

REPORT

OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF HANOVER, FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 8, 1869.

The Superintending School Committee respectfully present the following report:—

General Report of Schools in District No. 1, by Superintending Committee.

This District has had two schools during the Summer, Fall and Winter Terms. The small school was taught by Miss Fullington the Summer and Fall Terms and a part of the Winter Term, leaving on account of her health. This teacher seemed to be interested in her pupils, and they in turn, appeared to be happy with her, but there was wanting executive ability to make the school what the Committee desired.

The closing nine weeks of the Winter Term, was taught by Miss Hurlburt with good success, the pupils making marked progress, during this short time.

The large school was taught during the Summer Term, very successfully by Miss Elkins, a young lady of education and experience in teaching.

The Fall Term was taught by Miss Walcott, a lady of refinement and much natural ability, but lacking experience, failed to keep the school up to its previous standard.

Two male teachers had charge of the school, during the Winter Term. Mr. Currier taking charge the first two or three weeks, on account of the sickness of Mr. Folsom, who was engaged for the Term.

The Committee think Mr. Currier would have carried the school through successfully, had he remained, but from changes, and other causes, we do not think this school, both as to discipline and attainments, can be reported as in so good a condition as at the close of the Summer Term

This school is much in need of mural maps and reference books, there being not one of either.

Summer Term 12 weeks, Miss Hattie J. Camp, teacher. Miss Camp is a successful teacher.

Fall Term 10 weeks by Miss Sarah W. Hurlbutt. Her first term. She was evidently faithful and efficient.

Winter Term 7 weeks by Miss Laura M. Cross 3 weeks. Her school appeared well. The school is now in operation under the care of Miss Ella A. Webster.

Whole number of scholars 9. Average attendance 6.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

Summer Term 10 weeks. Winter Term 11 weeks, by Miss Samantha R. Kinne. One of our best qualified, energetic and successful teachers.

Whole number of scholars 20. Averege attendance 13. In Algebra 5.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

Summer Term 8 weeks, Miss Sarah Gile, teacher. Miss Gile's short school appeared well at the close. The progress was commendable.

Fall Term 8 weeks by Miss Lizzie E. Hoyt. Miss Hoyt has gained a good reputation as an instructor of youth and is among our best teachers.

Winter Term 10 weeks. Mr. W. Upham, of Dart. College was employed for most of the term, when failing in government he retired. Mr. U. is a fine scholar and excellent young man.

Mr. W. M. Wright eight days. Mr. W. is understood to be at home in teaching.

Whole number of scholars 24. Average attendance 21. In higher branches 4.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

Summer and Fall Terms, 20 weeks and Winter Term, 11 weeks. By Miss E. A. Brigham. Miss Brigham has closed her eighth successive term of service in school. It is enough to say that it is second to no school in town.

Book-keeping, philosophy, rhetoric, algebra and physical geography, are among the studies of the larger scholars. Few ladies manage a large school with the ability that she does.

Whole number of scholars 42. Average 30.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

Summer Term 8 weeks, Winter Term 13 weeks. Miss Mary E. Flanders. Miss Flanders has acquitted herself well as a teacher.

Whole number of scholars 10. Average attendance 6.

DISTRICT NO. 7.

Summer Term 10 weeks, Fall Term 5 weeks. Miss Adna P. Camp, teacher. Her first attempts at teaching. Fall Term shortened by her ill health.

Winter Term 10 weeks. Miss Ella A. Webster, teacher. Stricter discipline would have been an improvement, yet the progress in the different branches of study was very commendable.

Whole number of scholars 32. Average attendance 14 1-8.

DISTRICT NO. 8.

Miss E. F. Ross was employed for both terms with as good success as crowned her efforts last year. Her prospects as a teacher promising.

Whole number of scholars 8. Average 7.

DISTRICT NO. 9.

In this school Miss O. S. Hatch, for the 3d time, was employed in the summer with good success.

In the fall Miss L. M. Cross made her first effort at teaching and succeeded quite well.

Scholars 6. Average 5.

DISTRICT NO. 10.

Miss Maggie Whipple taught 8 weeks, in summer, when, on account of sickness among the scholars she closed. Her success, as a teacher, is not doubted. For the 2nd term Miss Mary A. Ingalls taught 12 weeks, as she has in days past, with good success. There are some fine scholars in this school.

Scholars 14. Average 10.

DISTRICT NO. 11.

Miss A. E. Briggs taught 13 weeks with as good success as any one could in such a school house, and with such wood, as was furnished for so cold weather.

Scholars 11. Average 8 3-4.

DISTRICT NO. 12.

Summer Term 10 weeks, by Miss Jennie C. Tilton. Her first term. Miss Tilton is not wanting in energy or fidelity, a little more calmness would be an improvement.

Fall and Winter Term 14 weeks. Miss Ada I. Kinne, teacher. Miss Kinne is faithful and judicious, looking after the morals of her pupils as well as their progress in the different branches of study, which was very commendable. Her report says "Portions of Scripture have been recited as a Monday morning lesson, Bible questions have been answered once a week."

Whole number of scholars 28. Average attendance 16.

DISTRICT NO. 13.

Summer Term 9 weeks, by Miss Fanny G. Hurlbutt. Her school appeared well, recitations prompt; improvement very commendable.

Fall Term 8 weeks, Winter Term 11 weeks, by Miss D. Maria Colcord.

Miss Colcord has fully sustained her good reputation as a teacher.

This school is among our most advanced, and is commendable in character.

Whole number of scholars 23. Average attendance 14.

DISTRICT NO. 14.

Summer Term 8 weeks. Miss Nancie J. Spaulding teacher. Miss Spaulding's school appeared well. She has evidently made a good beginning as a teacher.

Winter Term 10 weeks. Miss Mary A. Ingalls teacher. Miss Ingalls is a well qualified, skillful and successful teacher.

This school, though small, ranks well in comparison with others, having one at least, of the most advanced among our scholars.

Whole number scholars 13. Average attendance 10. Algebra 1. Philosophy 1.

DISTRICT NO. 15.

Summer Term 10 weeks. Miss Ada I. Kinne teacher. The school was taught, and managed with her usual fidelity.

Winter Term 12 weeks, by Miss Anna W. Powers. Miss Powers is an active, pleasant, and commendable teacher.

Whole number of scholars 13. Average attendance, 8 1-2.

DISTRICT NO. 16.

Miss S. E. Tilton was employed for both terms with very good success. In penmanship, she is without a rival amoung our teachers. Scholars 8. Average 6.

DISTRICT NO. 17.

Miss Georgie M. Dudley gave such good satisfaction the first, that she was employed for the 2nd. term, in all 22 weeks. The school appeared well. Scholars 12. Average 10.

DISTRICT NO. 18.

A small school, only one term, in which Miss Lizzie Kimball of Bath, gave entire satisfaction to all concerned. Scholars 10. Average 7 3-8.

Our Schools the past year, have been under the instruction and management of 30 teachers, males 5, and females 25.

Whole number of weeks of school, 388. Averaging to each district, 21 1-2 weeks. Whole number of scholars 385. Average attendance 319.

Whole amount expended for schools including board given, \$2341.07, averaging to each scholar, about \$5.85.

The management and instruction of the schools, has been generally commendable, and in a few districts, very satisfactory.

In procuring good teachers, much is depending upon the Prudential Committee.

The districts should therefore look well to the selection of such Committee.

We have now in our Schools, between 50 and 60 attending to such branches as Algebra, Philosophy, Book-keeping, &c.

We need teachers able to teach them. In selecting teachers, care should be taken in relation to their habits, their manners, and their moral principles, as well as to their literary attainments; that the most judicious parents, may not be grieved by an evil example.

Let teachers also feel their responsibility in this matter. They are impressing upon the young mind and heart their own image; an impression which will remain, and be the more obvious, when the individuals have attained their maturity.

The Registers report 88 visits of the Superintending Committee; including 18 by the Committee of District No. 1.

The following are the books recommended, and now very generally used. Town and Holbrook's Progressive Readers and Speller, Weld's and Quackenbos, and Town's small Grammar, Arithmetics, Adam's, and Greenleaf's National; Colburn's and Emerson's mental; Quackenbos' History of the United States, (small and large); Geography, Guyot's Series; Algebra — Robinson's Elementry, Book-keeping, Mayhew's; Cutter's Physiology.
