REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

FOR THE YEAR ENDING

MARCH 13, 1865.

DISTRICT NO. 1.

This school is in two departments, and has had three terms in each. The first and third terms of 12 and 11 weeks for the small scholars was under the care of Mrs. Taylor, who managed and taught this department with her usual success. She appears admirably adapted to her work. The district would do well to continue her services for years to come if they can be obtained.

The second term of this school of 12 weeks was taught by Miss Maria P. Johnson, who, after becoming more acquainted

with her task, succeeded better than at the beginning.

The Summer term of 12 weeks for the larger scholars was under the care of Miss Emma Brigham, and was evidently taught and managed with very good success. Miss Brigham is among

our most experienced and efficient teachers.

The Fall term of 10 weeks was taught by Miss Ellen F. Smalley. Under her skillful management the school appeared well, showing that mild treatment is not necessarily inefficient, nor harsh management necessary to order, quietness, and improvement. The Committee has never visited this school when it appeared better.

The Winter term of 10½ weeks was taught by Mr. Jason H. Dudley. Mr. Dudley is prompt and energetic, awakening mental activity and promoting a clear perception in his pupils. The

school appeared well at the close of his term.

Whole number of scholars 147.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

Summer term 10 weeks, by Miss Augie E. Hadley—an experienced and successful teacher.

Winter term 12 weeks, by Miss Hattie M. Bailey. Management and instruction commendable.

Whole number of scholars 9.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

Summer term 8 weeks by Miss Ruth F. Hurlbutt.

Winter term 9 weeks, by Miss Estella A. Tracy. This school needs a stricter discipline, and to have a spirit of closer application and perseverance infused into it.

Whole number of scholars 21.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

The Summer, Fall and Winter terms of this school were taught by Miss Lucy E. Fellows. She has not been surpassed by any as an able, faithful and successful teacher and disciplinarian. On account of the advanced standing of several scholars and the variety of studies, none of our schools have demanded or received more labor from the teacher than this.

In her Report the teacher remarks "that the school has sustained its former character in respect to whispering. The smallest scholars have made improvement in that respect." She also says of the Winter term, that the attendance has been very prompt. About twenty have no tardy marks, eleven have not been absent one half day, and the average attendance of thirty is TWENTY-EIGHT!

Whole number of scholars 36.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

A Summer term of 12 weeks and a Winter term of ten weeks-Miss Ellen F. Smalley, teacher. Miss Smalley here fully sustained her former good reputation as a teacher. See District No. 1.

A department of small scholars was taught in the Winter by Miss Lucy R. Hurlbutt. with good satisfaction to the Committee and the District.

Whole number of scholars 38.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

Summer term of 10 weeks and a Winter term of 11 weeks, taught by Miss Susan S. Chandler. The school appeared well when visited. In the Winter term there were only five scholars. Their progress was commendable.

Whole number of scholars 16.

DISTRICT NO. 7.

Summer term 10 weeks, taught by Miss Lucy E. Grant, with very good success. It was her first term in teaching.

Fall term 10 weeks, by Miss Martha A. Warren. School ap-

peared well when visited. It was not visited at the close.

Winter term 10 weeks, by Miss Lizzie W. Johnson. Miss Johnson sustained her former high reputation. See District No. 17. Progress good; a very commendable improvement in reading.

Whole number of scholars 24.

DISTRICT NO. 8.

Summer term 10 weeks, Miss Gustie B. Hatch, teacher. Not visited at the close. School appeared well when visited. Winter term 8 weeks, Mr. Horace F. Hoyt Jr., teacher. Mr. Hoyt has made a good beginning as a teacher. Whole number of scholars 11.

DISTRICT NO. 9.

Summer term 10 weeks, by Miss Mary Orr. Her first term. School appeared well.

Fall term 10 weeks, by Miss Lizzie M. Alden, with very com-

mendable success; progress good.

Whole number of scholars 9.

DISTRICT NO. 10.

Summer term of 7 weeks and Winter term of 11 weeks, taught by Miss Mary C. Rawson. Miss Rawson ranks among our best teachers, and this school among our most advanced and best schools.

Whole number of scholars 15.

DISTRICT NO. 11.

Summer term 9 weeks, Miss Sarah J. Harris, teacher, and Winter term 8 weeks, Miss Augusta A. Merrill, teacher. This school has been well taught and well managed, and has been doing better than for two years previous.

Whole number of scholars 13.

DISTRICT NO. 12.

Summer term 8 weeks, Miss Lorinda C. Withington, teacher. An experienced and faithful teacher. In a quiet way she main-

tains order and promotes the improvement of her pupils.

The Winter term was well commenced by Miss Lizzie M. Hadley. On account of sickness she left in a few weeks. Mr. G. C. Furber taught a short time and left. In all it continued 7 weeks. The Winter term was therefore a failure.

Whole number of scholars 23.

DISTRICT NO. 13.

Summer term 10 weeks, Miss D. M. Colcord, teacher. The school at the close gave evidence of good order and thorough instruction.

The Winter term was commenced by Miss Agnes Bailey, but continued only $6\frac{1}{3}$ weeks on account of the illness of the teacher, who is classed with our best teachers.

Whole number of scholars 24.

DISTRICT NO. 14.

This very small school had two terms of 7 and 8 weeks, Miss Helen M. Brown, teacher. She devoted her time, not necessary to the lessons of the large scholars, to teaching the younger, Hymns, general items in Geography, &c. Whole number of scholars 4.

DISTRICT NO. 15.

Summer term 10 weeks and Winter term 13 weeks, Miss Julia A. Flanders, teacher. This school is composed of small scholars with two exceptions. It has evidently been under the care of a faithful teacher.

Whole number of scholars 10.

DISTRICT NO. 16.

Summer term 8 weeks, Miss Eliza E. Hoyt, teacher. Miss

Hoyt's first term in teaching. School appeared well.

Winter term 9 weeks, Miss Sarah J. Harris, teacher. The school was small when visited at the close, but the teacher evidently deserves commendation.

Whole number of scholars 13.

DISTRICT NO. 17.

Summer term 10 weeks, Miss Harriet L. Smith, teacher. A

stricter discipline would have improved this school.

Fall and Winter term 16 weeks, Miss Lizzie W. Johnson, teacher. Several from another District attended here this term and the school was one of the first character. Miss Johnson is very successful in the department of reading.

Whole number of scholars 20.

DISTRICT NO. 18.

This small school had a Winter term of 10 weeks, Miss Georgianna Harris, teacher. Her services were highly acceptable to the Committee and to the District.

Whole number of scholars 9.

The teachers employed for the instruction and management of our schools the past year have numbered 35, 3 males and 32 females, 15 of whom have their home in this town.

Whole number of weeks of schooling 369.

Whole number of scholars 446.

With few exceptions these teachers have been efficient and successful, and some of them of the first quadifications; also faithful and conscientions in the discharge of their duty. With very few exceptions the schools exhibited good order and quietness, and there has been commendable and in some instances marked progress.

The Registers report 84 visits of the Superintending Committee, and of the Prudential Committees, 23. Other visitors 283.

The Superintending Committee, by furnishing books at the lowest wholesale prices, and by exchanging for old books at half price, has succeeded in introducing a set of books at comparatively reduced expense to the schools.

These books are thought to be the best of their kind, and if parents will purchase those recommended, when they procure new books, the work will be completed of having such uniformity as will greatly facilitate the proper classing of the schools;—and be an accommodation to those, who go from one school to another, as is frequently done.

In the opinion of the Committee it would be money well expended, if the Districts would instruct their Prudential Committees to purchase a set of Reading Books and a Grammar for the use of the teacher in each of the schools, to be kept for that purpose from year to year. As it now is, the teacher in most cases depends upon some scholar for the use of a book while the class recites or practices in reading.

Finally in relation to books, it is recommended that the town pass a vote that the books introduced and now in use be continued to be used in the schools for five years from this time.

The following are the books recommended and now very generally used: — Town and Holbrook's Progressive Readers and Speller, Weld & Quackenbos' Grammar, Adams,' and Greenleaf's National, Colburn's, and Emerson's Arithmetics, Quackenbos' History of the United States, small and large, Colton & Fitch's Geography, Cutter's Physiology, Davies' Algebra.
