## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, in the County [L. S.] of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.
You are hereby notified to meet at Hayes' Hall in said Hanover on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to have a liquor agent for the ensuing year.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, one hundred dollars of said sum towards the expense of lighting the streets of Hanover, and fifty dollars towards the expense of lighting the streets of Etna.
5. To see what steps the Town will take to secure the annual publication of the tax-list of the Town, or of the Selectmen's valuation of all pieces of real estate, or both, on petition of Charles D. Adams and others.
6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers, heretofore chosen, or pass any vote relating thereto, and transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

## ABSTRACT FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs, at the hall of C. W. Hayes, in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March, 1913, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harlow S. Person, the moderator; the warrant under which the meeting was called was read by the clerk, after which proceeded to the election of town officers and other business as follows:

For Town Clerk: George M. Bridgman.
For Selectmen: Don S. Bridgman, Frank I. Spencer, and Adna P. McPherson.

For Treasurer: Daniel B. Russell.
For Auditors: Halsey C. Edgerton and John H. Foster.

For Library Trustee: Horace F. Hoyt.
For Fence Viewers: James Spencer. Frank A. Adams, Daniel O. Hoyt.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber: John J. Bond, and William H. Hart.

For Sealer of Weights and Measures: John E. Cas$\sin$.

For Prosecuting Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Laws: Arthur P. Fairfield.
Voted :
That the town raise the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars to defray the various town expenses, and pay the interest on the notes of the town, and that the selectmen be instructed to use any balance to apply on the principal of the notes in such amounts as the treasury will warrant.
Voted :
To raise the sum of twelve hundred dollars for the support of schools in excess of the amount required by law.

Voted :
To have a liquor agent for the ensuing year.
Voted :
To raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars; one hundred dollars of said sum towards the expense of lighting the streets of Hanover, and fifty dollars towards the expense of lighting the streets of Etna. Voted :

To authorize the selectmen to borrow a sum of ten thousand dollars, the same to be appropriated towards the construction of a new granite and concrete bridge across Connecticut river at, or near the site of the present Ledyard Bridge, so-called, provided that said sum of ten thousand dollars shall be so borrowed and expended only on the specific condition that the full amount needed to pay for said bridge shall be otherwise secured without further expense to the town.
Voted :
To raise and appropriate the sum of eleven hundred and twenty-five dollars for a maintenance fund for highways.
Voted :
That the selectmen be instructed to apply for State aid for permanent highways.
Voted :
That upon all taxes paid on or before the 15 th day of July, 1913, a discount of five per cent be allowed the taxpayer, and upon all taxes paid on or before the 15 th day of September, 1913, a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayer.
Voted :
That the reports of the town officers as published in the Annual Report be accepted and adopted.

Voted to adjourn.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1

During the past year the High School has had the advantage of having the same principal and two of the same teachers as last year. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Nicholson was filled by the appointment of Miss Alice P. Hall, a graduate of Bates College in 1910, with previous experience in teaching at Hudson, Mass. The work of the new Commercial Course, the introduction of which was at last made possible by the completion of the new High School building, was placed under the charge of Miss Marion L. Hayes, a graduate of New Hampshire State College in 1898, with previous experience at Dover, N. H.

In the grades the number of pupils in the fifth and sixth grades room had become so large that at the beginning of school last fall the two grades were separated. The sixth grade remained under Miss Gilman and was moved to a new second story room in the rear wing. This upper floor of the wing was formerly divided into two small rooms used as recitation rooms for high school classes. The removal of the High School to its new building across the street made it possible to take out the partition between the two small recitation rooms and thereby make one large well-lighted and well-ventilated room for the sixth grade. The fifth grade, now in a separate room by itself, is under Miss Andrews, a graduate of the Keene Normal School, with previous teaching experience at Charlestown, N. H. The vacancy in the third grade, caused by the resignation of Miss Spencer, was filled by the appointment of Miss Camplell, also a graduate of the Keene Normal School, with previous teaching experience at Charlestown, N. H. The instruction in music has been under the very successful direction of Mrs. Little.

The new High School building was occupied for regular work at the close of the spring recess last year. The
financial statement of the Building Committee, which was entrusted by the District with the expenditure of the $\$ 30$,000 appropriated last year, is given below. The new building has given to the pupils an interest in their work and a feeling of unity which were impossible under former conditions. With abundant space, good equipment, and a corps of experienced teachers, the work is progressing most satisfactorily. The commercial course, introduced this year, has proved to be very popular. For two of the typewriters used in this work the District is indebted to the generosity of Dr. J. M. Gile and Mr. F. W. Davison. A school orchestra is practising under competent instruction and is planning soon to give a public concert. The hall in the new building is a useful and attractive centre for the social life of the school. It is available also for precinct meetings and for the meetings of town organizations whose purpose is literary or educational. The gymnasium is used by the pupils of the school, both boys and girls, during the afternoons and certain evenings; the use of the room on other evenings of the week has been given to a group of young men of the town. With the improved facilities offered by the new High School the Board have thought it proper to raise the tuition for tuition pupils to $\$ 40$ a year, viz: $\$ 16, \$ 12, \$ 12$, for the fall, winter, and spring terms respectively.

The present winter term runs to March 27 ; the spring term will be from April 13 to June 19, 1914.

The statistics of membership, the names of the class graduating last June, the honor roll of perfect attendance, and the reports of the Treasurer of the District are given below.
