BOARD OF EDUCATION OF DISTRICT NO. 1

During the past year the same teachers who taught during the preceding year have been retained and have taught with acceptance to the Board. It is hardly necessary to state that, with tried and experienced teachers, the schools have improved.

There has been no essential change in the schedule of studies since the reports of 1894 and 1895.

The school library has proved as useful and helpful as heretofore, as an auxiliary to the work of the schools. The small amount voted for its maintenance and enlargement confers benefits which cannot be expressed in money value.

The District has had to face the fact, during the past two or three years, that the schoolhouse no longer provides adequate and suitable accommodations for the pupils. Built in 1877, by an appropriation of \$10,000 for land, building and all furnishings, the house gave at that time more than ample accommodations, and at a cost considerably less than adjoining towns have paid for the same or but little better facilities. But the needs of our schools have increased far beyond what was thought possible nineteen years ago. After long continued over-crowding in the two lower schools the Board was forced to take immediate action last autumn. The teachers could not successfully teach from 55 to 63 scholars in a single room, and sanitary considerations forbade the continuance of such a condition. The District then authorized the Board to organize a younger primary school. The Precinct Hall was temporarily fitted up for this purpose at small expense. Miss Mary A. Downing was engaged as a teacher. She has done earnest and faithful work, and, in a short expe-

rience, has displayed the qualities which go to make the successful teacher.

In the three lower schools the total attendance has been 113, and in all the schools as high as 183. None of the present school rooms are adapted for more than 40 pupils in each one. The high school has almost reached that number. The highest *average* for the five schools has been 37.

At a special school-meeting the District authorized the Board to further perfect plans and specifications then submitted for an addition to the present building; such addition to be planned to provide at least two additional school-rooms, a more ample hallway, giving also better and safer access to the assembly room, and convenient cloak rooms. These plans and specifications, with estimates, will be submitted at the annual school-meeting of the District this month.

The same janitor who has already served the District for so many years has had charge of the building and of the new school-room during the past year. As heretofore, the health and comfort of the schools are due in no small degree to the cleanliness and good order which he has maintained with conscientious care and attention.

TOWN DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD

At your last annual school meeting four hundred dollars extra school money was raised. If you will compare with last year's report you will see a vast increase in schooling as a result. Taking thirty weeks as a basis we have given all schools needing it that amount, while in those districts where less weeks were given, nearly all the pupils were provided for in some other district. Our teachers on the whole have worked hard and faithfully, giving good satisfaction in nearly every school. In Nos. 1 and 9 a large part of the board was given, in No. 1 by parents, and in No. 9 by the teacher, thus giving them thirty-six and forty-one weeks respectively. If other districts should see fit to follow their example there seems to be no reason why our schools cannot equal or excel in length those of other wide awake towns. We are glad to note a generally increased interest in this question of schools. They are the very foundations of our nation's future.

Visitors have been more frequent in some schools, but it does seem strange that parents do not take more interest in their children's school life.

We should like to see the ladies at school meetings.

4th. 5th. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
