Hence it appears, that during the past year, the Town Farm has not only supported the Paupers, and paid its own expenses. but has vielded a nett surplus income of \$159.43. A part of. this surplus has been expended in improving the condition of the farm itself, while the residue remains on the farm in the shape . of produce.

As the ordinary current expenses of the past year, exclusive of the payment of former debts, and of the construction of new Highways and Bridges, has been but \$421.08, your Auditors would recommend to the Town to raise, for the current expenses of the coming year, the sum of \$500.
