Sixth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

ABSTRACT FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs at Grange Hall in said town, on Tuesday the eleventh day of March, 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, the Moderator. The warrant under which the meeting was called, was read by the clerk, after which proceeded to the election of town officers and other business as follows:

Upon motion:

Voted: That in addition to the State, County, Highway and Poll Taxes provided for by law, the town raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-two thousand, three hundred dollars (\$22,300) to be expended in accordance with the Budget as presented by the Selectmen.

Upon motion:

Voted: Authority is hereby granted the Selectmen to borrow on notes issued for not over one year, an amount not to exceed fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000) in addition to what has been raised otherwise.

Upon motion:

Voted: That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.) the same, or such part as may be necessary, to be expended in co-operation with the State Agent engaged in the work of exterminating and preventing the spread of the disease commonly known as Pine Blister Rust.

Upon motion:

Voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of (\$70.00) or any part of it as is needed, for flags and suitable exercises on Memorial Day, to be expended under the Direction of the George Ryder Post American Legion No. 71 of Hanover.

Upon motion:

Voted: that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, for the construction of a building to house fire apparatus for the protection of the Village of Etna and vicinity and for the purchase of other apparatus for that purpose.

Upon motion:

Voted: That the Town authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Hanover, to sell and to execute Quit Claim Deeds, from time to time, covering the interest of the Town in certain School Lots so called located in different parts of the town and now leased on long term, such sales to be made at figures on which the annual rentals would represent income at 5 per cent.

Upon the following motion introduced by Professor George D. Lord, it was—

Voted: "That the Selectmen of Hanover, be requested and required hereby (1st) to investigate the possibilities of securing and providing as occasion may require, a suitable assembly room for the holding of Town Meetings required by Law, and further that the Selectmen be requested to prepare a report of this investigation and finally to present their report at the next annual Town Meeting."

Voted to amend the foregoing vote by addition of the following provision.

"To authorize the Selectmen to expend in this investigation a sum not exceeding (\$100.00) said sum to be provided from the moneys authorized by previous vote."

Under Article 10 of the Warrant it was-

Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the town's obligations, until the taxes have been collected and paid into the Treasury.

Voted: That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of five per cent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15th, 1924, and a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before September 15th, 1924.

Voted: To accept the reports of the Town Officers as published in the Town Report.

The following resolution introduced by Professor Robert Fletcher was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas the late Don S. Bridgman served the Town of Hanover as Selectman continuously during a period of twenty-nine years, be it *Resolved* that we the citizens of Hanover, in town meeting assembled, hereby express our appreciation of the long and faithful service rendered to the town by Mr. Bridgman; and be it further *Resolved* that the Clerk is instructed to enter this resolution in the minutes of this meeting and send a copy thereof to Mrs. Bridgman."

At the Biennial Election in the Town of Hanover, November 4th, 1924, Charles A. Holden and James P. Richardson were elected representatives to the General Court.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN OF HANOVER

The Selectmen of the Town of Hanover herewith present their Annual Report.

In accordance with last year's vote of the town the selectmen have bought considerable equipment which has been of great service during the past year and which will be in the future. Statements are given in another part of the report showing the equipment costs and the operation and maintenance expenses.

On the Trunk Line Highway the eighteen foot wide bituminous macadam has been completed to the top of Jones' Hill (4000 feet), the shoulders of the remanider of the road to the end of the old waterbound macadam beyond Mr. Harvey Fullington's have been widened with bituminous macadam (1940 feet); a bituminous road has been continued from the latter point to the bridge beyond the Villa Clara Farm (2350 feet) and the base placed for a bituminous macadam road from the bridge to the foot of County Hill (2900 feet). This year the top course will be placed and the new construction carried several hundred feet up County Hill

A gravel surfacing was given to the Trunk Line road from the top of County Hill to the Lyme Line (2.1 miles). Most of this was oiled.

A top surface of gravel was placed on the State Aid Road from the Precinct Line to the Lebanon Line and the surface covered with oil (3.05 miles). Each of these gravel surfaces is soft so that they will rut in the spring and it will take two or three years for them to get well consolidated.

These roads will be brought to shape and oiled as soon as conditions permit.

Much study was given to the subject of enlarging the store house which is located on the Common in Etna. Such enlargement would result in further increasing the disfigurement caused to the Common by the present sheds and materials. Further, a long string of sheds with no adjacent area does not give satisfactory storage. After considerable investigation, the Selectmen were able to purchase from Mrs. M. M. Huntington, an extremely satisfactory plot of land for a new storage plant. Due to the hearty sympathy with the project, Mrs. E. H. Waterman sold a right-of-way to the above land. The Selectmen appreciate the assistance of all who made the development possible, and particularly that of the Men's Cub of Etna which paid one hundred and fifty dollars from their treasury,—the purchase price of the Huntington land, and whose Committee cooperated with the Selectmen. A section of a new storehouse has been constructed in the new location and an additional section needs to be built in the near future.

The work of widening the town highways has been continued this year resulting in great improvement to the roads thus widened. During the coming year it is proposed to give particular attention to removing boulders and rock from the town roads and to widening them so that the water will be drained away from the travelled road and not run in it. It is hoped also to replace the Paine Bridge with one of concrete and to build a piece of State Aid road from Cutting's Corner towards Etna. Due to the use of the screen on the belt conveyor, the stones above two inches in Merrill's bank were screened out and are now in piles at the bank. As a result they are not on the surface of the State Aid road where they are not wanted and they are available for use in the foundation of the new road where they are desirable.

The abutments of the bridge at the head of Goose Pond on the East side road have been re-laid and an iron bridge, designed to carry safely a fifteen ton road roller, has been erected. Because of becoming in very poor condition, largely through the use of heavy trucks in wet weather, an unanticipated large amount of work had to be expended upon the northerly part of the main east side road. This included blasting out many boulders and cutting the trees and brush back from the road upon which they had encreached.

It has not yet been necessary to secure by notes money for the enlarged highway program of the past year. This is made possible by the fact that some of the funds collected through taxes do not have to be expended until the latter part of the year. The true financial condition is exhibited in the Assets and Liabilities table which shows over four thousand dollars excess of current Assets over Liabilities. The proposed Budget for 1925 has been made up to require nearly the same amount of money to be raised by taxes as in 1924. The Selectmen desire, however, to be authorized to borrow on one year notes a sum not to exceed ten thousand dollars so that some work in addition to that shown by the Budget may be done. If all of the Trunk Line work had been accomplished and all liabilities had been met it would have been necessary to secure by notes about \$13,600 instead of \$14,000 as authorized.

TRUSTEES

A year ago the trustees called the attention of their fellow townspeople to the need of a more liberal support of their town library. On conference with the trustees of the town funds the ruling was made that the surplus above the principal of the library fund might as well be applied to the immediate needs of the library. What some of these needs were appears in the report above:—a new bookcase, renewal of the fire insurance policy, repairs, care of buildings, etc. This surplus is now practically gone, and the income from all invested funds yields less than \$50 per year. The entire allowance, by law, from the town is only \$184.00 per year.

No one will deny that an up-to-date library should have the best of the new books published, at least two or three leading periodicals (we now take the Literary Digest, The National Geographic Magazine and Hanover Gazette) and provide all reasonable facilities for readers. We have insistent calls for more books for the young people; and adults constantly inquire for the more noteworthy books before the public. We try to select the best. Deducting the amount of the temporary note, we expended last year about \$460.00, and but little more than \$100 was available. This is not giving our people the benefit which they should

derive from their library in the way of entertainment and instruction. The trustees feel that the library should have more generous treatment.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN

1924

During the Fire Season of 1924, the driest on record of the Weather Bureau, we were fortunate in not having a fire of consequence. One small fire had to be reported, but this did no damage and there were no costs for the same, other than checking up and reporting.

Five requests for burning brush and two for party cooking fires were refused from a point of safety. There were posted throughout the town one hundred and fifty prevention notices and two newspaper insertions made. The total costs of posting notices, checking one fire, attending Warden's conference, inspecting and reporting steam mills and time spent with District Chief were fifty dollars and forty-five cents (\$50.45).

If you have brush or rubbish isn't it safer for you and your neighbor to cart it to some place away from the highway and let it decay rather than take a chance.

The Warden wishes to thank the inhabitants of the town and all others for their co-operation in the work. It is hoped that we may be as fortunate in regard to fires during the coming year as we have been during the past year.



A meeting of the legal voters of the Village Precinct of Hanover was called to order by Frank A. Musgrove at 8.30 o'clock P.M.

The warrant was read by the clerk.

- Article 1: Frank A. Musgrove was elected moderator for one year.
- Article 2: Ira W. Leavitt was elected clerk for one year.
- Article 3: Voted to accept and place on file the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer and Auditor.
- Article 4: Alfred W. Guyer was elected treasurer for one year. Harold G. Gordon was elected Auditor for one year. Roland A. Lewin was elected Precinct Commissioner for three years.
- Article 5: Voted that the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the current year according to the items as set forth in the budget presented to this meeting.
- Article 6: Voted that the commissioners be and hereby are authorized to subscribe in the name and on behalf of the Precinct for five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) additional stock in the Hanover Water Works Co., at par.

That the commissioners be further authorized to make tentative arrangements for a future subscription to additional stock for consideration at some future meeting of the Precinct.

That the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.) be raised and appropriated this year to apply to the above mentioned subscription and that the authority be granted for borrowing on a note of the Precinct the remaining two thousand five hundred (2,500.), such note to be payable in 1925.

Article 7: Voted that the Precinct Commissioners be and hereby are authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the expenses of the Village Precinct before taxes are raised, collected and paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Precinct.

Voted that upon all taxes on personal property and upon real estate, paid on or before the 15th day of July 1924, a discount of five percent be allowed the tax payer, and that taxes upon personal property and real estate paid on or upon the 15th day of September 1924, a discount of three percent be allowed the taxpayer.

Voted to adjourn at 8.55 P.M.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of the Hanover Town School District:

I submit herewith my fifth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The year that ended in June was, on the whole, a very successful year. Eight were graduated from the eighth grade, and six of these, together with two others who attended elementary schools, one in Lyme and one in Lebanon, entered high school in the Fall.

Teachers

We have been fortunate in retaining our teachers. Some changes will occur every year. We lost three this year. Miss Tuttle, Miss Rock and Miss Lind. Mrs. Campbell succeeds Miss Tuttle at Etna Grammar, Miss Noble takes the place of Miss Lind at the Pinneo, and Mr. Martin succeeds Miss Rock at the Highlands, and Miss Boyden was placed at the North Neighborhood school, opened at the urgent request of the parents in that vicinity after having been closed for many years.

Buildings

It had been planned to put the County Road building in good condition. It seriously needed attention. But it was found impossible to get the work done during the summer. It is hoped this can be done during the coming summer, and possibly some needed work at the Center. It is important that the buildings be kept in good condition, and needed improvements made from time to time. This is not alone for the comfort and health of the children, but to encourage in them the desire for having better living conditions. It is a worthy ambition to cultivate.

Finances

The fiscal year closed June 30, with a large cash balance. This was anticipated, and two thousand dollars were appropriated toward the expense of the present year. A somewhat smaller balance will probably be found at the end of the present year, and it is recommended again that \$1500 of this expected balance be used to reduce the amount that would be otherwise necessary to assess for high school tuition, etc.

The district receives practically the maximum amount of state aid allowed by law. Without this aid, the maintenance of the schools would be a heavy burden. The widely scattered population makes it seem necessary to maintain too many small schools. Such are expensive and are apt to be unprofitable, and even then it is necessary to pay a good deal of elementary tuition, and considerable transportation. There is, however, a provision of the law that may possibly operate to deprive us of this much-needed state aid. law provides that in a town containing two or more school districts, if the cost of the elementary schools in all the districts does not exceed the \$5 tax on a thousand of equalized valuation of the entire town, no one of the districts shall receive state aid. This condition may be found to exist at any time in Hanover. There would be only one relief if it should occur. That would be found in the union of the two districts.

The expense of maintaining too small schools should be avoided if possible, not so much because they are expensive, but because they are seldom worthwhile schools. It was not a wise move to open the North Neighborhood school, and unless there is an unexpected increase of school children in the Arvin neighborhood, it will be unwise to keep that school open next year.

Attendance

The average attendance has been very good. The serious irregularities are always caused by a few families.

Parents who allow their children to be irregular in attendance or tardy repeatedly cannot realize the great harm being done the children. It means much more than the loss of lessons, serious as that may be. It is certain, in time, to destroy the children's interest, and is likely to develop an attitude of irresponsibility toward any duty. It is hoped that we may have the cooperation of every home in this matter, not only that the letter of the law may be observed, but especially that the children may not suffer from habits of irregularity.

Health Work

The nurse, Miss Sawyer, who is provided as public health nurse by the Red Cross, is doing good work in the schools. She feels, however, that she is handicapped by the fact that we have no physician to make thorough examinations. I would suggest that arrangements be made to have a physician do this work. The health work is of very great importance to the children and the community. It should be thoroughly done.

Work of the Schools

The work of the schools has progressed for the year very satisfactorily. The chief emphasis is being laid on the fundamental subjects and this is being well done. A new system of teaching writing has been introduced, and it seems to be working well. It is too early, however, to form any conclusion as to the results that ultimately may be expected. It is a good system, and certainly should give better results than the haphazard method that has prevailed in the past.

The teachers have shown this year a fine professional spirit, and are working hard, and the children are responding well. An excellent year's work should be accomplished.
