been paralleled in her entire history. It will go to make up a part of the report of the public schools by the school board and superintendent to the school district. It is the 85th in the series, the 24th by a superintendent of schools, and the 11th by the writer.

PURPOSE

Such times as these seem to demand that there be placed before a thoughtful people an account of some of the ways in which attempts have been made to solve the immediate educational problems. The beginning of the period under consideration at this time is marked by a re-alignment of the school districts of the town; that is to say, at a time when the Special District No. 1 and the town school districts were placed under the head of one central organization. The aim will not be to place all of this historical material in statistical form, but to give some slight accounting of methods used to meet the objectives that have been set up from time to time. The record will contain the usual financial and statistical material, together with some account of the activities of the current school year. An effort will be made to put into a somewhat more understandable form an account of several of the procedures adopted because of the changing conditions, and which are now in actual use in our schools.

PREVIEW

The preparation of this report presupposes a recognition of the many fine things that were done in the schools of an earlier period. There also have been recognized certain larger movements in society which have taken place within the past twenty years. Nearly every one appreciates that the world as a whole is still in the throes of a conflict. Many of us realize that the world has not fully recovered from the disastrous effects of the last Great Conflict, or strife to maintain ideals, and that there is still a conflict of ideas and ideals as to whether governments shall be totalitarian or democratic. So far as our country is concerned, this report is written during a period of an upward swing from

a depression which loosened the roots of all democratic institutions. Due attention has been given to the many criticisms and questionings which have been raised in regard to all of the public and private institutions of learning of our own country. These reflections seem to make it eminently fitting that this particular report should outline in considerable detail the practices and policies peculiar to the local school system, consisting of rural as well as village, and high as well as elementary schools.

OBSERVATIONS

- 1. No attempt has been made in this report to discuss in detail the current or proposed school financial situation, nor to bring forward positive recommendations for future developments. It is not at all improbable that in the near future consideration will need to be given to the question of whether or not an additional teacher should be provided for the Grade School. Should the classes continue to be large for any extended period of time, this will certainly be one of the next steps.
- 2. The writer is aware that some may regard this presentation of information as dogmatic. As in any line of endeavor that operates in the interest of young people, it is only too true that not every child in every life situation gains the objectives set up either by the home or the school or other agency, but it can be said without equivocation that substantial evidence is at hand which justifies the statements made concerning our schools. The limitations necessitated in such an accounting as this make the inclusion of many graphs and other concrete illustrations not only too costly but too extensive for easy assimilation.
- 3. The accompanying portrayal of aims does not place in array all of the ends discussed in educational writings nor many of those accomplished in both elementary and secondary schools here and elsewhere. No effort has been made to show specifically, for example, what has been done toward meeting all of the major objectives set up in the Seven Cardinal Principles of Education, although several of these principles are included among those here presented. It is recognized also that there may be honest differences of opinion as to the value of the objectives as stated and as to the methods of attempting to reach these objectives but, at any rate, goals have been determined upon in

advance of the actual organization of the educational program of the public schools of Hanover.

4. The method of presentation of this material has been changed for purposes of clarity and succinctness. If it shall have challenged the attention and thoughtful perusal by those concerned about what is being done in our Hanover public schools it will have served its purpose.

THE STAFF

OBJECTIVE

To provide for the schools a thoroughly professional staff of teachers and instructors. "The best teachers make the best schools."

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

- 1 A steadily increasing scholarship and training background has been one of the determining factors in selecting new teachers to take the place of those who have retired for any reason.
- 2 So far as it has been possible, teachers with experience or those who are three or four-year graduates from post-secondary schools with high recommendations for teaching and managing ability, as well as strength of personality, have been selected.
- 3 Attendance at summer school has been encouraged until nearly every teacher has attended one or more summer school sessions within the past six years.
- 4 Teachers' meetings have been held with large and small groups, at which have been discussed questions of best policies and best practices in carrying out the major objectives of the educational program.
- 5 A professional library has been gradually built up for the use of the teachers

in service. Each teacher is reading from one to five professional books during the school year, in addition to such work as he or she may do during the summer vacation.

SUBJECT BACKGROUND

OBJECTIVE

To make reasonably certain that improvement has been made by each pupil each year in the fundamental subjects of the curriculum, both in the high school and in the grades.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

- 1 The state program of studies has been adopted for use in the schools. It has been followed rather rigorously throughout all the schools. These courses have been revised and revitalized within the past ten years.
- 2 Diagnostic tests, aptitude tests, and achievement tests have been given with some regularity to ascertain difficulties confronting the pupils, to determine so far as may be possible in advance the likelihood of success in given fields, and to keep a fairly accurate estimate of whether or not the basic subjects are receiving correct emphasis and are enabling pupils to have a workable grasp of the fundamental processes.
- 3 Individual differences of the pupils have been taken into consideration, both in the assignment of work and in the evaluation of the work actually done. Special individual instruction has been provided in many instances. The Opportunity Room has made it possible for certain pupils, otherwise likely to become retarded, to be regarded as a part of, and to take their place in, the natural group to which they belong.

- 4 Reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling, and English have each been given such emphasis as the circumstances seemed to require. Emphasis upon these several subjects has varied from year to year, but progress has been consistent and it can be stated that, in general, the pupils in the Hanover schools, on the basis of comparative tests, score higher than the norm for the given grade in those tests.
- 5 Each classroom has been provided, so far as funds have been available, with a nucleus of books of reference and reading available as supplemental aids so that the pupils may acquire a wider knowledge of material and subjects adapted to their grade or subject, in both the high and elementary schools.
- 6 The High and Grade Schools in the village have, in addition to the above, through the aid of parents and citizens, established libraries for the general use of the pupils in these schools.

BASIC LEARNINGS

OBJECTIVE
To assist the pupils in acquiring as many as possible of the needed social attributes of a wholesome life. These attributes include such abstract ideas as: adaptability, honesty, perseverance, courteousness, responsibility, industrious-

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

1 One of the first efforts of the first grade teacher is to encourage the little folks to become acquainted with each other, to recognize the teacher as a friend and helper, and to adjust themselves to a group or school situation. This work continues through all the grades into high school. It emphasizes at all times the idea of adjustment and adaptability

ness, self-control, fair play, co-operation, team play, recognition of the rights of others, tolerance, forbearance, patience, human sympathy, thrift, safety, appreciation of the beautiful, good school citizenship and many others. These are considered as among the major objectives which teachers must have in mind in any part of the school program for which they are individually responsible.

- and the necessity for living together with a degree of happiness and comfort that has a bearing upon present and future life situations.
- 2 As the work progresses through the grades there is more and more thought given to developing the ideas of relationships which include courteousness, fair play, cooperation, and the like. Even though there is freedom in the work, particularly in the lower grades, these basic factors are at the forefront of the teachers' activities in leading the young people into better ways of living and behaving. By this process there is brought about a behavior control which works from within the individual rather than a control which is based upon the idea of teacher domination.
- 3 The plays and games of the Grade School, and the non-athletic as well as the athletic activities of the High School serve as abundant sources for lessons in united effort in recognition of others' rights, as well as in fair play and team play.
- 4 Elemental lessons of democracy are learned through group decisions in the grades, and through the various activities in the high school. Among these may be enumerated those of the Student Council, which aids the Headmaster in the mechanics of management of school activities generally and provides leadership for the pupil body. The orchestra, the musical clubs, the assemblies in both

buildings at the village, and the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, the Hi-Y Clubs and the 4-H Clubs provide other opportunities for the continuous teachings of many of the attributes set up as the objectives in these basic learnings of democratic control.

- 5 Constant thought is given to ways in which to promote the idea of safety. The School Boy Patrol, fire drills, dismissal of pupils, room activities such as mapping of street intersections are all a part of the program. The lower grades, particularly, have a reasonable amount of reading material for regular classroom work which is centered around this same idea. The High School emphasizes safety in the driving and use of the automobile.
- 6 The appreciation of the beautiful is brought out in the work in music, nature study and science, drawing and art, and literature in all the grades.
- 7 Thoughtfulness of others and the need for united effort is evidenced by the Red Cross membership campaigns, work for the hospital, letters to pupils who are ill, letters and contributions to any who are suffering and are absent from school including teachers, and the care of animals and pets.
- 8 Pupils are aided in their thinking as to ways of behavior toward the less fortunate, or toward individuals who may not belong to the same racial stock or the same social group. Whether recog-

nized or not, these school relationships have some bearing upon the attitude of persons in their later human relationships.

HEALTH

OBJECTIVE To give prominence to the idea that sound health in a sound body is an asset in school work and in life.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

- 1 The school community wisely adopted the provision of the statute for complete medical inspection in the public schools. Each school child is examined at least once a year by a competent physician. Each pupil engaged in a strenuous athletic sport has an additional examination to determine whether or not such sport would be detrimental to his health.
- 2 Through the cooperation of the Parent-Teachers' Association a moderately comprehensive plan for the care of teeth has been set up.
- 3 A school nurse has been employed, whose duty it is to carry out the recommendations of the school physician, to assist in the work of dental inspection and care, and to follow up cases of ill health and check, so far as may be possible, all evidences of contagious conditions.
- 4 Teachers direct the adjustments of school desks to individual pupils and constantly try to improve the health habits of the pupils in their rooms. This is particularly true in the grade schools,

where brushing of teeth, posture of the child, general cleanliness, and such other health factors as have a bearing upon good health are stressed.

SCHOOL PROPERTY

OBJECTIVE

To provide the pupils with wholesome school environment and with such books and materials as are necessary for the best accomplishment of the work assigned, and to instruct the pupils to exercise due care in their use of all school equipment.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

- 1 The greatest single forward step in this direction in the past few years has been a survey as to needs, and a planning for adequate and reasonably commodious school accommodations. The new high school building definitely marks a new era in the school history of the community.
- 2 The remodeling of the rural buildings has so improved those buildings as to make them more sanitary and more desirable from the standpoint of health and satisfaction to the pupils who are in attendance. Each of these buildings has been quite thoroughly overhauled within the past few years.
- 3 Based upon the idea that "bricks are not made without straw", pupils are furnished with the necessary supplies and illustrative matter. Constant efforts are made to see to it that the best is obtained at the lowest prices, and that all material is used economically.
- 4 Pupils are constantly urged to recognize the opportunities which have been afforded them and to take good care of the property which, for a few years of

their lives, they are privileged to use. The Student Council at the High School, the School Boy Patrols, and the teachers in all of the schools regard it as among their duties to see to it that undue injury and malicious damage is avoided in the use not only of the building, but of all school materials which a generous citizenry have provided.

- 4 The community, through its school board, recognizes the wisdom of constant repairs to buildings, thus avoiding the necessity of large outlays at more infrequent periods.
- 5 Efforts are made by the teachers to impress upon the pupils the desirability of the avoidance of waste in the use of all instruction material. Sometimes it even means the imposition of small fines for pure carelessness and destruction.

GUIDANCE

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

- 1 Only bare beginnings have been made, but the Headmaster of the High School and his several assistants have done much in a personal way, without the aid of definite tests and measurements, toward suggesting to the young people areas in which they might find a reasonable hope of success.
- 2 The community itself, through the provision for a moderately modern school environment, has made it possible for

OBJECTIVE

To aid young people in making proper mental adjustments in progressing educationally to as much advantage to themselves as possible, and to adjust themselves happily into their life situations.

boys and girls to try themselves out in spheres of activity unlike those which they have contacted elsewhere. These advantages have a tendency to help many a young person decide upon some line of endeavor for which he may fit himself.

3 All of the school officials are cognizant of the fact that neither an individual nor a group of individuals can determine infallibly the best and most suitable line of present and future activity for the pupil. It is, therefore, one of the aims of the teachers to so aid the pupil that he may more readily guide himself along the lines within which he feels he will be most happily interested and most likely to succeed.

SCHOLARSHIP

OBJECTIVE

To strengthen and maintain a high standard of excellence in scholarship. This takes into consideration many conditions which surround the individual. Among these may be mentioned mental ability, ambition, determination, opportunities for out of school study, necessity for contributing to the family income, and many others.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE

- 1 More and more emphasis has been placed upon the personal effort of the given pupil in accomplishing with a high degree of efficiency the mastery of a given subject or the work of the purely scholastic assignments, either in the grades or High School.
- 2 The marking system of the schools has been entirely revised with special thought given to high standards of accomplishment even for the pupil with more limited abilities.
- 3 Only those pupils who have shown marked improvement and abilities have

been unqualifiedly recommended for later scholastic endeavor. Something less than 3% of those who have gone on to college have given up that work because of failing to meet college requirements. Twenty per cent who enter college receive scholarship recognition in some form in their college courses.

- 4 Some of the pupils in their later years in the schools have been encouraged by the fact that they have been allowed to change their selected courses to some other course within which they could see a greater opportunity for the successful completion of their high school work. This has added to the persistence of the pupils' attendance through the four years of the Senior High School.
- 5 Some differentiation of assignments of work, particularly in the High School, have been made. This has made possible the success of certain pupils who might otherwise become discouraged. While this plan sets a certain minimum of subject matter required of all pupils, it provides a wider range of material for those with excellent and superior abilities and for those with more intense application, industriousness, and determination to succeed.

CONCLUSION

The accomplishments enumerated in the preceding paragraphs are possible in a community only where the many interests are working toward the objective of the common good. It is almost a truism to state

that the parents, the citizens, and the whole community are sympathetic and cooperative toward the work which is carried on in the public schools of Hanover. A word of acknowledgment is due all of these many individuals, and the many local organizations who have helped in any way to make the work of teaching a little more enjoyable and a little more likely to attain its goals. These several agencies, added to a continuing and relatively stable teaching force, will ever contribute toward higher educational accomplishments. Schools should not expect and do not wish to supplant or interfere with the home or other wholesome community influences, but by all working together harmoniously for the common purpose much can be and is being done toward assisting the young people in acquiring worthwhile and agreeable attitudes and ideals of life, in addition to acquiring those skills and knowledges which will enable them to succeed better in their future undertakings.
