To the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre in said Hanover on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for one year.

Second: To hear the report of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, and other town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third: To choose by ballot

To serve for one year

One Treasurer

Two Auditors

Three Fence Viewers

Two Surveyors of Wood and Lumber

Fourth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Fifth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

ANDREW B. ELDER, HORACE E. HURLBUTT, Selectmen of Hanover, New Hampshire. ABSTRACT FROM THE TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, March 12, 1935 the meeting was called to order by Archie M. Gile, Moderator, pro tem, who read the Warrant.

The Town Report was accepted as printed.

Elections:

For three years:

Horace E. Hurlbutt, Selectman.L. Morse Merritt, Library Trustee.Halsey C. Edgerton, Trustee of Trust Funds.Thomas E. Ward, Member of the Advisory Board.

For one year:

L. Leroy Blodgett, Town Clerk.

Alfred W. Guyer, Treasurer.

David C. Rennie and Earle C. Gordon, Auditors.

James Spencer, Daniel O. Hoyt, and William H. Hart, Fence Viewers.

John A. Humiston and William H. Hart, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

Arthur P. Fairfield, Prosecuting Agent to prosecute Violations of the Liquor Laws.

Voted: To take up Article VII.

Article VII: A motion was made by George A. Porter duly seconded, that we appropriate at the meeting \$7,000.00 to fix the worse places on the Star Mail Route out of Etna with the proper kind of material so that it would be permanent so we will not have to fix it next year.

On motion made by M. B. Perkins duly seconded, it was moved that this motion be amended to give the Selectmen the power to determine what improvements shall be made on the Star Mail Route with power to expend what money seems right and proper to accomplish this purpose. Yes, 136. No, 8. Motion carried. The vote on the motion as amended was Yes, 119, No. 2. Motion carried.

*Voted*: That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll Taxes provided by law, the Town raise the sum of twenty-seven thousand nine hundred and twenty-two (\$27,922.00) dollars and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the treasury, and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended, in accordance with the budget and report as presented by the Selectmen.

Voted: To pass over Article V.

Voted: To pass over Article VI.

*Voted*: To discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars all that portion, which has not previously been thrown up, of the highway leading easterly across the brook to the Monahan Place, so-called, from the Etna-Hanover Center highway at a point southerly from the Harry Thornton residence and of the highway laid out in 1785 from the Chandler Farm in the Arvin District to the Benjamin Hatch or Monahan place.

*Voted*: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of three percent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15, 1935 and the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Town's obligations until the taxes have been collected and paid into the Treasury.

*Voted*: That when this meeting adjourns it be to meet at the Municipal Court Room, Municipal Building, Hanover, New Hampshire on Monday, May 20, 1935, at 7:30 P. M. Eastern Standard Time.

At the Adjourned Meeting of November 26, 1935, it was

*Voted*: That the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to take the necessary steps to obtain a grant under the National Industrial Recovery Act, in addition to any and all grant payments made or to be made under the grant agreement executed under date of December 6, 1934, between the United States of America and the Town of Hanover, New Hampshire, the Town of Norwich, Vermont, the State of New Hampshire, and the State of Vermont, in connection with the construction of a bridge across the Connecticut River between the towns of Hanover, New Hampshire, and Norwich, Vermont, known as P. W. A. docket No. 5395-9088 and 9088-5395; and in this connection to execute and file in behalf of the town (alone or in conjunction with the Town of Norwich, Vermont) an application to the United States of America for such additional grant, and/or execute in behalf of the town any grant agreement or other instrument, and/or amend, supplement or waive any provision of any grant agreement heretofore or hereafter executed in behalf of the town, and to do all other acts or things necessary or convenient to effect the purposes of this vote.

#### At the Adjourned Meeting of December 2, 1935 it was

*Voted*: That the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to borrow in behalf of the Town not exceeding six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) to pay the four (4) Ledyard Free Bridge bonds of the Town maturing December 1, 1935 and to pay the cost of completing the new Ledvard Free Bridge between the Towns of Hanover, New Hampshire, and Norwich, Vermont, and incidental expenses, and that for this purpose the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to execute, and that the Treasurer be and he hereby is authorized to countersign in behalf of the Town five (5) notes for one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each, due December 1, 1936, December 1, 1937, December 1, 1938, December 1, 1939 and December 1, 1940, respectively, and a note or notes for any additional amount or amounts borrowed under the authority of this vote due December 1, 1941; and further, that the Selectmen shall have full discretion to determine the rate of interest to be paid on and the place of payment of the notes issued under the authority of this vote, and they are hereby authorized to do all other acts or things necessary or convenient to effect the purposes of this vote.

*Voted*: That the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to build in conjunction with the State of New Hampshire or with the State of New Hampshire and the Works Progress Administration a bridge on the Mount Support Road at the general location of the present bridge over Mink Brook.

To pay for Hanover's share of the cost of building said Bridge the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to borrow in behalf of the Town not exceeding four thousand dollars (\$4,000), and that for this purpose the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to execute, and the Treasurer be and he hereby is authorized to countersign in behalf of the Town four (4) notes for one thousand (\$1,000) each, due December 1, 1942, December 1, 1943, December 1, 1944, and December 1, 1945, respectively; and further, that the Selectmen shall have full discretion to determine the rate of interest to be paid on and the place of payment of the notes issued under the authority of this vote, and they are hereby authorized to do all other acts or things necessary or convenient to effect the purposes of this vote.

On October 8, 1935 Perley R. Bugbee died. He had been a member of the Committee since its organization. He had been constant in his attendance at meetings; and his long experience, coupled with his prudence and sagacity, had made him a most useful member. This service adds another to the already long list of valuable ones rendered by him to this community. We, his colleagues, sincerely mourn his loss.

Mr. Halsey C. Edgerton was appointed by the Moderators to complete Mr. Bugbee's unexpired term.

#### HIGH SCHOOL AND LEDYARD BRIDGE

For two and one-half years these two projects have been occupying the attention of the citizens of Hanover, as well as the time and thought of the School Board, the Building Committee of the School District, the Selectmen, and the Finance Committee.

It is very doubtful if the amount of work which is devoted to such undertakings by public officers—mostly unpaid, at least in such places as this—is realized or appreciated. Yet it is due to such patient attention that the taxpayers' secure a dollar's worth for a dollar spent, as we believe they surely have in these two structures.

The year 1935 marked the completion of both, and they are now in use; a complete financial statement of the cost of each will be deferred until next year's report, because in neither case has final settlement been made with the United States government, although the unsettled balances are small.

But some approximately correct figures may be of interest.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

In our report for 1934 the estimated cost of the High School was stated as follows:

These figures are on the assumption that a sum of about \$4,000 not yet received from the Federal government will in due time come in; if it does not, the figures will need revision to that extent, but in any event, it is plain that the estimate of net cost to Hanover has been closely adhered to, and that the unexpectedly large grant from the Government has gone into the building. Of course the chief reason for the increase in the grant was the rise in price of materials after the date of the original estimates.

All of the above figures include equipment.

#### LEDYARD BRIDGE

The total cost of the bridge was substantially in excess of the original estimates, again largely due to increased costs of materials, but due to the increase in the Federal grant and to the additional \$10,000 received from the State of New Hampshire by special act of the 1935 Legislature, the total net cost to the taxpayers of Hanover is slightly below the original figures.

We shall be paying for these projects in installments, until 1954, as more fully shown in our report for 1935.

#### **Results of Tax Year 1935**

The Precinct Commissioners again lived within their budget. It is expected that the School Board, whose fiscal year does not end until June 30, will do the same.

Due to an increase in the State Tax of \$1,500, an increase in the County Tax of about \$2,200 and an increase in expenditures for Relief of \$2,000, the Selectmen overran their budget by about \$4,000, despite an increase in receipts from the Income and Dividends Tax of about \$1,600.

Of the above four items, the first, second and fourth are entirely beyond the control of the Selectmen; who are thus always at a disadvantage in making up their annual budget figures.

Rather than raise the tax rate above the figure of \$1.17 announced in February 1935, this deficiency has been financed by the issuance of four notes for \$1,000 each, maturing in the years 1936-1939.

#### ESTIMATES FOR 1936

During the past two months, the Committee, according to its usual practice, has devoted the time of several long meetings to consideration of the budgets submitted by the Selectmen, the Precinct Commissioners, and the School Board.

After some modifications which have been made as a result of these sessions, the budgets, as printed under this same cover, have all been approved.

If accepted by the voters, they will result in the tax rates for 1936 shown in the right-hand column below.

If the School Board receives an additional sum of about \$4,000 from the Federal government, of which there is a fair expectation, then the rates for 1936 will be as follows:

The reason for the drop in the School tax rate is not a decrease in the regular annual budget, but because unexpectedly large sums received from the U. S. government can be applied to retirement of bonds maturing in 1936, so reducing the amount necessary to be raised by taxation for that purpose.

This is only a "breathing-spell" and the school district tax rate may be expected to rise again in 1937.

#### STATE AND COUNTY TAXES

A large part-increasingly large-of the Town budget goes every year for State and County Taxes.

An examination of these figures for the past few years will disclose some important trends, which are not reassuring.

The curve is upward, and will probably continue to be so. The State Tax for 1936 is fixed, unless it is changed by a special session of the Legislature.

We have estimated the County Tax at \$21,000, a much larger figure than ever before.

So we expect these two items to amount to \$37,500 this year, as against \$24,200 only five years ago; an increase of over 50%.

The answer is "Relief". Unless the still rising tide of relief expenditures turns very soon, the situation will be very serious.

Also it is certain that Federal taxes, direct and indirect, are soon bound to increase steeply, unless the country travels the still more dangerous road of inflation.

A community made up so largely of salaried people, as is Hanover, is going to be hard hit by increasing county, state and federal taxes.

We must, therefore, continue to practice rigid economy in our local affairs.

It is believed that there are no extravagant or unnecessary items in the budgets, and none except those already referred to seem to call for special mention.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

#### HANOVER TOWN LIBRARY

The past year has been one of change and activity in our library work and program. The position of Librarian was made vacant on September 25, 1935 by the death of Mrs. Frank G. Emerson who had served in that capacity since 1929. We have also lost two other loyal friends in the library in the deaths of Professor Robert Fletcher, trustee since the origin of the library in 1905 until his resignation in 1934; and also Mrs. Nettie J. Praddex, librarian from 1910 to 1929. We are deeply indebted to these three, for all their devoted interest in the work of our library. They have left us a sacred trust; may we be faithful to that trust.

On October 8, 1935, Miss Kathrina Spencer of Etna, N. H., was appointed to fill the vacant position of librarian. Mrs. L. M. Merritt was appointed as the assistant librarian. The vacancy on the Trustee Board has remained unfilled, awaiting action by the voters at the annual Town Meeting.

On October 18, 1935, Miss Dorothy Annable, Secretary of the Public Library Commission at Concord, paid us a visit and sat in on a meeting with the trustees and our newly appointed librarian. Her counsel and suggestions on various matters were valuable and deeply appreciated. Miss Pratt, Field Worker of the Public Library Commission, spent parts of three days with Miss Spencer late in October, assisting her in sorting and re-arranging the books in their proper classification on the shelves. Miss Spencer and Mrs. Merritt continued with this work during the Fall. There is more to be done before this task is completed. Miss Pratt also gave our librarian much help and instruction in the more modern and practical methods of library administration.

A new card system for circulating the books has been introduced. This has greatly added to the efficiency of the library as well as for the convenience of the borrowers. Miss Spencer gave some time and thought to the observance of Book Week in November. This was especially helpful to the school children.

The largest number of books circulated on any one library day

was one hundred and five. The average for each library day through the year was thirty-six. The magazines are popular with the reading public and always in demand. We hope to add some others in the coming year. The Hanover Gazette is received weekly.

Some new equipment has been added. A new nine drawer card catalogue has been purchased to replace the four drawer one which we have outgrown. The gift of an interior bulletin board, made and installed by Mr. Harley Camp is deeply appreciated.

Our property is in good repair; the annual cleaning, and varnishing of the floor and large table was done in June.

An experiment has been in progress for the past few months. That is, having the library open one night a week. This has never been done before, but had been requested by some, so it seemed advisable to give it a try. Thus, the privileges of the library have been made available to a group of residents who are away all day and found it impossible to ever spend any time in the library. The results have been gratifying, and it seems advisable to continue with this plan, on Wednesday evenings from seven to eight-thirty o'clock.

The library is well patronized and seems to be appreciated in the community.

Article 5: Voted: That the Village Precinct of Hanover, New Hampshire, raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000.00) to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the year ending January 31, 1936 according to the items set forth in the budget.

Article 6: Voted: To adopt an act of the Legislature known as House Bill No. 348, dated March 26, 1935 and titled "An act relating to the powers of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H."

Article 7: Voted: To authorize the Precinct Commissioners to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Precinct's obligations until the taxes are collected and paid into the Treasury of the Precinct.

Voted: That upon all taxes on real estate and personal property a discount of three percent (3%) be allowed the taxpayer if paid on or before July 15, 1935.

Voted: That the Precinct, by a rising vote, express to Mr. Norton its appreciation of his services for the past six years.

There being no more business to come before the meeting it was voted to adjourn.

The Fire Department wishes officially to thank the American Legion for the Air Line Mask which they gave to the Department.

The real estate property loss in the town was approximately \$92,000.00. The assessed value is \$5,503,389.00. Thus the fire loss was approximately 1.67%.

During the past year a large expenditure was incurred in renovating the fire alarm system and bringing it to a state of modern efficiency. It is planned to extend the alarm system service by the installation of additional call boxes in the near future to make possible more ample protection.

The attention of all residents is called to the Fire Department Regulations, Sections 1-15, contained in the By-laws and Regulations of the Precinct. A copy of these may be obtained at the Town Clerk's office.

Plans for building inspection are under way. Special attention will be given to chimneys, fireplaces, location and type of incinerators, furnace to chimney connections and basement conditions.

It will be appreciated if all will inspect their premises to see if they comply with the conditions specified in the Regulations, and correct those situations which are not conforming.

#### PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL MEETING

Hanover, New Hampshire, March 21, 1935.

The annual meeting of Hanover School District was called to order at seven and one-half o'clock in the evening at Grade School Hall by the Moderator, William H. Murray. Articles of the warrant which had been duly posted according to law, were read by the Clerk, Raymond B. Baird.

Article I: William H. Murray was elected Moderator for the ensuing year and was duly sworn before assuming office.

Article II: Raymond B. Baird was elected Clerk and was duly sworn before assuming office. Alfred W. Guyer was reelected Treasurer as was Earle C. Gordon as Auditor.

Article III: Robert J. Putnam, Nathaniel A. Emerson, F. Manning Moody were re-elected members of the Board of Education, each for a term of three years.

Article IV: On the motion of Arthur H. Chivers, duly seconded, it was voted to accept the annual report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, as printed and placed on file. Voted to accept and place on file the report of the Building Committee as read by the Chairman, Francis J. Neef.

Article V: Voted: That articles V and VI be considered together.

Articles V and VI: Voted: That the District raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law, together with the unexpended balance and the receipts of the department \$59,-425.00 for school purposes as follows: \$11,000.00 for the payment of Bonds, \$210.00 for the salaries of Board and other officers, and \$48,215.00 for general expenses and improvements as set forth in the budget.

Article VII: Voted: That the Building Committee heretofore in charge of the construction of the new school building is hereby continued in office with full authority to complete the construction of said building and to furnish and equip the same, except that all money will be handled by the Treasurer of the District and bills paid by him on the approval of the Committee.

Voted: That for the purpose of financing in part the cost of completing the construction of, equipping and/or furnishing the new school building, the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,-000.00) or such part thereof as the School Board of the District in its discretion shall deem necessary, is hereby raised and appropriated, in addition to the amounts heretofore raised and appropriated to build and equip said new school building, said sum to be raised by the issue and sale of notes of the School District of an aggregate principal amount of not exceeding twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00), said notes to be issued in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended, to be payable in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended, the first payment to be not later than one (1) year and the last payment to be not later than five (5) years after the date thereof; and subject to said Chapter 59 of the Public Laws and to the foregoing limitations, the School Board of the District is hereby given full power and authority to determine the denominations, the form of said notes, the time and place of payment of principal and interest and the rate of interest and to arrange for, negotiate and effect the issuance and sale of said notes. The School Board of the District, or a majority thereof, is hereby authorized to sign and affix the seal of the District to said notes and the Treasurer to countersign the same.

Voted: That any balance of the grant payment due from the United States of America under the loan and grant agreement between this District and the United States of America dated March 12, 1934, as amended by supplemental agreement approved by the School Board of the District on January 21, 1935, that may be paid in cash, not needed to complete the construction of, to equip and/or to furnish the new school building by reason of the fact that funds therefore have been provided by the issue and sale of notes under the next preceding vote, is hereby appropriated, to the extent that the United States of America consents thereto, to the payment of notes issued and sold under the next preceding vote, and the Treasurer and other officers of the District are hereby authorized and instructed to take all necessary action to effect this result.

Article VIII: Voted: That the School Board be, and hereby are, authorized to sell at public or private sale, when in their judgment it is for the best interests of the District to do so, the land on the north side of Allen Street, formerly occupied by the old Grade School; and the building and land on the south side of Allen Street now occupied as the High School; and the land known as the playground on the south side of Allen Street, east of Prospect Street, and north of Maple Street; and the house and land on the north side of Maple Street known as 13 Maple Street; and that the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer of the District be, and hereby are, authorized to execute the deed or deeds thereof.

Article IX: Voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of 3% be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15, 1935.

Voted: That when this meeting adjourns it be to meet at Grade School Hall in the Village of Hanover, New Hampshire on Monday, April 22, 1935 at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Voted: To adjourn at 8:40 o'clock in the evening.

Adjourned Meeting of Hanover School District was held in the Grade School Hall in the Village of Hanover, N. H., at 7:30 P. M., Eastern Standard Time. Meeting called to order by the Moderator William H. Murray. In the absence of R. B. Baird, Clerk, Theodore E. Bacon was elected and duly sworn in as Clerk Pro. Tem.

Records of Adjourned Meeting of May 20, 1935, were read and approved.

After some preliminary explanation, A. H. Chivers presented the following motions which were unanimously carried as read:

Voted: That (1) the vote of the District passed at the session of the annual meeting held on the twenty-first day of March, 1935, raising and appropriating the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) or such part thereof as the School Board in its discretion shall deem necessary for the purpose of financing in part the cost of completing the construction of, equipping and/or furnishing the new school building, and (2) the vote of the District passed at said session of the 1935 annual meeting appropriating a portion of the grant payment due from the United States of America to the purchase of notes issued and sold under the vote hereinabove referred to, be and the same hereby are rescinded.

Voted: That for the purpose of financing in part the cost of completing the construction of, equipping and/or furnishing the new school building, and any grading, sidewalk, legal, administrative or other expenses incidental thereto, the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) or such part thereof as the Building Committee of the District in its discretion shall deem necessary, is hereby raised and appropriated, in addition to the amounts heretofore raised and appropriated to build and equip said new building, said sum to be raised by the issue and sale of notes of the School District of an aggregate principal amount of not exceeding twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00), said notes to be issued in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended, to be payable in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire as amended, the first payment to be not later than one (1) year and the last payment to be not later than (5) five years after the date thereof; and subject to said Chapter 59 of the Public Laws and to the foregoing limitations, the School Board

of the District is hereby given full power and authority to determine the denominations, the form of said notes, the time and place of payment of principal and interest and the rate of interest and to arrange for, negotiate and effect the issuance and sale of said notes. The School Board of the District, or a majority thereof, is hereby authorized to sign and affix the seal of the District to said notes and the Treasurer to countersign the same.

Voted: That in addition to the amounts heretofore raised and appropriated to build, equip and/or furnish the school building. the first seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000.00) of any balance of any grant payment due from the United States of America, under any grant agreement between the District and the United States of America not heretofore appropriated to the payment of the cost of constructing, equipping and/or furnishing the new school building, that may be paid in cash or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be used to pay any note or notes issued and sold under the next preceding vote, that five thousand dollars (\$5.000.00) thereof shall be used to purchase or pay bonds heretofore issued by the School District, that so much of the balance thereof and of any grant money received in cash from the United States of America in excess of fifty-two thousand dollars (\$52,-000.00) not needed for any of the foregoing purposes as the Building Committee in its discretion shall deem necessary for such purposes, be and the same hereby is appropriated to pay the cost of completing the construction of, equipping and/or furnishing said new school building, and any grading, sidewalk, legal, administrative or other expenses incidental thereto, and that any balance thereof not needed for any of the foregoing purposes may be used at the discretion of the School Board subject only to the consent of the United States of America, so far as said consent may be necessary, to pay interest on and/or to purchase or pay any bonds heretofore issued by the School District, and the Treasurer and other officers of the District are hereby authorized and instructed to take all necessary action to effect this result.

Voted: That when this meeting adjourns it be to meet at Grade School Hall in the Village of Hanover, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, August 6, 1935, at 7:30 o'clock in the forenoon. Voted: To adjourn at 8:00 o'clock.

*Resolved*: That a Second Amendatory Agreement between the School District of Hanover, New Hampshire, and the United States of America, P. W. A. Docket No. 3288, said Second Amendatory Agreement being in the following form:

> Second Amendatory Agreement between the School District of Hanover, New Hampshire and the United States of America P. W. A. Docket No. 3288

Whereas, a certain Loan Agreement (therein and herein called the "Agreement") dated as of March 12, 1934, was executed by and between the School District of Hanover, New Hampshire (therein and herein called the "Borrower") and the United States

of America (therein and herein called the "Government") P. W. A. Docket No. 3288, whereby the Government agreed to aid the Borrower by way of loan and grant in financing the construction of a certain project described in said Agreement; and

Whereas, the said Agreement was amended in certain respects by an Amendatory Loan Agreement executed by the Borrower and the Government as of February 8, 1935; and

Whereas, said Agreement was modified in certain respects by a waiver executed by the Assistant Administrator as of August 8, 1935; and

*Whereas*, the Borrower has requested and the Government has approved certain modifications in scope and an increase of the allotment for the Project from \$92,000.00 to \$96,500.00:

*Now, Therefore, it is Hereby Agreed* by and between the parties hereto that said Agreement be and it is hereby amended in the following particulars:

- By striking out, in Paragraph 1, Page One, the figures "\$92,000" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "\$96,-500".
- 2. By striking out, in Paragraph 1, Part One, Lines 17 and 18, the words "construction by the Borrower of a high school building" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "construction and equipment of a high school building."
- 3. By striking out, in Paragraph 8, Part Two, the figures "\$35,000" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "\$47,-000".
- 4. By striking out, in Paragraph 10, Part Two, the figures "\$52,000" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "\$56,-500".
- By striking out, in Paragraph 4 (a), Part Four, the figures "\$185,000" and inserting in lieu thereof the figures "\$199,500".

6. By inserting after Paragraph 4 (e) the following: "(f) Borrower's Funds. If the Borrower shall not have deposited or shall not have satisfied the Administrator that it will deposit in a Construction Account \$103,000 or such other amount as the Administrator may deem necessary, in addition to the funds to be furnished by the Government under this Agreement, to finance the Construction of the Project".

That said Agreement and all the terms and conditions thereof as heretofore modified and as herein further amended shall be and remain in full force and effect.

*Resolved*: That the following members of the School Board, Arthur H. Chivers, Andrew B. Elder, Nathaniel Emerson, Albion R. Fogg, Cecile H. Keir, F. Manning Moody, Robert J. Putnam, Francis V. Tuxbury and Gertrude B. Wright, or a majority thereof, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered in the name and on behalf of the School District of Hanover, to execute and deliver said Second Amendatory Agreement in such form and that Raymond B. Baird, Clerk of the District, be and he hereby is authorized and empowered to affix the seal of the District to said Second Amendatory Agreement and to attest said seal.

At this point in the meeting a vote was taken upon the foregoing resolution including the Second Amendatory Agreement and the Moderator declared the resolution unanimously adopted.

Upon motion of Mr. Arthur H. Chivers it was voted that when this meeting adjourns it be to meet at Grade School Hall in the Village of Hanover, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, January 28, 1936, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

It was voted to adjourn the meeting at 7:40 o'clock.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

#### To the School Board and Citizens of Hanover:

The School Board of the School District of Hanover herewith presents the eighty-second annual accounting of the work of the schools. There is included in this report the nineteenth by a superintendent of schools; the eighth, by the present writer.

**PURPOSE** The detailed accounting of the work of the department will be found in the statistical and financial part of this report. There will be a place in the record for information concerning the chief activities of the schools during the last twelve months. The requirement that the report be not too extended will preclude the inclusion of much material which might be pertinent to the work of the year.

**SURVEY** The educational progress of the schools has gone forward with reasonable strength. This is indicated by the success of our graduates in higher institutions and the success of pupils leaving our schools and entering those of similar grade in other communities. The new high school building has been equipped and occupied during this school year. This has necessitated changes and additions to the teaching staff. Teachers' salaries have been adjusted to the former level. The operation of the schools has been carried on with reasonable economy and the fiscal year closed with a small balance in the treasury. The enrollment in the schools continues to increase, although such increase is moderate. The teaching personnel shows a commendable professional spirit by keeping abreast of the educational literature of the period and by attending such educational meetings and lectures as are available.

**READJUSTMENT** The present school year marks a beginning of the readjustment of the entire educational program of Hanover. The new high school building has made possible organization of the village schools and those in the nearer communities on what is

known as a 6-6 basis. This means that congestion has been relieved both in the Grade School and in the High School. More than that, it means that there has been possible the organization of the work in the Grade School on such a basis as to provide somewhat better for the individual differences of pupils. It has been possible also to avoid the utilization of assistants in the regular classrooms : so that each teacher carrying on work in this building has a separate room in which to conduct her classes. It was possible to secure a person who was primarily interested in elementary education as a principal for this building. This is bringing about better coordination between the grades in the building, so far as the subject content is concerned, and a more systematic plan to discover pupils who may be succeeding less efficiently than their capacity would indicate. The Etna and Hanover Center Schools have also been relieved of the upper grades as the pupils from the seventh and eighth grades in these schools are being transported to the new high school. This makes a capacity of these other two buildings more nearly compatible with the groups they are accommodating; and, at the same time, lessens the number of grades which each teacher must have in a given room. A further reorganization was necessitated by the introduction of Home Arts for both boys and girls in the High School. This has made possible an improved program of studies for that building. It has also provided for a time schedule which has included certain worthwhile activities as a part of the scheduled day of the pupils. The adjustments which become necessary when the elementary pupils and secondary pupils attended schools in the same area have been made without any undue difficulty. The pupils in these two buildings are carrying on as independent units without interfering with each other on their way to and from school, or on the playgrounds adjacent to the buildings.

**TRANSPORTATION** Because of changing activities in the remote areas of the town, there is somewhat less demand upon the department for school facilities in such areas. This means that there has been a constantly decreasing necessity for transportation accommodations in those areas. This has made possible a reduction in the amount requested in the appropriation for this purpose from that of four years ago of about \$1,000. This reduction has been

gradual but nevertheless is now effective. At present the two main transportation services are those from the County Road Area and from the Ruddsboro District. These two routes are provided with modern school busses with ample accommodations for the pupils involved. The bus bringing in the Ruddsboro children to the Etna School has made possible an extension of that route to the new high school to accommodate the pupils in the seventh and eighth grades from Ruddsboro, Etna, and Hanover Center. This plan has worked with reasonable efficiency, and very few difficulties have arisen. A constant effort has been made in planning for all transportation routes to pay for the services on the basis of mileage covered, number of pupils carried, and difficulty of road conditions. The result is that all conveyances are operating upon a fairly equable basis. It can not be expected that every person in every neighborhood will be satisfied with every feature of any transportation service; but it can be truthfully said that the services as now afforded are better than at any time during the history of such service in the School District of Hanover.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM The State Program of Studies sets up rather specifically the material to be covered in a given grade in a given subject. This program is familiar to the teachers in the several grades concerning the work which is to be carried on in a particular unit. It has been the plan this year to have the teacher acquainted with the work which is expected to be done in the grade. preceding the one in which she is teaching and in the grade following her grade. In this way it is hoped that there will be a better sequence of work and less likelihood of repetition. The subject of arithmetic has received some special consideration. There is some reason to believe that time has been wasted in this subject in some years previous in an effort to begin the subject at too young an age. Change is taking place locally which lessens the amount of arithmetic required in the earlier grades and intensifies that which is done at about the fourth, fifth, and sixth grade levels. A definite effort is being made in the fields of reading and literature to develop the idea that even pupils in these grades can begin to do written work which has the element of originality. It becomes increasingly necessary, therefore, to provide these pupils with an abundance of reading material and a wide acquaintance with literature within their comprehension. Already results are beginning to be achieved, and some creative work is developing which, in the end, is likely to result in better written work on the part of the young people. At the same time that this work is going on, definite plans are made to emphasize the necessity for the simpler rules of composition including capitalization, punctuation, and grammatical construction. It can not be claimed that perfection will result, but present indications are that progress is being made. It is not so much the rules of technical English that are of value as it is the capacity to apply the technical mechanics of writing to a letter or to written material of any type. A further effort has been made to strengthen the mechanics of writing itself; so that the product will be more legible than is often the case for pupils of these age groups. The policy of providing extensive reading material and work of all types at the different grade levels continues. It is not expected that every pupil in every grade will be able to accomplish everything that is set up or planned in a grade; but, by a series of so-called contracts or planning on the part of the teacher, those children who sometimes may cause annovance because they have finished the day's work can be more fully occupied and more profitably engaged during the entire school day. One year will not accomplish perfect results in any of the fields indicated. It is our expectation to continue the program until as near maximum results as possible have been secured.

**HIGH SCHOOL** The great adventure of the year has been afforded both pupils and teachers by the occupancy of the new high school. This building which has been so generously provided by the community and which has been so conscientiously and carefully worked out by the Building Committee is exceeding expectations in many respects. It has made possible an entire reorganization of the program of studies in the six upper grades. The planned program, prepared by the Survey Committee and school officials four years ago has now been put into almost complete operation. Modern language is not being undertaken at the junior high school level but a course in general language has been provided for that group of pupils. Home arts for both boys and girls are in full swing with great interest shown by both groups in the work which they are undertaking. The slightly longer school day, which was anticipated in planning for the new school, has made possible a readjustment of the daily time table so that nearly all of the extra curricula activities are carried on during the regular school day. Not only that, but the longer periods afforded have made possible somewhat more intensive work on the part of the teacher in aiding pupils during their study and preparation for the subjects in hand. Still further developments along this line are to take place as experience dictates. The Student Council. made up of the leading officers in the various activities and the natural leaders among the pupils, is not only of assistance to the Headmaster in caring for and maintaining the building but is also of genuine value to the pupils involved, as they are learning ways in which to accept responsibility and to coordinate effort. The program for physical training has been enlarged to include more activities and a larger number of pupils participating. By actual investigation, it is found that something like 88% of the pupils who might be expected to undertake these activities are so engaged. Little or no attempt has vet been made to provide any extended program for so-called corrective exercises. The aim has been to broaden the physical activities program so that many more pupils than formerly would receive the benefit of some phase of this work. Emphasis has been placed upon the individual values to be obtained from such exercise rather than upon the number of games to be won and the success of teams in competitive fields. Much more could be done were it possible to provide one or more persons whose specific function might be to assist in developing a complete program for recreational and corrective physical exercise. Teachers who are obliged to carry on a full program of teaching duties in regular subjects can not be expected to do that and carry on a full program of these other activities at the same time, without some loss to individual pupils in one field or the other. The care and upkeep of a building such as this is somewhat greater than might be recognized by a casual visitor. It requires constant and faithful janitorial service in order to maintain a standard of cleanliness and sanitary conditions as well as proper heat. The Headmaster, teachers, pupils, and janitors are entitled to a word of commendation for what seems to be a unified effort to keep the building in proper condition at all times and to avoid unnecessary wear and tear.

**PUPIL RESPONSIBILITY** One feature of the occupancy of the new building which was different from that previously known to the pupils or parents was the provision for individual lockers. These lockers were included in the original planning for the building for the personal protection, of the pupil and his belongings. To make sure that as little confusion as possible arose, individual combination locks were provided. The pupil was asked to make a deposit of \$1.00 for each of these locks so that he would feel a little more responsible for its care and that there might be a little less temptation to try to utilize some lock other than the standard combination. The objective has been to make the burden as light as possible upon individuals and in any case no harder than would be consistent with preserving the pupils' responsibility. A careful check reveals that the pupils have learned the use and value both of the locks and lockers and are now keeping them in a satisfactory condition. Another item which has caused some comment is that of the activities fees which have been requested of individual pupils. There are about fifteen activities carried on in the school other than those set up in the regular program of studies. These activities include music, dramatics, clubs, socials, and various forms of physical exercise. The actual cost of this program must be borne largely by funds other than those granted by the School District. It was for this reason that the Student Council was asked to consider the question of fees to be added to the income from general admissions to help meet this need, and at the same time enable more pupils to attend the several events at a much reduced individual cost. A careful survey of the situation made by the Student Council under the direction of the staff, established the desirability of differentiating between the three lower classes and the three upper classes in the payment of these fees. It was reasoned that the pupils in the lower groups would receive lesser benefits than would the pupils in the upper groups. It was for this purpose that each pupil in grades 10, 11 and 12 was asked to pay \$4.00 per year; and each pupil in grades 7, 8, and 9, \$2.00 per year as his fee. An actual check of benefits which the pupils might receive from these funds brought out the information that were a pupil to attend every function possible and pay an admission fee for the same it would cost from \$16.00 to \$20.00 per year, instead of the \$2.00 and \$4.00 indicated above. Were these fees to be reduced to their lowest terms, it would be found that in the case of the first three grades the cost would be practically 5½c per week; and in the case of the last three grades, 11c per week. A pupil with even a small allowance granted him by his parents could easily adjust his finances to meet this relatively small obligation. It is worthy of note that generally pupils and parents have accepted this situation as an equable adjustment; and, in general, the semester fees have been paid. Here the school officials have endeavored to find ways of assisting pupils who seemed to have unusual circumstances which made it practically impossible to meet even this just assessment. The response is appreciated very definitely by the Headmater and Student Council. It is earnestly hoped that everyone who can find ways and means to do so will cooperate to make these activities possible and worthwhile.

BUDGET The budget was prepared this year to bring about a condition which would more nearly balance the expenditures under individual items with the actual payments. Some reductions were made which were offset by additions to other items, thus avoiding the necessity of so great a transference of funds. The items for instruction are somewhat increased in total, because the increasing number of pupils and the improved program of studies make necessary the employment of an additional teacher in the new high school. Better administration of that building makes it desirable to add to the staff a small amount of clerical service for the Headmaster, thus relieving him to do the necessary educational work required in a more extended educational program. The new high school has made it necessary to adjust certain items of Operation and Maintenance of Plant to meet the new situation. It cannot be definitely stated that these items will be fixed with any degree of permanency until after the building has been occupied for more than a few months. The item for transportation is always subject to variation because of the changing residences of persons who have children of school age. There is now no high school tuition for which the school district can be obligated. The elementary school tuition is dependent upon the necessity of transferring pupils from remote areas to schools nearer to them than are those located in Hanover. The item for insurance is nearly stabilized

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and it is expected that the usual appropriation for this item will be in the vicinity of \$1,200 per year. The Per Capita tax is based upon the number of school children in Hanover and will therefore vary from year to year as the school population changes. The estimated income has been adjusted more nearly to the level of actual receipts. This income will vary again with the number of tuition pupils, use of buildings, and other income as noted in the budget itself. It is safe to assume that there will continue to be a considerable income to the District from these sources. The additional allotment of funds from the Federal Government for the building have made possible a reduction in the amount necessary to be raised by taxation. It is possible that a still further allowance may be made by the government in which case such allowance will be applied in a similar manner. The actual amount to be raised by taxation has by this method been reduced over that asked by the District last year by \$1,770. It should be borne in mind however, that as soon as all available income funds from the larger sources are exhausted that the amount to be raised by taxation for school purposes will, of necessity, again revert more nearly to the figures formerly set up by the Finance Committee in its estimated expenditures for the schools for a period of ten years. This means that the School Board is endeavoring to cooperate with the other municipal agencies and the Finance Committee in the effort to keep the expenditures of the town within reasonable limits.

**REPAIRS** The school community has accepted the policy of keeping the school buildings in good repair. This means that it is necessary from year to year even in the case of modern buildings, to provide for a limited amount of work on each building. As buildings continue in use the necessity for such repairs increases somewhat with the age of the building. Heating plants need to be kept at their highest efficiency in climates such as this. It is for these reasons that the appropriation requested for these items continues at about the same level in succeeding years. It became necessary during the past summer to re-adjust and re-align some of the larger steam pipes at the Grade School. This work will need to be continued during another off season and there are valve adjustments and possibly replacements which will need to be made

in that school to utilize the heating plant to its fullest efficiency. The constant wear and tear upon buildings necessitates re-painting from time to time in order to maintain a satisfactory appearance and to assist pupils in acquiring attitudes of respect for public property. There will need to be some improvements made in the Hanover Center School next summer, although this will not be an extensive repair cost. It is also probable that minor repairs will need to be made in the High school as its use continues. Most of the work during the current fiscal year has been carried forward by the Building Committee as the contractors are not released from their obligations until one year after the acceptance of the school building itself. It should be noted in this respect that no extensive difficulties have been found, and that the contractors have been very cooperative in their efforts to assist in making the plant as nearly efficient as the Building Committee intended. Some time, in the not too far distant future, there will be necessary larger play areas to the rear of the present grade school. Should it happen that the old high school property be sold the girls will be deprived of outdoor play fields which are very much needed in their activity program. The land itself is available; the only requirement will be that of providing proper drainage and grading. This question should receive the consideration of the Board and citizens just as soon as it seems probable that funds can be provided.

**OUTCOME** As in previous reports, only topics of major interest have been discussed in this resume of the year's work. The detailed work of the schools proceeds with normal difficulties and success. The value of documents such as this lies in the fact that they become records of work done, of progress indicated, and of the direction of future development. Any inquiring citizen is cordially invited to gain a first hand knowledge of what is in process day by day in our schools by visits to classrooms and conferences with teachers and officers. Constructive suggestion is always helpful. It is in keeping with the progress of the times that cooperation and a genuine spirit of democracy prevail. So much has been done by the citizens and Board that it gives to those of us who are serving at this time encouragement and a determination to move forward along the lines of the best educational practices.
