Voted: That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll taxes provided by law, the sum of twenty thousand two hundred (\$20,200.00) be raised, and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the treasury, and which are not required by law

otherwise to be expended, according to the budget, and report, as printed by the Selectmen.

Voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of three percent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15, 1936 and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the Treasury.

Voted: That when this meeting adjourns it be to meet at the Municipal Court Room, in the Town of Hanover, New Hampshire, on Tuesday the 19th day of May 1936 at 7:30 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

The year 1936 marked the conclusion of the terms of service of Arthur P. Fairfield and Alfred W. Guyer, who had been members of the Committee since its establishment in 1932.

It should also be remembered that the old school properties on Allen Street have been sold during the year for \$11,053.50, which amount may perhaps fairly be regarded as an offset to the above figures.

The Finance Committee has recommended that this sum of \$11,-053.50 be utilized as follows:

There will, of course, be some interest received on this amount of \$11,053.50 which is at present on deposit in the Savings Bank. This interest, the amount of which is as yet uncertain, will be accounted for at some later date.

The reason why it is thought desirable to apply this money entirely to the expenses of the years 1937 and 1938 is that during these years the tax load of the community, with respect to the payment of indebtedness and interest thereon, is at its peak; and therefore the application of these funds in these years will be of maximum practical benefit.

Taxpayers living outside the Precinct are not affected by Items 3, 4, and 5.

In addition, on February 1, 1937, the town owed the School District the sum of \$2000.

RESULTS OF TAX YEAR 1936

The Selectmen and the Precinct Commissioners have kept within the limits of the budget estimates; and while the fiscal year of the School Board does not end until June 30, there is no doubt that they will do the same, barring accidents.

The Selectmen have done considerably better than they expected. A combination of favorable circumstances and good management has enabled them to save approximately \$5,000 on their budgeted figures; and so they have been able, by an actual cash payment to the Treasurer of the School District, to reduce the "Balance due Schools" which has stood at the figure of \$7,000 or more for a considerable number of years to \$2,000,— a reduction which is welcomed by the Committee.

Estimates for 1937

After a most careful consideration of the budgets for the coming year, in which every member of the Committee has had an active and constructive part, final figures have been approved by the Finance Committee and are contained in the estimates of the Selectmen, the Precinct Commissioners, and the School Board which follow, each in its proper place.

A study of the figures will show that no outstanding new items of expense or major changes are contemplated.

If these plans are accepted by the voters, the town tax rate will be \$1.17, the same as in 1936.

The Precinct tax rate, \$.56, remains the same as in 1936.

The School tax rate will be \$1.45, three cents less than in 1935, but an increase of \$.08 over 1936. This increase was definitely predicted in our report for 1936. We now make the further prediction that the School tax rate for the year 1938 will remain at approximately

this same figure, and that for 1939 it will again show an increase. The reason for this is that, as previously stated, the amount of \$4,000 has been applied to reduce the amount of the School budget for each of the years 1937 and 38, these amounts being derived from the sale of the Allen Street property.

The temporary drop in the School tax rate in 1936 to the figure of \$1.37 was due to an unexpectedly large "Grant" from the United States Government.

GENERAL

Citizens of Hanover should obtain and read with care the current report of the State Tax Commission. It is a pessimistic document, but not unduly so. While the conditions there portrayed affect us all, their special application to the subject of this report is that they indicate that the "State Tax" is almost certain to be increased, which of course will increase the share to be paid by Hanover, and therefore will increase the town tax rates, unless local economies keep it down.

It is to be hoped that with emergence from the depression the rising tide of County taxes has reached its flood stage, and may begin to ebb a little; but this must be taken as the expression of a hope, rather than as a prediction.

The burden of Federal taxes, of all sorts, must be expected to continue to increase, at least for some years.

Our slogan must still continue to be "rigid economy in all matters

of local taxation". We shall be very glad to receive and consider suggestions from any citizen as to how further economies may prudently be effected.

It is our judgment that until our total community indebtedness has been reduced to approximately \$100,000, no serious consideration should be given to any major project for local expenditures which involve borrowing money. Again, barring unforseen emergencies, that time will be reached about the year 1944. This statement should not be interpreted to mean that we believe that some such public project should definitely be undertaken at that time; for by that time other conditions may have changed greatly, and we are not endeavoring to commit our successors to any such policy.

No public budget hearing will be held this year. Lack of interest resulted in their discontinuance in 1936, and they do not seem to have been missed.

At any time, however, when there is any appreciable public demand for such service, it will very gladly be reinstated.

- Column A: Represents the amount of the original bonds issued for payment of Hanover's share of the cost of constructing Ledyard Bridge.
- Column B: Represents the Ledyard Bridge Bonds outstanding on February 1, 1937. The amounts given are not in addition to the amounts listed in Column A but are the amounts of the original bonds mentioned in Column A which were outstanding on February 1, 1937.

The State, by vote of the Legislature, paid \$10,000.00 in addition to the \$20,000.00 required by law. With this \$10,000.00 was paid one \$1,000.00 bond due in each of the years 1936-1939 inclusive and 1949-1954 inclusive.

Column C: Represents town notes outstanding. It contains three of the four notes of \$1000.00 each issued in 1935 and due in the years 1937-38-39; two notes on account of the amount due on Ledyard Bridge and which was not covered by bonds, —one note of \$1000.00 due in 1940 and one note due in 1941 for \$569.83. (\$899.42 less an additional Federal Grant of \$329.59) and a note due in 1942, of \$1000.00 issued in 1936 on account of the Mount Support Bridge.

There were due in 1936 a \$3,000.00 bond and a \$1,000.00 note. They were paid for by \$4,000.00 raised by taxes in 1936.

The cost, \$4,000.00, to the Town of the Mount Support Bridge over Mink Brook was paid by a \$1,000.00 note due in 1942, \$2,000.00 raised by 1936 taxes and \$1,000.00 raised by 1936 taxes for payment on indebtedness.

Column D: Represents the total amount of Bonds and Notes due in each of the years 1937-1954 inclusive.

Each bond and note is due on December 1. Interest rate on each bond and note is $3\frac{1}{4}\%$.

1936

Our community has been very fortunate this past year as regarding the number of fires we have had. Some were of a rather serious nature. Last Spring, a fire broke out in the home of Mr. Paul Monica as the result of an over-heated chimney. Except for the timely arrival of our men and equipment this home would have been completely destroyed.

Another serious fire, of unknown origin, completely destroyed the barn of Mr. David Croall while the entire family was away. The fire gained such headway that it greatly endangered the house and shed nearby. Only quick and organized effort in real fire fighting saved the · Croall home.

Last July, Mr. Adna Camp's barn was struck by lightning. Again the house and shed were so near that it seemed impossible to save these buildings. Only by valiant service on the part of our men was it possible to keep the fire in check. The arrival of the pumper from Hanover, gave great assistance, and aided in saving this home from complete destruction. In each case, had the houses been destroyed, it would have been impossible for a re-building, in all probability.

The Association made an effort to raise some money. A Minstrel Show, using local talent, was put on two nights in Mr. Camp's new barn. This was a success as indicated in the report of the treasurer.

There are many improvements to be made as soon as financial aid can be given. We greatly appreciate the amount voted for our Fire Association by the Town of Hanover.

The assessed valuation of real estate and property in the town and precinct was \$5,522,534.00, and the insured value approximately \$30,000,000.00. The estimated fire loss was \$21,760.00 which is a loss of .394% of the assessed value or .0725% of the insured value.

Attention should be called to the alarming rate of increase in fires of the chimney, fire place and oil burner type. Many of these have been very disastrous. The decrease in grass fires from 11 to 3 indicates excellent cooperation by the community in preventing fires of this sort. Fires in woodlands, however, should be especially guarded against because of the likelihood of fires spreading through the tree tops.

Inspection of the business area has been made twice during the past year. It is strongly urged that every precaution be taken to keep this section free from fire hazards.

The company has received a comprehensive course of training during the year. A deputy was sent to attend the fire college in Arlington, Massachusetts for two weeks. As a result of his training he has been able to add greatly to the effectiveness of the training given the local company. Mention should be made of the splendid attendance record of the company at all the fire drills.

The company appreciates the cooperation which the citizens have shown them during the year.

REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

February 12, 1937

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.:

Milk licenses are issued by the Commissioners through the Town Clerk's office. During the past year several pasteurizing plants have been installed by milk producers so that now most of the local milk supply is pasteurized. Inspections have been made of the various dairies and pasteurizing plants.

During the year 1936 only 80 cases of contagious disease were reported as compared with 260 cases during 1935. Quarantine was enforced in those instances where it is required by law.

Eight nuisances were reported and investigated. Three small epidemics were investigated.

Examinations and inspections of the Reservoir and Storrs' Pond were made.

To accomplish the above the Health Officer traveled about one hundred and seventy-five miles.



You are hereby notified to meet at Grade School Hall in Hanover, New Hampshire, on Thursday the 18th day of March, 1937, at seven and one-half o'clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:



PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL MEETING

Hanover, New Hampshire, March 19, 1936.

The annual meeting of Hanover School District was called to order at seven and one-half o'clock in the evening at Grade School Hall in the village of Hanover, New Hampshire, by the Moderator, William H. Murray. Articles of the warrant which had been duly posted according to law, were read by the Clerk, Raymond B. Baird.

Article 1: William H. Murray was elected Moderator for the ensuing year and was duly sworn before assuming office.

Article II: Raymond B. Baird was elected Clerk and was duly sworn before assuming office. Alfred W. Guyer was re-elected Treasurer as was Earle C. Gordon as Auditor.

Article III: Arthur H. Chivers and Francis V. Tuxbury were reelected and Emma L. Delahanty elected members of the Board of Education, each for a term of three years.

Article IV: Voted: That the annual report, as printed, containing the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen be accepted and placed on file.

Voted: That the informal report of the Building Committee made by the Chairman, Francis J. Neef, be accepted.

Article V: Voted: That articles 5 and 6 be considered to-gether.

Articles V and VI: Voted: That the District raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law, together with the unexpended balance and the receipts of the department \$57,652.00 for school purposes as follows: \$11,000.00 for the payment of Bonds, \$210.00 for the salaries of the school board and other officers, and \$46,442.00 for general expenses and improvements as set forth in the budget.

Voted: That the above named amount to be raised by taxation be reduced by such sum as may be returned to the District by the Building Committee after necessary payments are made from balance received from the Federal Government before June 1, 1936.

Article VII: Voted: That the School Board be, and they hereby are, authorized to sell the land and/or buildings of the school in the so-called Arvin District and the so-called Highland District, when, in

their judgment, it is for the best interests of the District to do so, and that the chairman of the Board and the Treasurer of the District be, and they hereby are authorized to execute the deed or deeds therefor.

Article VIII: On the motion of Nathaniel H. Burleigh it was voted that the School Board be instructed to include in the warrant for the next annual meeting of the School District, an article pertaining to the reduction of the number of members of the School Board from nine to six.

Voted: That when this meeting adjourns it be to meet at Grade School Hall in the Village of Hanover, New Hampshire, on Monday, the 18th day of May, 1936 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Voted to adjourn at 8:20 o'clock in the afternoon.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hanover:

The eighty-third annual report of the public schools of the School District of Hanover is herewith presented. It includes the twentieth by a superintendent of schools; the ninth by the present writer.

PURPOSE The historical record of the statistical and financial information of the District is included in this report. It will contain also an account of some of the more important happenings of the last school year. There will be set up also certain suggested improvements in the school program which should be given serious consideration by the Board and the citizens of the District.

SURVEY The readjustments in the schools which were made last year as a result of the new High School building have become stabilized. The teaching staff has been enlarged to meet the dual needs of numbers of pupils and the accepted Program of Studies which was prepared for the Junior-Senior High School. The integration and correlation of the work in the elementary schools has been continued so that there is a greater interest and a greater pupil participation in the learning process. The financial affairs of the District are gradually becoming adjusted in the newer situation. The expenditures have been kept within the bounds of reason and limited to those amounts necessary to maintain effective schools. The esprit de corps of the teaching staff continues to be on a high plane. The cooperation of all interested in educational affairs remains as an active force in the promotion of better educational advantages.

BUDGET The budget requirements for the year 1937-1938 will not be materially different from those of the current school year. It will need to be borne in mind that individual items in the budget will be changed from time to time in accordance with the actual experience in the operation of the schools. A second full year of experience under the improved conditions will give those of us who have to do with

the budget planning a better opportunity to know more accurately just how the budget items should be distributed. The citizens may not always be aware that it is necessary for a school board to prepare its budget many months before it is put into operation and always before the budget for the current year has been completed. This makes careful estimating rather more difficult and fraught with greater possibilities of failure to provide properly for individual items.

The amount to be raised by taxation for next year will be somewhat greater than that of the current year due partly to the fact that last year a large sum in excess of original expectations was received from the Federal Government, and partly to the fact that the expected income for next year will be less than that of this year.

It will be inferred from the preceding paragraph that the income side of the budget is another source of difficulty in setting up amounts that are expected to be received as it can not be foretold with accuracy as to just how many pupils will be received into the schools for whom tuition can be charged. It now appears that the number of such pupils for next year will be very definitely decreased so that it has been deemed advisable to anticipate a lesser amount to be received for tuition than that of the present fiscal year. The School Board is endeavoring to use its best judgment in taking into consideration all of these several factors before it presents its budget for the approval of the School District.

HIGH SCHOOL The first full year of work in the re-organized High School has demonstrated the value of the improved working conditions. It is the consensus of opinion among the teachers that the scholastic achievement of the pupils in the school was and continues to be on a higher plane than under the former congested conditions. One phase of high school work which is particularly valuable in the process of adjusting pupils to life situations has been that of the activities program. The citizens may be aware that very much of this provides educational values which are often equal and sometimes superior to the values derived from straight subject matter courses. This does not in any way belittle the value of the so-called academic studies but simply emphasizes the oft forgotten fact that pupil activities assist very materially in building up well balanced lives.

As indicated in the report of last year leadership is developed through such activities. This is particularly true since an effort is constantly made to have the pupils, through the Student Council, do many of the worthwhile things which need to be done to make the school an agreeable place in which to work and gain those bits of knowledge, information, and experience so much needed by the young people in the years that lie ahead. This Student Council sees to it that the building is kept in proper order, that electricity is not used except as necessity requires, that the grounds are freed from litter and that reasonable behavior is practiced by the student body.

The National Youth Administration has made possible the granting of aid to a few of the pupils in our school. Last year this aid was given for faithful attendance and studiousness. This year it has been given for pupils who actually perform some work other than their regular school duties and therefore make some added contribution to the school. This has helped very materially in carrying out the program of improvements set up by the Student Council.

BICYCLE SHED The parking area at the High School building has been relieved this year by the elimination of bicycles from that portion set apart for the parking of automobiles. The School Board has carried out the desire of the citizens in planning for a new building to have appropriate storage space for the large number of bicycles of pupils who ride to school. A bicycle shed was erected at a moderate cost for the accommodation of something like 100 bicycles. This shed serves also as a tool house at grade level for the storage of janitors' tools, including mowers, rakes, and the like. The complete project was designed so that should necessity arise it can be enlarged at a reasonable cost.

To avoid accident in the storing of the wheels and to prevent erosion of the newer parts of the graded surface of the school grounds it became necessary also to erect a retaining wall around two sides of the gully between the two school buildings. This has helped to reclaim an area of land of considerable size for the benefit of the pupils. It is now proposed to complete this work by the addition of an appropriate fence so that there will be less temptation for the pupils to use the wall as a play surface.

LIBRARY Any attempt to improve the scholastic advantages of the pupils in the schools must include the necessity of providing pupils with a great variety of reading material. This material for the grades must be within the comprehension of the pupils and for the High School must meet the needs of the pupils in the several subject matter groups. This year has seen additions to such material for all groups, High School and the grades. The Civic Committee of the Woman's Club sponsored a campaign for the raising of funds for the purpose of purchasing library books. As a result of this effort the pupils have had available at the school many desirable books which have been in quite constant use. The mothers of the pupils in the Grade School assisted the Principal in raising a fund for the same purpose in that building. Some books have been purchased and the nucleus of a small library has been started. An indirect outcome of the activity of the Woman's Club was an award to that Club by the federated clubs of the state for one of the best projects conducted for the benefit of the public schools. Such united effort of the citizenry and teachers adds increasingly to the idea that the public schools are a cooperative enterprise, operated for the benefit of all of the young people of a community.

HEALTH The work of the School Nurse and School Physician has been carried on during the past year in accordance with previous plans and along lines similar to those of the past several years. It has been of great advantage to the work of the school nurse and to other school activities to have the physical examinations of the majority of the pupils completed in September or early October rather than to have the physical examinations carried on spasmodically during the year. The cooperation of the Parent-Teacher Association in providing for the care of the teeth of the children in the first six grades is another evidence of the interest of the citizens in the welfare of the pupils. This work will no doubt result in lessening pupil absences and, according to the medical authorities, will have a tendency to improve individual pupil physical well being. It is probable that by the end of this year there will be no pupils in the first six grades in Hanover who have been without dental attention.

The greater emphasis in the health program thus far has been along the line of prevention and protection rather than that of eradication of disease after it has arisen. As an added measure in this same direction it is well to consider the possibilities and advantages of a more extensive physical and recreational program supplementing and co-

ordinating with the health program. Your attention has been previously called to the desirability of a more comprehensive physical and recreational program and it would now seem that the time is approaching when such efforts should result in actual accomplishment. Such a program of physical education should not be permitted to supplant the present plan of teacher coaches for the physical and other activities of the High School but should be of such a nature as to build toward a more symmetrical development of the physiques of the children. Many communities in this and other states have complete programs for this work with physical directors for both boys and girls. Such a complete program introduced at once would require rather more financial support than it now seems probable can be given to it in a community such as Hanover. As a result of an investigation which has been made this year it would appear that a beginning for such a program could be made without too great an expense. To be sure there would be a need for additional equipment facilities, both as to locker accommodations and material equipment, but this expenditure need not be prohibitive as the call for apparatus in this field has grown less and less with the lessening emphasis upon the Swedish gymnastic type of physical training. Such a program requires also much activity in the open spaces and on the playgrounds. This means that there is an immediate need before such work can be done effectively of a completion of the grading of all of the land to the rear of the present Grade School and now owned as school property. When this work is completely done it will be possible to divide the areas in such fashion as to make available larger play spaces for the many activities which should be carried on from the third grade through the high school by both boys and girls.

It is recommended, therefore, that this Board take the necessary steps for the completion of this project. When this is done it may be felt by the citizens that a physical training program can be undertaken at a minimum cost and with a greater prospect of successful fruition.

ILLUSTRATIONS There are included in this report photographic reproductions of the work as it is being carried on in the schools of Hanover. Each of these prints has been given a legend so that the reader may easily understand the subject illustrated. It is hoped that these may assist the reader in gaining a little closer knowledge of the work that is being carried on in the public schools. There is nothing

particularly startling revealed by the pictures. Nevertheless they show present day activities in actual operation in the school rooms of Hanover.

MUSIC One of the outstanding events of the year was the All State Musical Festival which was held in Hanover May 15 and 16, 1936. This Festival included music by orchestras, bands and glee clubs, together with one orchestral concert of selected representatives from the several schools of the state. The combined ensemble of such pupils numbered about 175 individuals. Much credit is due the teaching force and citizens of Hanover for making it possible to have this number of people entertained in our midst. A special appreciation is extended to those citizens who opened their homes as hostels for these young people. Grateful acknowledgment is also extended to the Hanover Civic and Trade Association, and to the Music Department and the Recreational Department of Dartmouth College for their generosity and helpfulness in carrying out the entire Music Festival program. Several thousand citizens of the state attended these concerts and gave evidence of great interest in the several performances. Such festivals help the young folks to realize that they are a part of the younger citizenry of the state and that many others than themselves are interested in musical activities. Such events as these would not be easily possible without the energy and musical spirit of the Hanover Director of Music who was last year President of these combined clubs of the state. The various musical programs held in the Hanover schools throughout the year, the improvement of the work in vocal music as well as the continuous building up of a High School orchestra are due also to her consistent efforts. The final result is evidence not only of her capacity but also of the willingness of the people and the cooperation of Headmaster, Principal, and teachers in arranging programs and providing opportunities for a fuller development of the work in this field.

HORACE MANN July marks the 100th anniversary of a series of events which have resulted in the continuation of the democratic, common, or public schools of America. It was in the year 1837 that Horace Mann, an ex-school teacher with a lucrative law practice and promised career of political achievement became the first secretary of the State Board of Education of the State of Massachusetts.

It had taken several years for a Mr. Carter and himself to bring

about legislation in that state which set up the State Board of Education. The first action of this Board was to persuade Horace Mann to accept the appointment as Secretary of the Board. Previous to this event the public school systems of Massachusetts, in common with those of the several states, were irregular, meagre in their support, operating under a district system, very short as to the school year, not widely available for all of the boys and girls, and in many instances entirely sectarian. Horace Mann took it upon himself, with a mere pittance as a salary, considering the work he was to undertake, to bring about a condition of better teaching, better school facilities, and a broader opportunity for the children. He met with wide spread opposition but persisted in his efforts for twelve years until he had brought about such changed conditions and such an aroused public interest that one state after another in the union followed the example or caught an echo of the spirit which actuated him and carried forward the movement for an education of all of the people of the states. The opposition which Horace Mann met still has its counterpart in some of the attitudes of some of the citizens in many communities. Occasional individuals are found who perhaps believe as apparently did one of the public school situations of Massachusetts at that time. An actual survey brought out the information that an average of sixty-five floggings per day in a school of 400 pupils was required to bring about better school behavior on the part of the pupils and provide a practical method of producing worthwhile citizens. Any plan to treat boys and girls as individual entities, capable of growth and development within themselves and through their own individual activities, without being forced by adults to traditional lines of behavior, requiring oftentimes the use of severe corporal punishment, was scarcely tolerated.

The success of Horace Mann's efforts are measured not alone by the extensive opportunities which have been provided, including better school buildings, equipment and materials, better teachers, better methods, but by the conduct attitudes of the people of the country who have had full opportunity to profit by the experiences gained through the public school system. Every great crisis since the turn of the present century has seen the young people of the land ready to assume their share of the responsibilities of citizens and to render the service in an unselfish endeavor to promote the general welfare. To be sure, some retarding influences, brought about largely by the influx of people from

the more or less autocratic and tyrannical situations in Europe, have slowed up the progress and have no doubt had an influence upon the attitudes of some groups toward our democratic ideals. In the main, however, among those people who have had background of two or three generations of contacting with the public school the hopes, ideals and principles of democracy still prevail so that the practices as laid down by Horace Mann have had through all these years an influence toward providing a background of attitudes and ideals which have and, it is confidently expected, will continue to maintain the democratic institutions of the states and country. It is fitting that in a community where so much has been and is being done to provide better educational opportunities for the young people, that this slight tribute be paid to the memory of one man in American education who stands out preeminently as the forerunner and advocate of many of the better practices of our present day public schools.

SUMMARY This report has attempted to discuss some of the actual happenings in the schools of Hanover. It has attempted also to portray some of the aims and purposes of the schools and to give the citizens an historic document which may be of value in subsequent planning. It has attempted to give credit to various agencies which have in any way cooperated with the public schools and would add at this point the names of the Hanover Rotary Club which is sponsoring the Boy Scout movement and which recognized, with the aid of a large group of citizens, the success of the High School football team in the fall. It has limited the recommendations to only those which have been previously considered in similar reports and looks forward to the time when such recommendations may be carried into effect.

Words are insufficient to express full appreciation of the school community for all of the several contributions which have been made by every agency and individual who has cooperated.
