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

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants in the town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre in said Hanover on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To choose by a ballot a clerk to serve for one year.

Second: To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditor and other town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third: To choose by ballot

To serve for three years

One Selectman

One Library Trustee

One Trustee of Trust Funds

To serve for one year

One Treasurer Two Auditors Three Fence Viewers Two Surveyors of Wood and Lumber

A Prosecuting Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Laws and any other necessary town officers.

Fourth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Fifth: To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate in all or part to be expended as may be necessary under the direction of the selectmen in co-operation with the state and federal agents engaged in the work of exterminating and preventing the spread of the disease commonly known as pine blister rust.

Sixth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the benefit of the Etna Fire Association.

Seventh: To see if the Town of Hanover will, by itself or jointly with the Village Precinct of Hanover, vote to build and equip a Municipal Building on the present Precinct property at the corner of Main Street and Allen Lane, or elsewhere; and to see what moneys the Town will raise and appropriate for such building and equipment.

To see if the Town will appoint a Building Committee which, by itself or jointly with a Committee from the Village Precinct of Hanover, shall be authorized to select plans, award contracts, and have general charge of the construction and equipment of said building; and to take any other action relating thereto.

Eighth: To see if the Town will vote to issue bonds or notes the proceeds to be applied towards constructing and equipping a Municipal Building described in Article Seven; and to take any other action relating thereto.

Ninth: To see if the Town will appoint a Committee to consider the condition of Ledyard Bridge and to prepare an estimate of the approximate cost of replacing the present structure by a new one; to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the expenses of the Committee.

Tenth: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the highway leading northerly from the four corners known as the Mason four corners (meaning the first four corners northerly from the reservoir on the road leading northerly between the reservoirs) to the buildings on the Pinneo farm so called or such portion of said road as in the judgment of the Selectmen is expedient.

Eleventh: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

ABSTRACT FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs, at the Nugget Theatre in said town, on the 10th day of March, 1925, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, the Moderator, the warrant under which the meeting was called was read by the clerk after which proceeded to the election of town officers and other business as follows:

Voted:

That the Moderator, in conjunction with the Moderator of the Precinct, appoint a committee of five members, to consider the subject of erecting a building to meet the needs of the Town and Precinct, and that the committee consider the subject in relation to the other needs of the Town and Precinct. That the said committee shall report not later than the next annual town meeting.

Voted:

That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars, or such part of it as is needed, for the expenses of the committee appointed to consider the subject of the erection of a Town and Precinct building.

Voted:

That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll Taxes provided by law, the Town raise the sum of twenty-two thousand five hundred (\$22,500) dollars and appropriate said sum and all other moneys, which may be paid into the treasury and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended, in accordance with the Budget and report as presented by the Selectmen.

Voted:

That authority is hereby granted the Selectmen to borrow on notes issued for not over one year an amount not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in addition to what has been raised otherwise.

Upon the Fifth article in the Warrant which was:

"To see what sum if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate in all or part to be expended as necessary under the direction of the Selectmen in cooperation with the State, and Federal Agents engaged in the work of exterminating and preventing the spread of the disease commonly known as pine blister rust." Discussion ensued.

Mr. J. L. Richards offered an amendment to the foregoing article that the words "in cooperation with the State Agent engaged," be stricken out. Prof. C. A. Holden opposed the amendment.

More discussion ensued, but upon a vote taken the amendment was adopted and the question as amended was passed as follows:

Voted:

That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars in addition to the amount in the Budget, the same, or such part as may be necessary, to be expended in the work of exterminating and preventing the spread of the disease commonly known as a Pine Blister Rust.

Voted:

That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the Treasury.

Voted:

That upon all Taxes upon real and personal property a discount of five per cent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15th, 1925, and a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before September 15, 1925.

Voted:

That the Collector of Taxes be instructed to have printed on every tax bill the rate per cent according to which the tax is assessed.

Voted:

To accept the reports of the Selectmen and other Town officers as printed in the Annual Report.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN OF HANOVER

The Selectmen of the Town of Hanover herewith present their Annual Report.

The bituminous macadam on the Trunk Line highway south of County Hill which was commenced in 1924 was finished during the first part of the summer of 1925. The highway northerly from this point is practically impassable in the spring and is difficult to traverse at some other times * during the year. The Selectmen therefore recommend that this part of the road be reconstructed during the present year. Since to pay for the total cost this year would make a considerable increase in the town tax rate, it is proposed to keep the tax rate substantially the same as in 1925 and to carry the balance on a note. It is planned in 1927 not to undertake extensive new highway construction but to pay during that year the amount carried over from 1926,—in other words to do the major highway construction for the next two years during this year and to distribute the cost over two years.

The Selectmen were authorized at the last annual town meeting to borrow \$10,000 on notes for not over one year but it was necessary to do so for a short period only and there are no notes outstanding. As may be seen by the report the interest paid for such notes and on notes issued in anticipation of taxes amounted to \$175.97 only. The Selectmen will ask at the coming annual meeting for authority to borrow \$20,000 on notes for not over one year, and they expect to be able to keep the interest charge during the year at a small figure.

The condition of the highway from Cutting's Corner to Etna has been of much concern to the Selectmen for sev-

eral years. In accordance with the program outlined in March, 1925, extensive construction was undertaken on this road and the larger part was done during the year. The stone which had been screened out by the belt conveyor during the resurfacing of highways in 1924 was used for a much needed stone base on part of the construction. It is planned to complete work on this project as soon as conditions will permit so that in June the surface can be covered with a binder.

The erection of a suitable and substantial storehouse for town highway property which was commenced in 1924 was mostly completed in 1925. The little remaining to be done will be finished this year. The completed storehouse will make it feasible to have equipment protected from the weather and yet readily accessible. Without the latter condition it is not practicable to keep under cover equipment which is being used frequently.

Attention is called to the Equipment Maintenance Account. In that account no credit has been allowed equipment on general town work such as the use of the tractor on the snow plow, snow roller, road machine and the removal of stones and boulders; the trucks and other machinery. The Hauck steamer has been of much value in thawing out culverts and pipes. It is small enough to be loaded into a truck and therefore easily transported yet large enough to be effective.

The maintenance account includes the cost for recent thorough overhauling and repairs to the equipment. It may be seen that the credits for work done on Trunk Line and State Aid roads during 1924 and 1925 exceeded by over \$2500 the total cost for maintenance, oil, gas, insurance, etc., for work done upon these roads and also upon the other town roads. It would have been difficult to accomplish the results of the last two years without the equipment which has been available.

The gravel resurfacing in 1924, and the oiling of the same in 1924 and 1925, on the State Aid and Trunk Line highways, combined with effective patrol work has made it possible to maintain those roads in good condition. The policy of widening the travelled part of the highway on the other town roads and of making the ditches farther therefrom has been continued during the year and will be extended during the coming year. The tractor and large road machine contribute to the possibility of such improvements.

TRUSTEES

The trustes have repeatedly called the attention of their fellow townspeople to the need of a more liberal support of the town library. It will be noted in the financial report that only about one-third of the money received was available for the purchase of books. There has been a more insistent call for more books for the young people, to which the trustees were unable to respond. We have a model building, unusually attractive as to its interior finish. In all the years since it was built the expense for repairs has been almost negligible; showing the value of the best of material and workmanship which went into it.

Attention is called to the change made in the heating. At a meeting of the trustees in September, by a mistaken reading of the trustees' report on town funds, it was supposed that there would be money available for moving the stove to the basement and enclosing it in a sheet-iron casing, and thus secure in effect a pipeless furnace, for which a proper opening was made through the floor. This was done and it is believed to be desirable improvement. More room is secured in the library and the need of bringing fuel upstairs is avoided. When it appeared that there were no funds for this, the treasurer made a personal loan of \$100 at the bank to cover the expense. The appropriation for the coming year should include this item to repay the loan.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN

1925

During 1925 five burning permits were given, four for brush and one for a corn roast. Your Warden wants to say that the State Forestry Department as far as funds are available will go fifty-fifty of the expenses to towns in purchasing Forest Fire tools and tool boxes. Therefore your Warden, in the fall of 1924, with district chief E. E. Woodbury went over the matter and a part of the town to determine location and number of boxes required and tools best adapted for fire-fighting. It seemed advisable to purchase not less than five boxes but on further consideration with the Selectmen it was decided to purchase seven boxes. Therefore, \$400 was raised for this Department. State funds would permit issuing only two boxes and tools for same this vear. At present one is at the town shed in Etna and one at deputy warden, R. E. Morfitt's, on the east side of the mountain. Your Warden hopes, with the help of your Selectmen to get the remaining five boxes as soon as State funds are available, when they will be placed at advantageous points about the Town. When this has been accomplished, in case of a large conflagration, amassing the tools of the seven boxes would equip two hundred men on the fire line. The Warden much appreciates the caution the people have taken and hopes it will continue.





STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Village Precinct in the town of Hanover, in the county of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Precinct affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre, in said Village, on Tuesday the ninth day of March, 1926, at 8.30. P. M. o'clock, to vote on the following subjects:

First: To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting, the same to be chosen by ballot.

Second: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for the term of one year.

Third: To hear the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer, and Auditor and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To choose by ballot a Treasurer and Auditor each to serve for the term of one year and one Precinct Commissioner to serve for three years.

Fifth: To raise such sums of money as shall be necessary to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the current year, including a Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department, Street Lighting Department, and all other necessary departments, and to pay outstanding notes.

Sixth: To see if the Precinct will vote to build any so called permanent highway and raise and appropriate the money therefore.

Seventh: To see if the Village Precinct will vote to join with the Town of Hanover in building and equipping a Municipal Building at the corner of Main Street and Allen Lane, or will vote to take any other action regarding the construction and equipment of such a building. Also to see if the Village Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate money for such a building and vote to issue bonds or notes for construction and equipping of said building, and to see if the Village Precinct will appoint, or authorize the appointment, of a committee to work with a committee from the town, or to work separately, with full auhority to select plans, award contracts and have general charge of the construction and equipment of said building.

Eighth: To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

A meeting of the legal voters of the Village Precinct of Hanover was called to order by Frank A. Musgrove at 8.30 o'clock P. M.

The warrant was read by the clerk.

Article I: Frank A. Musgrove was elected moderator for one year.

Article II: Ira W. Leavitt was elected clerk for one year.

Article III: Voted to accept and place on file the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer and Auditor as printed in the annual report for the year 1925.

Article IV: Alfred W. Guyer was elected Treasurer of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer and Auditor as one year. Fred F. Parker was elected Precinct Commissioner for three years.

Article V: Voted that the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$15250.00) to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the current year according to the items set forth in the budget and to provide in addition to the amounts set forth in the budget, the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00) for the use of the Fire Department in the purchase of additional hose, outfits for the firemen, miscellaneous equipment, increased pay, and one regular fireman to be on duty.

Article VI: Voted that the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) be raised and appropriated for the purpose of straightening and resurfacing Rope Ferry Road.

Article VII: Voted that the Precinct Commissioners be and hereby are authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the Village Precinct before taxes are raised, collected and paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Precinct.

Voted that upon all taxes on personal property and upon real estate, paid on or before the 15th day of July, 1925, a discount of five percent be allowed the tax payer, and that taxes upon personal property and real estate paid on or before the 15th day of September 1925, a discount of three percent be allowed the tax payer.

Voted that the Moderator of the Precinct in conjunction with the Moderator of the Town, appoint a committee of five members to consider the subject of erecting a building to meet the needs of the Town and Precinct and that the Committee consider the subject in relation to the other needs of the Town and Precinct. The said committee shall report not later than the next annual town meeting.

Voted that the Precinct extend to Adna D. Storrs a vote of thanks in appreciation of the work done by him during his term of office.

Voted to adjourn at 9.05 o'clock P. M.

REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department consists of a Volunteer Company of twenty-five men with apparatus as follows:

One three ton International truck equipped with fifteen hundred feet of good rubber lined hose, a forty gallon chemical tank, and all other fixtures of a modern fire fighting weapon, including a motor driven pump.

One double tank Ford Chemical also well equipped to do quick and good work where a fire does not have to have water poured upon it.

One hose truck with a thousand feet of serviceable hose. One hook and ladder truck with one fifty foot extension ladder and two thirty-five foot ladders.

The fire alarm system has been thoroughly overhauled during the year and new insulated wires strung all over town and twelve new alarm boxes have been added. A new storage battery has been installed at the fire house with automatic electric charging device of the very latest design.

It is proposed to add another larger Fire Truck, sometime during the ensuing year, but at the present time all equipment is in the best and most satisfactory condition that it has ever been.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of the Hanover Town School District:

I submit herewith my annual report as superintendent of schools, being the sixth of such reports.

A class of eighteen was graduated from the eighth grade in June. This was an unusually large class, and a large part of the class entered high school in the Fall.

Teachers

The most important matter in connection with the administration of the schools is the teacher. If we are to have good schools, we must have good teachers. Hence the selection of teachers is an extremely important matter. We have been fortunate in securing and retaining some good teachers. But each year brings some changes. Three new teachers were needed this year. Miss Thalia Sloane succeeded Mr. Martin at the Highlands, Mrs. Grasse at the Pinneo followed Miss Noble, and Miss Margaret Forbes at the Center took the place of Miss Humiston, who had served the district so long and faithfully.

Buildings

Minor improvements have been made in the buildings during the past year, more particularly at the County Road. Some very definite improvements need to be made to several buildings to bring them up to the minimum requirements of the State Department. It has been difficult to decide just what is best to be done in some cases where the continuance of the school has been a matter of uncertainty. One thing is sure that the State Department, in view of the fact that the State is contributing so largely toward the support of our

schools is going to insist that we provide adequately equipped buildings. Enquiry has already been made by the Department concerning this matter. Therefore, it is quite necessary to determine what buildings are to be kept in operation, and then put them into the required condition.

We are at present maintaining too many small schools. Four of the schools have had nine or less pupils each during this year. Such schools are expensive and are apt to be inefficient, however faithful the teacher may be. As a matter of good business, as well as good educational policy, at least two, possibly three, of these schools should be closed next year.

Attendance

Elsewhere is given a summary of attendance for the year ending June, 1925. The attendance record is not as good as it should be. A percentage of attendance of 92.35 is altogether too low under normal conditions. This record is partly accounted for by a very considerable amount of sickness among the children. Only three had a perfect attendance record for the year. This compares very unfavorably with the record of the neighboring town of Lyme, where the percentage of attendance was 96.54, and seventeen out of a considerably smaller registration had perfect attendance records for the year.

This matter of attendance is one of very considerable importance. Good attendance is a primary condition of good work. Good work may not be done even where the attendance is regular, but it cannot be done where the attendance is irregular. Therefore, the co-operation of the homes in this particular is especially desired.

Finances

The fiscal year closed June 30, 1925, with a considerable balance on hand. This was anticipated and a large part of this balance was appropriated to meet the requirements of

the budget, and the amount raised by taxation was less by just so much. This year the balance will be much less, and consequently a correspondingly larger amount must be raised by taxation. We are probably underestimating our needs for high school tuition. We have more pupils in high school, and the change in the law concerning tuition permits the schools to charge a higher rate. We shall probably overrun the budget item for tuition for the present year.

We are receiving a large amount of state aid, which, of course, can be applied only to the cost of the elementary schools. As this aid pays more than half the expense of maintaining the schools, the loss of it would involve a heavy burden upon the district. We should, therefore, endeavor to meet every requirement in the matter of buildings and equipment upon which the aid is conditioned. This may mean the expenditure of more money on the buildings, as I have indicated earlier.

Health Work

Dr. H. T. French, assisted by Miss Sawyer, the school nurse, made physical examinations in the Spring. After this some excellent follow-up work was done by Miss Sawyer, and many corrections of defects were secured. In the Fall, examinations were again made. No follow-up work has since been done, as we have had no nurse since that time. A nurse has now been secured, and as soon as conditions make it possible, further work with the children will be undertaken.

This is exceedingly important work, and provisions should be made to have it thoroughly done each year.

In General

The work of the year is progressing quite satisfactorily. The teachers are working hard and conscientiously. They manifest a fine professional pride and spirit in their work. The children, almost without exception, are responsive, eager,

and apparently happy in their school life. It is a pleasure to work with the teachers and pupils of the district.

I wish to suggest that parents visit the schools as often as possible. I am sure they would find much of interest, and their presence in the schools would be a matter of encouragement and inspiration to teacher and pupils.

It will be observed that there was a slight decrease in the number enrolled, but the average membership and the average attendance increased. The percentage of attendance was a little lower, while the record for tardiness was very slightly improved. Again the bad tardiness record was caused by two schools.

The Center and Goss schools had the best percentage of attendance, and the Arvin and Etna-Primary had the best records in the matter of tardiness.
