Of the special appropriation of two hundred dollars voted at the last annual meeting for the repair of the highway leading from the Tunis school house to the Lyme road, and the highway leading from the main road near E. B. Hurlbutt's past W. L. Wardrobe's house, we have expended \$103.48 upon the Tunis road, and \$25.55 upon the Wardrobe road, a total upon both roads of \$129.53, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$70.97. He consider these roads now in good condition for the travel thereon. We have not thought it best to expend any more of the appropriation than was necessary to make them reasonably safe for travel. The items are all included in the expenses for highways above.

TOWN SCHOOL BOARD,

AND OF THE

BOARD OF EDUCATION OF DISTRICT NO. I.

The following statistics in the usual form, and a few remarks by way of information and explanation are submitted to the attention of the residents of the district, especially to those who are interested in the schools.

The Board would call attention to the continued improvement in the schools during the year. This is not confined to the school-room, for it is the testimony of observing persons that there is better deportment of the scholars on the streets, in going to and returning from school, than has been the case in past years. It is believed that we owe the credit for this to the excellent teachers in charge, and to other circumstances noted beyond.

No remarks are needed as to the efficiency or faithfulness of our teachers. They have all proved their worth not only by their labors but by their personal influence over the scholars. The value of their services to the district increases from term to term. It is always a matter not only of regret, but of actual loss to the district, when a change has to be made in such a tried corps of teachers.

The library has received a very large addition by the gift of the old Stockbridge library and other volumes of value. A new and much larger case has been provided. The master of the schools, who takes charge of the library, reports that it is widely used, with great satisfaction and benefit by the scholars.

The committee in charge of the building has aimed to have the school rooms and basements kept in the best order, and the heating and ventilation regulated as well as possible under the conditions now existing. To this end our efficient janitor has spared no labor or painstaking care in order to keep the rooms and the entire building scrupulously free from dust and dirt; and to have them at the proper temperature at the opening of school each day. The importance of these conditions, not only for the comfort but for the health of teachers and scholars, cannot be overestimated.

The remarks made in the report a year ago, as to the advantages of the free text-book system, the improved sanitary arrangements, the new play-ground, the evils of absenteeism, and the general improvement in the schools during the past few years, are equally applicable at this time. It is proper to state that the purchase of the text-books and similar school supplies, the proper distribution in the different schools, and the accounting for the same by some member of the Board and teachers in direct charge, all involve a large amount of extra labor and responsibility.

A change has been made in the programme of study which will go into effect the next fall term. The additional year of post-graduate study is to be discontinued, and the

time in the grammar school increased from two to three years. This change is believed to be for the advantage and increased efficiency of the schools, as a whole.

A change has been made in the course of study of the intermediate room, as an experiment, which, if successful, may be further extended. Elementary science has been introduced. The instruction in it is given entirely by experiment and explanation. During the Winter Term physics have been taken up, and in the Summer botany will be introduced. The object of the change is not only to give the children a knowledge of the subject, but to encourage their powers of observation and reflection. The subject will be of practical value, and will also, it is believed, be of especial importance in awakening the interest of the scholars. The results thus far have been very gratifying. A new interest has been added to the work of the school-room, and some unsuspected ability aroused. If the courses should be continued some elementary apparatus will be needed.

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REPORT OF THE TOWN DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD.

In compliance with the requirement of the law as given in the last revision of the statutes the School Board would submit the following statistical report. The Board have maintained twenty weeks in nine different school houses, and in one house only one term of thirteen weeks was kept.

At the beginning of the year in making the estimate it was not thought safe to calculate upon more than twenty weeks for a school, but finding near the close of the year that there was enough funds, three weeks were added to the winter schools, making in all for the year twenty-three weeks.

The teachers engaged have all proved themselves well qualified to instruct, and with one or two exceptions their management of the schools has been satisfactory. The charts purchased by the Board have proved a good investment, being an aid to both teachers and pupils in the several branches taught.

We are pleased to see more interest manifested by the parents of the children, in most of the schools as their frequent visits indicate. Sickness has been the cause of many of the absences as shown in the registers, several schools having been closed for two weeks at one time. Excepting in cases of sickness the attendance has been good and the schools have maintained their former good standing.
