## REPORT

Of the Superintending School Committee of Hanover, for the year ending March 7, 1870.

The Superintending School Committee respectfully present the following report :

General Report of Schools in District No. 1, by their Superintending Committee :

The pupils of this district are graded so far as two schools during each term of the year will permit. The pupils of the higher grade in age and advancement were under the instruction of Miss Annette Kimball during the Summer and Autumn Terms. Miss Kimball is a faithful teacher, but the school is a difficult one and it was felt to be desirable that it should be under the care of a gentleman teacher during the remaining term, and accordingly Mr. Frank A. Sherman from the College was employed, with very satisfactory success, during the winter.

The grade of younger pupils has throughout the year been under the charge of Miss L. R. Hurlburt, who has secured in a remarkable degree the love and improvement of her pupils.

The great need in this district are different and decent school-rooms.

The greatest number of pupils in the school of higher grade has been fifty-four, average attendance, thirty. In the school of lower grade the largest number in attendance has been forty-three, average attendance, twenty-nine. The amount of money paid to teachers for the year, \$561.

DISTRICT No. 2. Summer Term, 10 weeks. Miss Sarah W. Hurlbutt, teacher. Wages \$16. She fully sustained her former good reputation as a faithful and efficient teacher and manager.

Fall Term, 8 weeks. Miss Lucy E. Chandler. Wages \$16. She has evidently been faithful and judicious. Scholars 8. Average  $6\frac{1}{2}$ .

DISTRICT No. 3. Summer Term, 8 weeks. Mrs. Mary C. Stickney, teacher. Wages \$14.

Winter Term, 8 weeks. Miss Emily Liscomb, teacher. Wages \$26. Mrs. Stickney and Miss Liscomb are two of our best teachers; prompt, energetic and skillful. Under their management and instruction the school has made good progress. Scholars, 18. Average, 13. In Latin, 2; Algebra, 3; Geometry, 4.

DISTRICT No. 4. Miss Emily Owen taught 10 weeks in summer and 11 in the autumn. Wages \$18. It was her first attempt. Her success was very good indeed.

In winter Mr. M. A. G. Meads was employed 10 weeks. Wages \$33. His instructions were very thorough and successful. Few schools do better than No. 4 has the past year. Scholars, 24. Average, 21.

DISTRICT No. 5. Miss Mary Ingalls was employed for the year, 28 weeks. Succeeded very well, though her task was unusually hard in the winter. The school was large and some of the

scholars needed to be watched closely. Wages \$25. Scholars, 42. Average, 34.

DISTRICT No. 6. Summer Term 11 weeks. Winter Term 10 weeks. The summer term was commenced by Miss Susie A. Gillette, who left the school after teaching three weeks. The remainder of the term and the winter term was taught by Miss Lizzie Kimball, who quietly and pleasantly managed and taught her little charge. Wages 23½. Scholars, 9. Average, 6.

DISTRICT No. 7. Summer Term, 9 weeks. Fall Term, 8 weeks. Winter Term, 8 weeks.

This school during these several terms has been under the care and instruction of Miss Eliza E. Hoyt Wages \$21. Miss Hoyt has won a good reputation as a teacher. Progress of the school good; recitations prompt; behavior in the school room and at recess very commendable. Scholars, 25. Average, 16. In Philosophy, 2.

DISTRICT No. 8. Miss G. L. Arven was employed in summer, 8 weeks. Wages 16. Succeeded well. Miss O. T. Hatch 8 weeks in winter and gave good satisfaction. Scholars, 7. Average, 6.

DISTRICT No. 9. Miss L. M. Stickney, was employed 11 weeks in summer and the little school appeared to have done well.

Miss M. E. Benton taught 10 weeks in Autumn and closed without our knowledge. Wages \$11. Scholars, 5. Average 2½.

DISTRICT No. 10. Miss H. L. Eaton taught 10 weeks in summer with good success. Miss E. A. Liscomb, 11 weeks in autumn, doing very well indeed. The school house is very poor. Wages 14½. Scholars, 12. Average, 10.

DISTRICT No. 11. Miss Carrie Blaisdell did excellent service in this district for both terms. Wages \$16. Scholars, 9. Average, 5.

DISTRICT No. 12. Summer Term, 10 weeks. Miss Laura E. Tilton, teacher. Wages \$18. The school appeared well for management, government, promptness in recitation and in progress.

Winter Term, 12 weeks. Miss Louise M. Goss, teacher. Wages \$20. This school appeared well in recitation and deportment. Miss Goss is prompt and energetic in the school-room; and hence awakens earnestness and effort on the part of her pupils. Scholars 33. Average 24 1-2. In Philosophy 1.

DISTRICT No. 13. Summer Term, 9 weeks. Miss Fanny G. Hurlburt, teacher. Wages \$17. Miss Hurlburt ranks among our best qualified and efficient teachers. Her school appeared well; progress good for so short a term.

Winter Term, 12 weeks. Miss Ellen J. Bailey, teacher. Wages \$24. Miss Bailey is an experienced and well qualified teacher; progress generally commendable; a marked progress in some classes. Scholars, 21. Average, 13. Algebra, 1. Philosophy, 2.

DISTRICT No. 14. Summer Term, 9 weeks. Winter Term, 6 weeks. Miss Laura A. Storrs, teacher. Wages \$18. This school of small scholars was faithfully taught, and judiciously and pleasantly managed. Scholars, 10. Average, 8.

DISTRICT No. 15. Summer Term, 8 weeks. Winter Term, 6½ weeks. Wages \$16. This school has been under the instruction of Miss Ada I. Kinne, who has fully sustained her former good reputation as a teacher. Scholars, 13. Average, 7.

DISTRICT No. 16. Two Misses Tilton taught the first term and they ever do well.

Miss L. M. Talbert was employed 8 weeks in winter. The school appeared well. Wages \$14. Scholars, 9. Average, 6.

DISTRICT No. 17. Miss L. A. Camp taught 8 weeks in Summer with good success, and Miss J. C. Tilton 16 weeks in winter.

Wages \$22. Miss T. exerted herself greatly and succeeded well, but her success would have been greater, but for one or two large boys. Scholars, 10. Average, 8.

DISTRICT No. 18. This school, though small, was a decided success under Miss C. Blaisdell. Sickness also injured it some. Wages \$22. Scholars, 6. Average,  $5\frac{1}{2}$ .

Our Public Schools the past year have been under the instruction and management of 32 teachers; males 2, females 30.

Whole number of weeks of school 368; averaging to each district 20 4-9 weeks. Whole number of scholars 385; average attendance 253.

Whole amount expended for the schools including board given \$2448 40 averaging to each scholar about \$6 53.

These schools with very few exceptions have been well managed and the instruction has been able and faithful. Not that every teacher is a well qualified instructor and prepared to teach and manage any of our schools; but there are those who are qualified sufficiently to teach a small school of small scholars, who would not be thought adequate to the instruction and management of some other school.

Our Public Schools have, for a few years past, been taking a higher grade of character.

There has evidently been an improvement in reading. The monotonous tone has been corrected by the more proper modulations of voice. By the proper emphasis and inflections of voice the reader is taught to give the sense of what he reads.

By thoroughness in passing along there has been less necessity for review of studies. Hence one term has not been so much spent in the review of what had been gone over in the past. The classes in the different studies have therefore passed onward, to the closing up of the common branches.

Algebra, History, Geometry, Philosophy and other higher

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branches of study are now more common in the schools or, if the more forward scholars leave the common school for the Academy, they are prepared to commence these higher branches at once, and go on to a completion of a thorough business education.

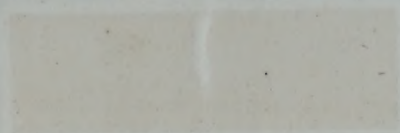
The Committee would therefore earnestly recommend that the districts employ teachers qualified for their work; also those of desirable refinement of manners and conversation.

This duty in relation to our schools depends more upon the Prudential than upon the Superintending Committee. The latter committee is often embarrassed by what the former has done.

We would also call attention to the list of books recommended that the schools may be furnished with suitable books and uniformity be secured.

The books recommended are: Town's and Holbrook's Progressive Readers and Speller, Weld & Quackenbos' and Tower's small Grammar, Arithmetics, Adam's and Greenleaf's National; Colburn's and Emerson's Mental; Quackenbos' History of the United States, (small and large); Geography, Guyot's Series; Algebra, Robinson's Elementary, Book-keeping, Mayhew's; Cutter's Physiology.
