WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Grafton, ss.

Town of Hanover

To the inhabitants in the town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre in said Hanover on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for one year.

Second: To hear the report of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors and other town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third: To choose by ballot

To serve for three years

One Selectman One Library Trustee One Trustee of Trust Funds One Member Advisory Assessors' Board To serve for one year One Treasurer

Two Auditors Three Fence Viewers Two Surveyors of Wood and Lumber

A Prosecuting Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Laws and any other necessary town officers.

Fourth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. Fifth: To see if the Town will vote to elect two Highway Agents; the same to be appointed by ballot.

(On petition by Charles E. Thompson and others)

Sixth: 1. To see if the town will vote to join and/or cooperate with the town of Norwich, Vermont, to (1) build a new bridge across the Connecticut River between the towns of Hanover, New Hampshire, and Norwich, Vermont, at or near the site of the present Ledyard Bridge, so called, or (2) repair, remodel and/or reconstruct said Ledyard Bridge.

2. To see if the town will vote (1) to authorize the selectmen to negotiate and execute an agreement or agreements with the town of Norwich, Vermont, as to the portion of the cost of (a) building a new bridge across the Connecticut River between the towns of Hanover, New Hampshire and Norwich, Vermont, at or near the site of the present Ledyard Bridge, or (b) repairing, remodelling and/or reconstructing said Ledyard Eridge, to be borne by each town and/or (2) to ratify or otherwise act with reference to the action of the selectmen heretofore taken in executing any such agreement or agreements with the town of Norwich, Vermont and/or (3) to authorize the selectmen to negotiate and execute any other agreement or to take any other action that may be necessary or convenient to effect the purposes of any action taken under this or the preceding article.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate sufficient funds to pay its portion of the cost of (1) building a new bridge across the Connecticut River between the towns of Hanover, New Hampshire, and Norwich, Vermont, at or near the site of the present Ledyard Bridge, so called, or (2) repairing, remodelling and/or reconstructing said Ledyard Bridge, and/or to pay any expenses in connection therewith or incidental thereto.

4. To see if the town will authorize the issue and sale of notes and/or bonds of the town to finance in whole or in part its portion of the cost of (1) building a new bridge across the Connecticut River between the towns of Hanover, New Hampshire, and Norwich, Vermont, at or near the site of the present Ledyard Bridge, or (2) repairing, remodelling and/or reconstructing said Ledyard Bridge.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen in their discretion either (1) to apply for, or confirm or amend any application heretofore made for, and to accept. a loan and/or grant from the United States under the National Industrial Recovery Act for the purpose of carrying out any project described in Article 1, and to issue and sell the notes and/or bonds authorized pursuant to Article 4 to the United States, or any instrumentality thereof, or (2) to apply for, or confirm or amend any application heretofore made for a loan and/or grant, and to accept a grant from the United States under said Act for the purpose of carrying out any project described in Article 1, and to issue and sell said notes and/or bonds, in whole or in part, at public or private sale, to the United States, and/or to any instrumentality thereof, and/or to any other purchaser or purchasers, or (3) to issue and sell said notes and/or bonds, in whole or in part, at public or private sale, to any purchaser or purchasers, in the event that for any reason no loan and grant, or grant without a loan, is obtained from the United States.

6. To see if the town will vote (1) to take all action and approve any contracts or instruments necessary or incidental to obtaining from the United States any loan and/or grant authorized or approved at the 1934 annual town meeting or at the special town meeting held December 4, 1933, and at any and all adjourned sessions thereof and/or to carrying out any project described in Article 1 and/or to issuing and selling the notes and/or bonds authorized at the 1934 annual town meeting or at the special town meeting held December 4, 1933, and at any and all adjourned sessions thereof and/or (2) to authorize the selectmen to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of the town all contracts and instruments with the United States, or any instrumentality thereof, pertaining to such loan and/or grant, or with any other purchaser or purchasers of such notes and/or bonds, and all other contracts necessary or incidental to obtaining such loan and/or grant, and/or to carrying out such project, and/or to issuing and selling such notes and/or bonds, all such contracts and instruments to be in

such forms as the selectmen may approve, unless the same have been presented and approved at a legal town meeting or any adjourned session thereof and/or (3) to take any and all action necessary or incidental to the foregoing.

7. To see if the town will vote to ratify, confirm, amend, supplement, modify or rescind the action taken at the special town meeting held December 4, 1933, and at any and all adjourned sessions thereof, and/or any action taken pursuant thereto, and/or any action taken from time to time at any session or adjourned session of this annual meeting.

8. To see if the town will vote to take any other action incidental or necessary to the carrying into effect of any action taken under the seven articles immediately preceding this one.

Seventh: To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Chapter 99, Public Laws of New Hampshire for 1933.

Eighth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

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ABSTRACT FROM THE TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Hanover March 14, 1933, the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, Moderator, who read the warrant.

Proceeded to act upon the warrant under which the meeting was called.

George M. Bridgman was elected Town Clerk.

Charles A. Holden was elected Selectman for three years.

Alfred W. Guyer was elected Treasurer for one year.

Halsey C. Edgerton and David C. Rennie were elected Auditors for one year.

Etta F. Emerson was elected Library Trustee for three years.

Francis V. Tuxbury was elected Trustee of Trust Funds.

James Spencer, Daniel O. Hoyt and William H. Hart were elected Fence Viewers for one year.

William H. Hart and John A. Humiston were elected Surveyors of Wood and Lumber for one year.

Archie B. Gile was elected to serve as a member of the Advisory Assessors' Board for three years.

There was no action taken as to electing a Prosecuting Agent to Prosecute Violations of Liquor Laws, this office to be filled by an appointment by the Selectmen.

Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Town obligations until the taxes are collected and paid into the Treasury and to allow a discount of three (3) per cent on taxes paid before July 15, 1933.

The fifth article to see if town would reopen that part of the road running northerly from its Junction with the Wolfboro road near the Tunis School House to a point 200 feet southerly of the buildings of R. K. Adams was passed over.

Voted:

That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll Taxes required by law, the Town raise the sum of Sixteen Thousand Six Hundred (\$16,600.00) dollars and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the Treasury and which are not required by law otherwise be expended in accordance with the budget and report as presented by Selectmen.

Voted:

That until otherwise provided by vote of the Town onehalf of the proceeds of sales of lots (whether heretofore or hereafter made) in Pine Knolls Cemetery be paid over to the Town Trustees of Trust Funds and the income thereof shall be expended under the direction of the Selectmen for the care and improvement of said Cemetery.

Moved:

That the Selectmen be instructed to reduce the salaries and fees paid town officers an average of ten per cent and that the sums saved be applied to needed highway construction for the aid of the unemployed. This motion was made by E. H. Hunter. The vote was as follows: Yes 83, No 107.

Voted:

That the Town Report as printed including the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors and the other town officers be accepted.

Voted: To adjourn.

Since the date of the first annual report (February 21, 1933) the Finance Committee has held seventeen meetings. Eight of these were joint meetings with the School District's "Committee of Seven", the new high school project having been referred to these two Committees, sitting jointly, for their report and recommendation, by vote of the School District at a special meeting held in August 1933.

In addition to these meetings the Committee has conducted four public hearings, two on the high school project, one on the Ledyard Bridge and the fourth (February 19, 1934) on proposed budgets and tax rates.

When the annual meetings of the Town, Precinct and School District were held in the spring of 1933 it looked like a quiet year. It appeared that the immediate task of the Finance Committee was to assist the municipal officers in practicing economy

and keeping the tax rates down, and to preserve an equilibrium among the three branches of our local organization.

Events at Washington soon changed this scene. The advent of the P. W. A. brought with it renewed demands for the erection of a new high school, with the prospect of substantial federal aid; and, later in the fall, examination of the condition of the Ledyard Bridge disclosed that this historic structure must either be extensively repaired or a new bridge built; and the prospect of federal aid also applied to this situation.

Both of these projects were major ones for a community no larger than Hanover and both demanded and received careful consideration.

After such consideration the Finance Committee reported to the voters in favor of both of these projects. The reasons which led to these recommendations were given at great length in the course of the hearings and meetings which were held last fall and need not be repeated here. The recommendations of the Committee in both cases were approved by a very large majority of the voters who were present at the special meetings at which decisions were made.

The expected cost of these projects to the tax payers of Hanover is as follows:

plus interest at 4% on bonds for that amount, maturing in annual installments over a period of twenty years; and to this expense must be added the amount of approximately \$3,500 per annum in the school budget, on account of increased expenses which will be created by the construction and occupancy of a new high school.

Thus during the year the citizens of this community have committed themselves to capital expenditure and indebtedness of approximately \$210,000 which must be paid off at the rate of approximately \$10,000 per year for twenty years, and on which the initial interest charge will be approximately \$8,400 annually. This interest charge will of course be reduced every year as payments on the principal are made.

The inevitable effect of these commitments will be to raise the taxes which residents in this community must pay, very substantially. A prediction as to the effect of these projects upon the taxes for the next decade was attempted in the fall of 1933 and was put in the hands of the voters in the form of voluminous tables at one of the special meetings of the School District. These tables should be preserved by the taxpayers for future reference.

With regard to the predictions ventured in those tables the Committee desires now to reiterate that adherence to the rates suggested in those tables can be had only by the very strictest economy on the part of everybody concerned. Even if such economy is practiced, unforeseen events may upset the predictions; but the main point is that the community, having voted for a new high school and a new bridge, will have to get along for at least ten years without any further substantial improvements or additions, unless it is willing to inflict upon itself a burden of tax rates in excess of anything heretofore experienced.

The Committee has carefully considered the proposed budgets of the Selectmen, Precinct Commissioners, and the School Board for the coming year and has approved them in the form in which they will be found in the printed report. If these budgets are adopted by the voters the result will be that the town tax rate (outside the precinct) will be \$2.16 for 1934 as compared with \$1.93 for 1933, and that the rate (within the precinct) will be \$2.73 for 1934 as compared with \$2.55 for 1933.

The increase is due chiefly to the inclusion in the school budget of \$8,000 on account of the construction of the new high school and \$3,000 on account of the interest thereon, and the inclusion in the town budget of the sum of \$2,500 on account of liability to schools and of \$1,000 on account of the Ledyard Bridge project. One or two other items have also had a slight effect in bringing about this increase. These will be explained in detail at the annual meeting.

HANOVER UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF COMMITTEE

The attached financial report covers the entire period of operation of the undersigned committee. A detailed report of operations up to February 6, 1933 was contained in the annual report of the town of Hanover published last year. Since that time the committee has found it necessary to make an appeal for contributions, and 202 citizens responded with gifts totaling more than \$2,000.

During the past year the committee has followed its original policy of furnishing work rather than direct material assistance wherever possible, and in carrying out this program it has been greatly aided by the willingness of the selectmen and the precinct commissioners to co-operate. The money spent by the committee for wages was more than equalled by the appropriations from town and precinct for the same purpose, and in this manner more than \$5,000 was used to employ persons recommended by the committee on civic projects. Under the direction of the selectmen, considerable work was done on the Hewes Brook Road and the East Side Road. The precinct commissioners carried through an extensive program of reconstruction on North Balch Street. Parkway and North College Street. This work began on May 1, 1933 and continued through September, 1933, during which time 55 men from the committee's list were given employment. The Hanover Water Company matched the committee's appropriation and in the late winter and spring of 1933 put through great improvements on the property adjacent to the upper reservoir.

On July 1, 1933, all welfare relief work was taken over by the State Relief Administration as established by House Bill 417. Under this arrangement welfare work is done throughout the towns, counties and the state by this state administration, each town paying one-fourth of the expense of the maintenance of its town cases. The committee has continued, however, through its officers, to function in co-operation with the local re-employment authorities in the selection of men to be placed on local projects of the Civil Works Administration.

The committee wishes to avail itself of this opportunity to express its appreciation to those persons and organizations that have responded so generously to the request for financial assistance in order to alleviate the burden of unemployment in Hanover.

Some work has been done on the card catalogue during the year, but the entire usefulness of the library will not be realized until the card catalogue is quite complete and every new book has its card promptly entered. Only thus will it be possible to answer inquiry for any book and find the book without delay. The usual annual convention of librarians of the State was held last September in Littleton, and it was believed to be for the interest of our library to have the librarian attend. There is no doubt that these meetings of the librarians are helpful to all who participate.

About 57 books have been added to the library, perhaps more than half fiction; but a good number by religious teachers, and a fair proportion for the young people. Nine periodicals are now regularly received, including Hanover Gazette.

It is a matter for satisfaction that strangers who have visited the library have expressed commendation for the wide range of subjects covered by the books; for the discriminating selection of authors; and the sufficient variety in lines of literature,—fiction, biography, history, geography and books of reference.

Third: To hear the report of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditor, and other Precinct Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To choose by ballot a Treasurer and an Auditor, each to serve for one year; and a Park Commissioner and a Precinct Commissioner each to serve for three years.

Fifth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray Precinct expenses for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Sixth: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

March 16, 1933

A meeting of the voters of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H. was called to order at 8:35 o'clock P.M.

Article 1—Ralph D. Beetle was elected Moderator to preside over the meeting. The warrant was then read by the Clerk.

Article 2-Ira W. Leavitt was elected Clerk for one year.

Article 3—Voted: That the Precinct report as printed, including the reports of the Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditor and other Precinct officers be accepted.

Article 4—Alfred W. Guyer was elected Treasurer for one year. Clarence W. Cofran was elected Auditor for one year. Joseph A. Mulherrin was elected Precinct Commissioner for three years.

Article 5—Voted: That the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H. raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-nine thousand dollars (\$29,000.00) to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the year ending January 31, 1934, according to the items set forth in the budget.

Article 6—Voted: That the Precinct of Hanover, N. H. adopt the following act of the Legislature approved February 14, 1933:

"1. Village Precinct of Hanover. Section 11 of chapter 225 of the Laws of 1901 is hereby amended by striking out the whole of said section, and substituting therefor the following: Sect. 11. At the close of each fiscal year the commissioners shall make a report to the precinct, giving a particular account of all their financial transactions during the year, and of the financial condition of the precinct at the close of the year, including a schedule of all its assets and liabilities. Such accounts shall be

audited by the precinct auditor at the close of each fiscal year, and he shall report to the precinct whether the same are correctly cast and well vouched.

"2. Fiscal Year. Section 12 of said chapter 225 is hereby amended by striking out the words '15th day of February' in the first sentence of said section, and substituting therefor the words, thirty-first day of January, so that said section as amended shall read as follows: Sect. 12. The fiscal year for the precinct shall end on the thirty-first day of January. The annual meeting shall be holden in the month of March after the second Tuesday. In case of neglect or refusal of the commissioners to warn a meeting or insert an article in a warrant, or of failure to hold an annual meeting within the period limited by this act, it shall be called and warned in the same manner as in like cases in towns.

"3. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect upon its passage."

Article 7—Voted: To authorize the Precinct Commissioners to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Precinct's obligations until the taxes are collected and paid into the Treasury of the Precinct.

Voted: That upon all taxes on real estate and personal property a discount of three per cent (3%) be allowed the taxpayer if paid on or before July 15, 1933.

There being no more business to come before the meeting it was voted to adjourn.

REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

February 1, 1934.

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.:

During 1933 at the request of and with the aid of interested parties the Fire Company organized a Rescue Squad to work with the Ledyard Canoe Club in case of any emergency that might arise on the Connecticut River. A course in Life Saving was carried out and five men of the Fire Company have passed the Senior Life Saving Test. In case of an emergency any member of the community should notify the Hanover telephone operator stating just where the emergency is. Call Number 85 is to be used for this type call.

During 1933 the Company answered 39 alarms. 22 still alarms 15 bell alarms 2 false alarms (caused by unforeseen alarm trouble)

Of the 39, 6 were out of town, 5 were for the town of Hanover, 28 were in the Precinct. Of the 28 in the Precinct, 2 were false, 8 were chimney, 1 an automobile, 5 were grass fires, 1 a tar barrel, 1 a broken steam line, 1 gasoline, 1 oil heater, 1 oil stove, 2 waste baskets, 1 a pile of leaves, 3 were Fraternity houses and 1 a private residence.

The real estate property loss was 7.786.34 for the fires in the Precinct, which represents .0017% of approximate assessed value of 4,480,000 in the Precinct.

During the year the department laid 8,350 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch hose, 1,410 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch, 2,200 feet of $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch hose and set up 425 feet of ladders.

Attention is invited to the bad conditions of chimneys and removal of waste as found by the Fire Department the past year and we recommend as a Fire Department that a system of inspection be started at once.

We recommend that water holes or cisterns be built in town beyond the water mains and the officers of the Fire Department offer their help or co-operation with anyone who is interested.

REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

February 1, 1934.

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.

During the past year milk licenses were granted after inspection to thirty-seven distributors of milk in the precinct.

Most of these men buy milk from other producers. In order to safeguard the milk supply inspections were made of these dairies also and milk samples taken and tested. The milk supply on the whole was found to be satisfactory.

During the calendar year 1933 there were reported two hundred and seventeen cases of contagious disease. Quarantine was enforced in those instances where it is required by law.

Epidemics of chicken pox, measles and numps accounted for one hundred and eighty-nine of the above cases of contagious disease.

Five nuisances were reported and investigated.

Examinations of the water in the reservoir were made.

To accomplish the above inspections and investigations the Health Officer traveled about two hundred and fifty miles.

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Hanover qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grade School Hall in Hanover, N. H. on Tuesday the 27th day of March, 1934, at seven and one-half o'clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

2. To choose by ballot, a Clerk, a Treasurer, and an Auditor, each to serve one year.

3. To choose three members of the School Board to serve for a term of three years, and to fill any vacancies in the Board for unexpired terms.

4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see how much money in addition to the amount required by law the District will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.

6. To see what sums of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate to apply to the payment of outstanding obligations and interest on same.

7. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to dispose of the land occupied by the County Road School, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see what, if any, action the District will take with reference to raising and appropriating money and/or issuing and selling notes or bonds of the District to finance in whole or in part the cost of building, equipping and furnishing the new school

building which the District voted to build at the adjourned session of the special meeting of August 24, 1933, held on November 9, 1933.

9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board in their discretion either (1) to apply for or confirm or amend any application heretofore made for, and to accept a loan and grant or a grant without a loan from the United States under the National Industrial Recovery Act for the purpose of building, equipping and furnishing the new school building referred to in the next preceding article, and to issue and sell the notes and/or bonds authorized for the purpose of financing in whole or in part the cost of building, furnishing and equipping said new school building in whole or in part at public or private sale to the United States and/or to any instrumentality thereof and/or to any other purchaser or purchasers; or (2) to issue and sell said notes and/or bonds in whole or in part at public or private sale to any purchaser or purchasers in the event that for any reason no loan and grant or grant without a loan is obtained from the United States.

10. To see if the District will vote (1) to take all action and approve any contracts or instruments necessary or incidental to obtaining from the United States any loan and/or grant authorized or approved at the meeting or at any special meeting heretofore and/or to issuing and selling any notes and/or bonds authorized for the purpose of financing in whole or in part the school house referred to in Article 8; and/or (2) to authorize the School Board to execute and deliver in the name and behalf of the District all contracts and instruments with the United States or any instrumentality thereof pertaining to such loan and/or grant or with any other purchaser or purchasers of any such notes and/or bonds and all other contracts necessary or incidental to obtaining such loan and/or grant and/or to issuing and selling such notes and/or bonds, all such contracts and instruments to be in such forms as the School Board may approve unless the same have been presented and approved at a legal district meeting or any adjourned session thereof; and/or (3) to authorize the execution in the name and behalf of the District of contracts and instruments necessary or incidental to building, equipping and furnishing said school house; and/or (4) to take any and all action necessary or incidental to the foregoing.

11. To see if the District will vote (1) to ratify, confirm, amend, supplement, modify or rescind any action taken at the special district meeting held August 24, 1933 and at any and all adjourned sessions thereof and/or any action taken pursuant thereto and/or any action taken from time to time at any session or adjourned session of this annual meeting, and/or to take any other action incidental or necessary to the carrying into effect of any action taken under this article or the three articles immediately preceding this one.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The following motion was presented—To authorize the Board of Education to sell at public or private sale, when in their judgment it is for the best interests of the District to do so, the old grade school building and land on the north side of Allen Street, and that the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer of the District be authorized to execute the deed or deeds therefor.

Voted: That the above motion be amended as follows—by striking out the words, "and land". The motion was adopted as amended—To authorize the Board of Education to sell at public or private sale, when in their judgment it is for the best interests of the District to do so, the old grade school building on the north side of Allen street, and that the Chairman of the Board and the Treasurer of the District be authorized to execute the deed or deeds therefor.

Article IX: Voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of 3% be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15, 1933.

Voted: That a check list be prepared annually for use at the annual meetings of the School District of Hanover; said check list to be a copy of that prepared by the Supervisors of the check list for the Town, and posted and corrected by the Supervisors of the School District according to law.

A. Neef, Nathaniel G. Burleigh, Ralph A. Burns, Arthur H. Chivers, Archie B. Gile, Robert J. Putnam, and Gertrude B. Wright are hereby elected a committee to be known as the Building Committee with full authority to determine the location of, (to purchase land for,) to plan, contract for and supervise the building of such school building as they may decide upon with full authority except that all money will be handled by the treasurer of the District and bills paid by him on the approval of the Committee.

the purposes specified in the foregoing vote, a sum not to exceed One Hundred and Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000.00) is hereby raised and appropriated, said sum to be raised by the issue and sale to the United States, or to any other purchaser or purchasers, of bonds of the School District of Hanover of an aggregate principal amount of not exceeding One Hundred and Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000.00), or in case a grant is obtained or promised which is available for the cost of the project referred to in the foregoing votes rather than applicable to payments on account of such bonds, of such less aggregate principal amount of bonds as together with such grant shall not exceed One Hundred and Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$185.-000.00), said bonds to be issued in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of 1926, as amended, to bear interest at not exceeding 5% per annum payable semi-annually, said bonds to be pavable in accordance with Section 3 of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of 1926, as amended, the first payment to be not later than one year and the last payment to be not later than twenty years after the date of the bonds; and subject to said Chapter 59 and to the foregoing limitations, the School Board of the District is hereby given full power and authority to determine the denominations, the form of said bonds, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, the rate of interest, and to arrange for, negotiate and effect the issuance and sale of said bonds, including the power to fix the terms of sale, and to enter into any contracts or agreements in connection with any loan and/or grant authorized at this meeting and/or in connection with the issuance and sale of any bonds authorized at this meeting. The School Board of the District or a Majority thereof, are hereby authorized to sign and affix the seal of the District to said bonds and the treasurer to countersign the same.

(Check list used in balloting.) Ballots having been taken, two hundred and eleven having voted in the affirmative and thirtyone having voted in the negative, and it appearing said Vote had been adopted by vote of 87.19 of all the Voters present and voting. Said vote was declared duly passed. On the motion of Arthur H. Chivers, duly seconded, it was

Voted: That the Treasurer of the District be and he hereby is authorized and instructed to procure a seal with the words "School District of Hanover, New Hampshire" inscribed thereon, which is hereby adopted as the seal of the District.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

The attention of the citizens is directed to the financial report and budget estimates of the School Board, and to the report of the Superintendent of Schools which has been made a part of this report, for information concerning the work of the schools. It will be noted that the expected balance at the close of the fiscal year in 1933 exceeded the estimate by \$169.03, making a total balance of \$4,669.03. It is difficult to estimate income so many months in advance of actual receipts. This is the essential reason why the balances of the School Board have been somewhat in excess of estimates for the past two or three years.

The budget for the actual operation of the schools, without provision for a new High School building, is considerably less than that of last year, but your Board deemed it advisable to plan for the operation and maintenance of a new High School building. It should be pointed out that the amount to be raised by taxation for 1934-1935, even after allowances have been made for the new building, is more than \$5,000.00 less than was asked for for the year 1931-1932. In other words, the additional income from increased tuition rates, plus the decrease in actual expenditures, has made it possible to provide for the new building for the first year with a tax rate which is less than that required for the year 1931-1932.

It has been necessary to ask for slightly increased amounts in several items of the budget. This is due, in part, to increased costs which are already apparent in the purchase of various items for use in the schools.

The School Board is pleased to acknowledge the services rendered by the United States Government through its C. W. A. project in the preparation and execution of material for the use of various dramatic clubs both in the Grade School and High School for the production of their plays. These stage properties are being constructed at no cost to the School District other than the bare cost of materials. We wish to acknowledge our indebtedness to the several citizens who have assisted the Superintendent in planning for and carrying through this program, and more especially to Mr. Packard who made this program possible.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hanover:

The Superintendent of Schools presents his sixth annual report in accordance with the regulations. It becomes a part of the eightieth in the series of such reports by the School Board and School District of Hanover. It is the seventeenth in the series of Superintendent's reports.

Purpose

It is proposed to present only such facts as have significance in the progress of the schools. An account of the disbursements of the Department and Budget preparation has been made by the School Board in a preceding part of this report. Statistics regarding pupil attendance and the activities in the High School other than those which are directly connected with pupil progress in subject matter, may be found in the appendix.

SURVEY

The year's work has been somewhat unsettled because of the prevalence of contagious diseases. Three distinct interruptions have taken place from this source during the last twelve months. Serious and wide spread epidemics have not occurred. This is due largely to the control which has been afforded by the cooperative action of the Health Officer, Medical Director, and School Nurse. The educational program has been carried forward with enthusiasm and satisfactory accomplishment. Cooperation in the work of the schools has been had from the citizens and organizations of the community. A reduction in the teachers' salaries has taken place causing what we hope is only a temporary inconvenience to the teachers which is comparable to that of the other citizens of the community. Care has been exercised in the expenditure of money so that appropriations would not need to be increased beyond necessities. Only one change has taken place in the teaching personnel.

FINANCES

The gradual emergence from the economic disturbances of the past few years is beginning to be felt in the costs of operating the schools. As recovery increases, this fact will be more and more important in considering school finances. The present Budget has been prepared to the end that school expenditures be kept at the lowest level consistent with satisfactory work. All school officers and teachers are putting forth constant effort to carry forward the school program without seriously increasing its costs.

HIGH SCHOOL

Your attention is especially directed to Chart III in the Appendix which shows that for a second time within ten years there has been an unexpected increase in the number of pupils attending High School. A portion of this increase is no doubt due to the fact that children of High School age are finding it more and more difficult to find employment immediately upon completion of the work in the Eighth Grade. This increased enrollment has but emphasized the crowded conditions in the High School Building. The citizens of Hanover have acted wisely in taking definite steps toward the erection of a new High School Building. Hanover will thus become one of the few communities in the country which, in times of stress, make provision for the needs of the children of tomorrow. It is probable that the action of the President of the United States, and of the United States Congress in planning the Public Works program, will result in providing a building which had otherwise seemed improbable if not impossible. When such building is completed, the present congestion in the High School will have been eliminated and the work can be carried on more efficiently than is the case at the present time. The costs for the operation of the school have not been greatly increased, but will be somewhat larger next year should the proposed building be finally occupied before the end of the next fiscal year. Provisions for this contingency have been made in the Budget prepared by the School Board and accepted by the Finance Committee. This has been the first complete year in which the revised curricula for the High School has been attempted. The complete revision cannot take place until the new building is occupied. Even then, it may be desirable to provide for a gradual transition from the curricula of a few years ago to the more progressive type planned by the school authorities. Pupils and teachers are looking forward with eager anticipation to the realization of this completed project both from the standpoint of accommodations and from the standpoint of types of instruction which shall seem to be of greater advantage to many of the pupils in the school.

Repairs

About the usual repairs have been made in the several school buildings. The Hanover Center and Etna Schools have received coats of paint on the outside as has the Grade School at the Village. The Grade School has also been entirely re-decorated in the interior in the past three years with the exception of the Auditorium. The time is not far distant when it is highly desirable from the standpoint of conservation, of heat, and from the standpoint of acoustics, to provide for a ceiling for this room. When that is done, the entire room should be re-decorated and made to conform more nearly to the rest of the decorations in the building. Extensive repairs to any of these buildings will not be required next year, but it will be necessary to improve the playgrounds so that the pupils may have more opportunity for play. The athletic field and tennis courts at the rear of the Grade School Building have added much to the pleasure of the High School group in carrying on outdoor activities. As soon as circumstances permit, it will become advisable to continue the grading of this area, and to provide for additional tennis courts and fields for the use of a larger number of pupils. This will be particularly necessary when the High School Building is re-located and a larger group of pupils is contiguous to the playground.

TEACHERS

The teaching force this year remained almost intact. There were no changes in the High School, and only one change in the Elementary Schools. Miss Noyes, a teacher in the Junior High School for the past three years, resigned. She was replaced by the promotion of Miss Oulton in the Fourth Grade, who in turn was replaced by Miss Alger. The teachers have shown seriousness of purpose, studiousness of mind, and an attitude of professional growth as indicated by membership in Teachers' Associations, professional magazine subscriptions, and a willingness to attend Summer Schools for the purpose of improving their work in the school room. If this same professional spirit can prevail in the school system for a considerable time, the results of the work in the schools will be continuously enhanced.

DEPARTMENTAL WORK

One departure from the traditional type of School Program, has been made this year in the Grade School. A plan has been tried for the assignment of subjects to individual teachers. The Grades below the Junior High School have been grouped into Primary, or the first three grades, and the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Grades. Each teacher in each group has been asked to teach one subject through the entire group. This means that one teacher has taught drawing in Grades One, Two, and Three; another teacher has taught nature study in Grades One, Two, and Three; and the third teacher has taught music in Grades One, Two, and Three. Likewise, one teacher has taught history in Grades Four, Five, and Six: a second teacher has taught geography in these same grades, and the third teacher has taught English. This plan is only a limited type of departmentalization. It has conserved to the pupils of each grade a home-room teacher who is held responsible for the development and progress of the pupils in her grade, and responsible for the promotion of desirable habits and attitudes toward the work and life of the school. Thus far, the plan has accomplished something in the way of improved instruction in the given fields, and gives promise of even better results as all persons interested become acquainted with the ideals which prompted the plan.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

This year the Grade School at the Village was particularly fortunate in having added to its staff one teacher who has been connected with larger school systems in which more emphasis has been placed on physical education. Through her efforts a beginning has been made in that building in providing some of the simpler physical education games and exercises which will in the end help to build up stronger and more vigorous bodies on the part of the pupils. This can be regarded only as a beginning. It is becoming more and more desirable with the strenuous lives which people live to make sure not only that strong bodies are allowed to grow, but that those suffering from correctible physical difficulties, be given an opportunity to overcome such difficulties. The time is approaching when Hanover should seriously consider the whole question of physical education as connected with the Health Program of the schools to the end that there be added to the teaching staff a person whose duty it shall be to care for the physical growth and development of the pupils, with the cooperation of the School Medical Director, and the School Nurse.

ATTENDANCE

The attendance of the schools as a whole continues to be larger than was anticipated. The actual figures may be found in the summary of the attendance in the Appendix. It was anticipated that the attendance in the Etna School would increase rather materially, and this has finally resulted in a larger number of pupils in that building than it was expected could be accommodated easily. Should this condition persist over a period of years, it will be absolutely necessary to make definite provision for relief in that building.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is a pleasure to record that many of the previous recommendations made by your Superintendent have been carried into effect. It will be an even greater service to the community when the recent votes of the School District and the recommendations of the Building Committee shall have resulted in a new High School Building more nearly suited to the needs of the time. The recommendations which are brought forward at this time are for the purpose of placing before the citizens what seem to be ways in which to better the School Program for the community. It is not expected that such recommendations can be put into operation without due consideration and appropriate previous plans. It is then, with these facts in mind that the following recommendations are made:

1. That definite plans be made for the introduction of physical training from the health and development standpoint.

2. That as soon as it is expedient and possible, the grounds to the rear of the Grade School and those adjacent to the proposed High School Building be regraded and laid out in accordance with the Engineer's plans which are in the possession of the Board.

3. That as soon as the new High School Building is ready for occupancy, plans be made to relieve the Etna School Building by the transportation to the High School of the pupils in the Seventh and Eighth Grades at this school.

No effort has been made in this report to provide for an extensive new Educational Program. It is expected that good schools will continue to be maintained and that all interested in school affairs including teachers, pupils, and citizens will see to it that the Educational movement of the community be forward rather than backward. Acknowledgement is made to all of the co-workers in the department and to those organizations and citizens who have contributed toward the well-being of the school community.


