The undersigned, Auditors of the Town of Hanover for the year ending March, 1847 , having attended to the duties assigned them, submit the following Report.

Hence it appears, that during the pas year, the Town Farm has not only supported the Paupers, and paid its own expenses, but has yielded a nett surplus income of $\$ 159.43$. A part of this surplus has been expended in improving the condition of the farm itself, while the residue remains on the farm in the shape . of produce.

As the ordinary current expenses of the past year, exclusive of the payment of former debts, and of the construction of new Highways and Bridges, has been but $\$ 421.08$, your Auditors would recommend to the Town to raise, for the current expenses of the coming year, the sum of $\$ 500$.

The Auditors have found the foregoing accounts of the Seleetmen and Overseers of the Poor, correctly cast and duly vouched.
