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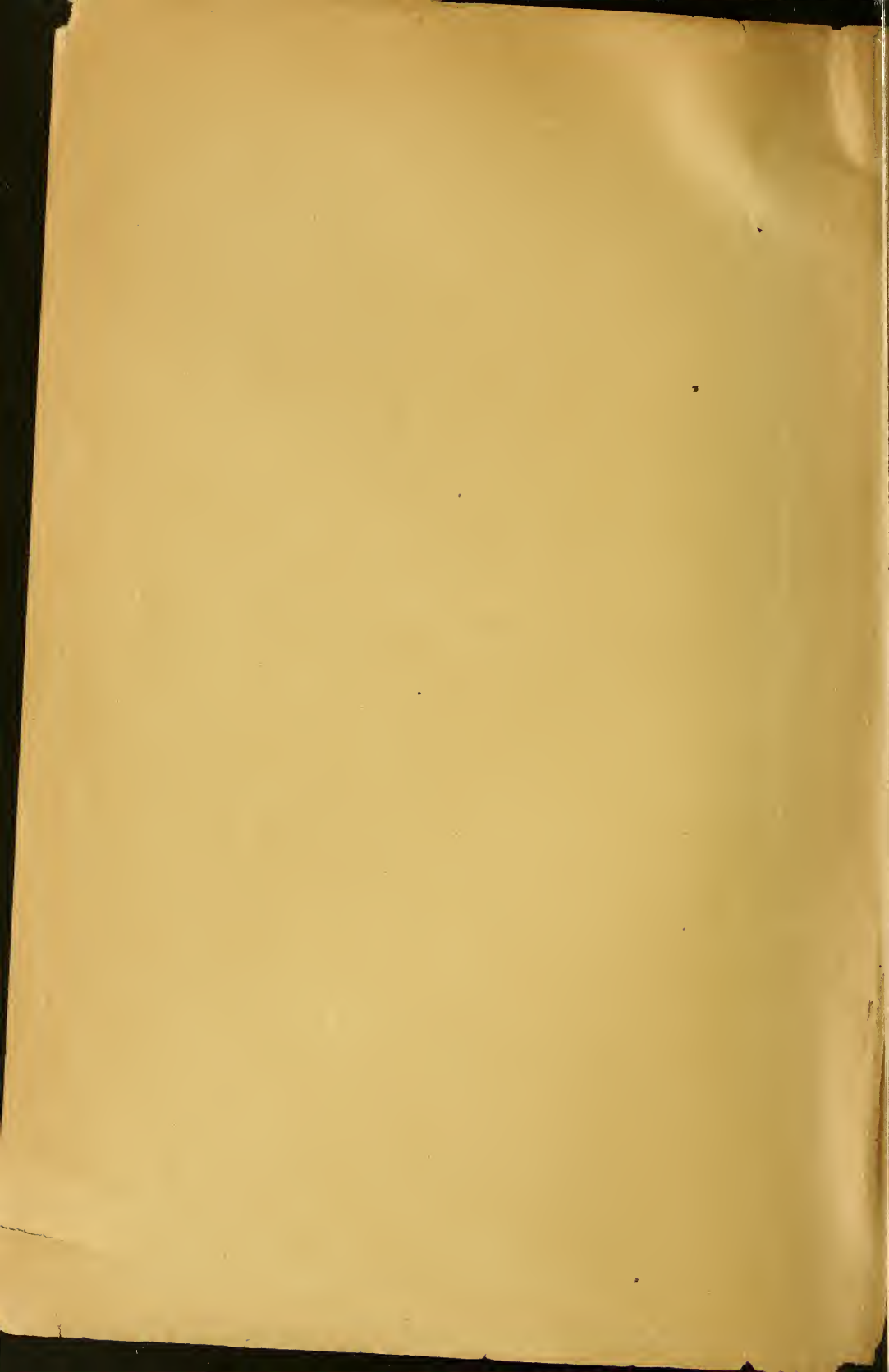

To the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs, you are hereby notified to meet in the Hall of C. W. Hayes in said town on the second Tuesday of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose by ballot and major vote a town clerk.

2d. To choose by ballot and major vote three selectmen and all necessary town officers.

3d. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor.

4th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools.

5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways, for laying out and constructing highways.

6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for other necessary town charges.

7th. To see if the town will vote to sell the town farm or pass any vote in relation thereto. On petition of Asa W. Fellows and others.

8th. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto, and transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

On motion—Voted that the commissioners of the Hanover Center Cemetery association are hereby authorized to lay out the unoccupied portion of the cemetery at Hanover Center into suitable lots for burial purposes, and make such rules and regulations as may be necessary in regard to the same subject to the approval of the selectmen.

On motion—Voted to elect three library trustees, one for one year, one for two years, one for three years, which was done as follows:

Library trustee for one year, Charles F. Richardson; for two years, Asa W. Fellows; for three years, Horace F. Hoyt.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES.

The Hanover Free Library was opened to the public Feb. 4, 1899. More than fifty people were present on the opening day, and the library has since been well patronized. The books belonging to the Etna library were consolidated with the books furnished by the town and state, making a total of about 400 volumes, with Thomas W. Praddex as librarian. The state donation consisted of one hundred well-chosen volumes, of an aggregate net value of one hundred dollars; about fifty volumes, including the latest and most useful cyclopaedia, were purchased from the town appropriation; and Mr. Edward P. Storrs generously donated books to the amount of ten dollars, besides enabling the trustees to purchase other works on very advantageous terms.

The data given for the winter term does not correctly represent the work of that term, since that work is not finished. The work of the spring term, to a large degree, represents that of another administration, three of our teachers having left us at the close of that term.

Such figures as the above, to be of value, need to be analyzed and compared with similar figures for preceeding years. Such an analysis, taking fall terms as our standard of comparison, shows that the total number of pupils is less than for the past two years. The average number belonging is 17 less than last year, or a loss of over 9 per cent. This decrease is divided among the four upper schools, the first primary department having increased in numbers slightly. The average attendance is 13 less than last year, or a loss of 7 per cent. Year before last the average attendance was 73 per cent. of the total number enrolled, last year 87 per cent. and this year 86 per cent. The number not absent during the term has increased, the Intermediate school showing a large proportion of this gain. The number of visits by friends has also ma-

terially increased, indicating a gratifying interest in the general welfare of the schools. An interest thus indicated inspires both pupils and teachers to better work.

The teachers have all worked earnestly and devotedly to promote the best interests of their departments, and have not limited themselves to the prescribed hours to accomplish this purpose. They have held monthly meetings for the purpose of discussing matters pertaining to the best interests of the schools as a whole. A commendable unity of purpose and amity in action have actuated their efforts, resulting in a better spirit, better discipline and better scholarship among their pupils.

We regretted exceedingly our inability to retain the services of Messrs. Poor and Ham in the High school, as they had proved themselves competent and faithful instructors, and in such cases changes are to be deprecated. It is not an easy matter, with the means at our command, to satisfactorily fill the position of High school principal. After some correspondence and a personal interview we selected the present incumbent, Mr. J. W. Hewitt. He came to us highly recommended as a scholar and one who had attained success as a teacher. He has done excellent work, managing with ease and inspiring in the pupils a genuine spirit of study. In addition to his duties as principal of the High school we have added that of principal of all the schools in the building.

Mr. Geo. L. Farley takes the place of Mr. Ham as the instructor furnished by Moor's Charity School. Nominally the representative of this school should give instruction in Greek and Latin, mainly to those taking fourth-year work. Mr. Hewitt preferred the courses in language and Mr. Farley those in mathematics and sciences. By making this change we were enabled to secure specialists in these departments and better instruction in Chemistry and Physics wherein we have heretofore lacked. Mr. Farley has labored earnestly and faithfully to promote thorough scholarship in his department and with marked success.

In the Primary school Miss Dora B. Tuson takes the place of Miss Martin. Miss Tuson came to us highly recommended, having received a normal school training in addition to a full high school course. It is universally acknowledged, we believe, that she is doing most excellent work, making this grade a better part in a symmetrical whole.

While it is natural to dwell upon the work of new instructors, the superior work of our old teachers has always been fully appreciated by all friends of the school.

The following data may be of interest, indicating more definitely the character of the work of the High school:

Five members of the High school are taking so-called post-graduate or fourth-year work, all of them young ladies, four of whom, at least, expect to enter college.

A diploma is now given only to those members of the High school who complete regular and prescribed courses of study, the number taking such courses during the past year has been as follows:

In the entering class	12
In the second-year class	11
In the senior class	3

This is eleven less than the number taking such courses last year, a decrease of 30 per cent. The above number 26 is only 56 per cent. of the whole High school. As the classes advance the number taking full courses rapidly decreases. These facts are to be deprecated. As stated last year, the work of the school is hampered by those who do not conform to any regular course of study. The principal finds it very difficult to give such members work enough to keep them profit-

ably employed. A regular course in the end is of more value to the student and more satisfactory to him. No schools of good standing now give diplomas for any but regular courses of study. Your committee, with the means at their command, cannot furnish an increased number of courses.

By the terms of the agreement made with the President of Moor's Charity School, that institution was allowed to place in the High school a limited number of pupils, acceptable to your committee. In accordance with the terms of that compact, the first year there were two pupils, last year one, and this year none. This year the above school has furnished daily, for five days in the week, four periods of instruction of forty-five minutes each, and, as will be seen above, without any immediate return therefor. Evidently the district is reaping very largely the benefits resulting from the compact.

The courses in Physics and Chemistry are better than they have been in previous years, still not what they might be with better appliances, nor what they ought to be to properly fit young men for the Chandler Course in Dartmouth College.

As anticipated in our last report, three young men from our High school entered the Classical Course of Dartmouth College and two young ladies Mt. Holyoke College at the beginning of the present college year, and so far as we are able to determine, are doing satisfactory and creditable work. Parents have an opportunity to fit their boys and girls for college here at home if they desire it, and are willing to assist the instructors in keeping them at work with a definite purpose.

In the lower schools we have introduced, during the past year, a special course in nature study. A good deal of attention is now being given in the public schools to this matter and with great advantage in enlarging the vision of the youthful eye and mind.

Our library is still doing a good work in its place, affording valuable reading matter to many who would not otherwise have an opportunity to get it. In order to increase its efficiency we would suggest a small appropriation again this year.

The number of scholars paying tuition is less than last year, 15 as compared with 19, but the amount of tuition received therefor has increased from about \$220 in 1897 to about \$247 in 1898 due to longer attendance and to the fact that there is a larger proportion of the whole number in the High school.
