## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover in the [L. S.] County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Hayes' Hall in said Hanover on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to have a liquor agent for the year ensuing.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, one hundred dollars of the said sum towards the expense of lighting the streets of Hanover, and fifty dollars towards the expense of lighting the streets of Etna.
5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, or pass any vote relating thereto and transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

Bartlett, the moderator, after which it proceeded to the choice of town officers and other business as follows:

Voted to raise the sum of fifty dollars to help defray the expenses of Old Home Week.

The following resolutions introduced by Hamilton T. Howe were unanimously adopted:

Resolied, That our representatives in the legislature be instructed to support the bills for an increase of revenue and for new sources of revenue recommended by the tax commission, including the bill to make the valuation of public service corporations the average rate.

Resolved, That we believe the tendency to appropriate large sums for special purposes should be checked until new sources of revenue are found.

Voted to have a liquor agent for the ensuing year.
Voted not to adopt the provisions of Chapter 93 of the session laws of 1905, relating to political caucuses and conventions.

Voted to discontinue that portion of the highway leading from the buildings owned or occupied by Frank A. Adams and Son, to the buildings owned or occupied by N. W. Emerson and Son.

Voted that upon all taxes paid on or before the 15 th day of July, 1909, a discount of 5 per cent be allowed the taxpayer, and upon all taxes paid on or before the 15 th day of September, 1909, a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayer.

Voted to accept and adopt the reports of the town officers as published in the annual report.

Voted to adjourn.

## REPORT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1909

The work of the schools for the winter and spring terms, while in some cases excellent, was in general below the standards of previous years. Neither the scholarship nor the behavior of the pupils under some of the teachers was satisfactory. The work of the High School was especially criticised by the State Superintendent as the result of his own inspection and of the routine reports submitted to him.

With the beginning of the fall term an earnest attempt was made to remedy the deficiencies. An experienced teacher, Mr. Winfield H. Stone, Vice Principal of the Troy Conference Academy of Poultney, Vt., was secured as Principal, and other vacancies were filled by teachers well qualified for their work

On recommendation of the State Superintendent the course of study in the High School was reduced from five years to four, and the several courses were changed to conform essentially to the course recommended by the Educational Council of the State, and now in general use in the New Hampshire Schools. These changes have involved changes in the length of the recitation periods and in the length of the school day. The effect has been to put more emphasis on thorough home work, and on prompt and attentive work in the classroom. The school is now better able to meet the requirements of the State authorities, and its work is in all ways improved. The school needs, however, still more co-operation on the part of parents; home work is absolutely necessary, and parents should see that it
is well done, at regular hours. It is also true that teachers have to spend time and strength in trying to teach some boys and girls of high school age the rudiments of good behavior. Parents could greatly help the teachers if they could make their children feel that good behavior at school is as important as any work in the school books.

At the annual meeting in March the district appropriated $\$ 1,000.00$ for the thorough remodelling of the toilet rooms in the basement of the school building. This work was thoroughly done by E. T. Ford in the summer, and the sanitary condition of the building is now, with the new heating and ventilating system, such as to offer security for the health of the children. The faithful and intelligent care of the building given by the janitor, John P. Snow, makes the new appliances really effective.

At the annual meeting Newton A. Frost, who had been a member of the School Board for twenty-five years, declined a re-election. The district expressed their sense of obligation to him for his years of most efficient and unselfish service in the following resolutions:

Whereas Mr. Newton A. Frost has been for twentyfive years a member of our School Board, having been its secretary from 1884 to 1891, its treasurer since 1891 and its chairman since 1897, and whereas in the discharge of all his duties he has been zealous for the efficiency of the schools, and has exhibited unfailing tact, wisdom, and kindness in his relations with the other members of the Board, with the teachers and with the patrons of the school, voted that the district express to Mr. Frost their great regret that his efficient connection with the schools must now come to an end, and their gratitude for the long and valuable services which he has so freely rendered.

Mr. Perley R. Bugbee was elected to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Frost's retirement, and was by the School Board made their chairman.

By a change in the school law it became necessary to elect a treasurer outside the membership of the School Board, and Mr. Alfred W. Guyer was elected to that office.
