

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. s.]

To the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs, you are hereby notified to meet in the Hall of C. W. Hayes in said town on the second Tuesday of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a town clerk.
- 2d. To choose by ballot and major vote three selectmen and all necessary town officers.
- 3d. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintainance of the poor.
- 4th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools.
- 5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways, for laying out and constructing highways.
- 6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for other necessary town charges.
- 7th. To see what sums of money the town will vote to appropriate for the care and improvement of the cemeteries in said town and direct how the same shall be expended, or choose agent or agents therefor.
- 8th. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto, and transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The results for the winter term pertain only to the time previous to the printing of this report.

A comparison of this report with that for last year will show that the whole number of pupils is somewhat less than the number for that year, but above the average for the last three or four years, and considerably above the general average. The average attendance has been better than even that of last year. By the report of that year the average attendance was 73 per cent. of the total number enrolled, this year it is 87 per cent.

An examination of the statistical summary for the High school will show an increase in numbers over that of last year and a very decided increase when compared with preceding years. By the report for 1894 the maximum number in the High school in any term was 29, in 1895 the same number, and in each of the following years 38 and 55 respectively; this year it is 60.

The entering class when it came into the High school contained 20 members, two-thirds as many as there were in the whole High school four years since. Not only have several older pupils come back to take post-graduate work, but the lower classes have been, as shown above, unusually large.

The influx was so great at the beginning of the fall term that your committee were compelled to either enlarge the seating facilities in the school room, which was hardly feasible, or to modify the rules of attendance. They adopted the plan, tentatively, of allowing the members of the senior class to study at home, requiring their attendance only at recitations. This increase has not, to any great extent, been due to additional pupils taken in from outside of the district as some may suppose. For, as will be shown later, this number of outside pupils in the High school is less by one than last year, and about the general average for the last few years.

It will thus be seen that those in our community who have children to send have been quick to avail themselves of the increased opportunities afforded. This increase in attendance and the desires and qualifications of the pupils have compelled the principal to divide his classes, and to increase quite materially his work.

While, considering the present financial status of the district, we are not prepared to advise an addition to the teaching force; the services of another teacher would be exceedingly desirable, augmenting the scope and efficiency of the school. With such a variety of subjects to teach one instructor cannot do justice to each pupil.

As a result of the agreement made with the president of Moor's Charity School, which agreement was given in full in our report of last year, we shall probably have three young men fitted for college at the end of this school year. We wish there were more in some of the lower classes who were taking such courses of study as would entitle them to a diploma and enable them to take this advanced work. Moor's Charity School, at the present time, has but one representative in the High school; last year there were two. It will thus be seen that the benefits of the agreement have thus far very largely accrued to the district.

Two young men entered the college last year from our High school, taking the Chandler Course. At the close of the spring term, Mr. Stevens having decided to begin a course of professional study, your committee at once took measures to secure a new principal. Mr. Poor, the present incumbent, came to us highly recommended as to scholarship and general proficiency in the subjects to be taught. We feel that our confidence in him was not misplaced. He has worked carnestly and faithfully to promote the best interests of the school; his instruction has been thorough and the discipline good without any apparent effort to produce that result. We think he has the sympathy and hearty support of the scholars in his work and that he is making the school a working body.

The department furnished with an instructor by the president of Moor's Charity School has been unfortunate in having quite a number of different instructors, but very fortunate in the young men furnished. We were deprived of the carnest and efficient services of Mr. Aiken, whose noble character and earnest Christian life were felt wherever he was called upon to act, at a time when those services seemed most needed. Mr. Walter S. Adams of the then Junior class in college was secured to complete the term's work, which he did with marked success.

At the beginning of the present year, Mr. Robert H. Fletcher, a former member of the school and a graduate of the college, kindly took this work until a more permanent instructor could be secured, he himself having determined to pursue a further course of study elsewhere. His most excellent work was highly appreciated by both pupils and committee. We hope that the present incumbent, Mr. Ham, will remain with us another year, not only because changes are undesirable, but on account of the very efficient work which he is doing. The school is to be congratulated for being able to secure the services of a high school teacher who has had a most successful experience.

The maximum attendance in the High school, including five fourth-year pupils, as shown elsewhere, has been 60, while the highest average attendance has been 53, both occurring in the fall term. Of this, number, those doing more advanced work are divided as follows:

Number taking fourth-year Greek	3
Number taking Cicero	4

The number in each of the regular High school classes now taking such a course of study as will, if continued, entitle them to receive a diploma is as follows:

In the entering class	17
In the second-year class	9
In the senior year	11.

We wish it could be more generally understood that the work of the school is hampered by the number of scholars who do not conform to any regular course of study.

No chemistry has been taught during the last two terms and it is not at present a prescribed study. This is a subject that should be added and one case when an addition to the teaching force is needed.

The number of pupils in all of the schools paying tuition is nineteen, two more than last year. Of this number seven are in the High school, one less than last year. Of the remaining number seven are in the Grammar school, two in the Intermediate and three in the Primary school. The total amount received therefore is about \$20 and about \$20 more than last year.

We have already taken much more space in referring to the High school than is usually given in the annual report, because the immediate and future needs of that department demand the most careful consideration of the Board and of the district, therefore we can only briefly allude to the work of the lower schools. We have nothing especially new to report as the conditions are substantially the same as last year.

In these lower schools the total number is nearly the same as last year, and as then reported, a proper and manageable number in each school. In the Primary and Sub-primary departments the numbers have fallen off a little, owing to the removal from town of some families. As stated in last year's report the vertical system of writing was adopted in the two lowest grades. It has this year been introduced into the Grammar school with very beneficial results, especially in the line of legibility. The average penman shows evident improvement and the poorer ones a very marked change.

In previous reports your attention has been called to the value and importance of a good library. The present actual value of our library is less than it has been, owing to the fact that for the last year at least very few additions have been made to it. The books which we now possess have been so thoroughly read and used that most of our present pupils have, in a measure, lost their interest in them. The importance of a good library is recognized and urged by all of our teachers and another appropriation by the district for this purpose and gifts of books from friends would be of great benefit. We wish to hereby acknowledge and express our appreciation of some such gifts recently received.

The conscientious care and attention rendered by our janitor has contributed very much to cleanliness and good order in the school building and enhanced, in no small degree, the health and comfort of the scholars themselves.

The long continued and valuable services of two former members of this Board, who resigned at the last annual meeting, should not be passed by without some recognition. Both of the gentlemen, at the time of their resignation, had served for twelve years or more. Both were teachers of long standing and experience and both gave their thought, their time and their labor, without stint or hesitation. It would be difficult to find a more vigilant guardian of public property than Prof. Fletcher or a more faithful and conscientious visitor than Prof. Lord or wiser counselors than were both of them.
