## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the town of Hanover, in the County [L. s.] of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Towen Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Hayes' Hall, in said Hanover, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will approve and ratify the action of the Selectmen in completing the West-side trunkline State highway, so called, and in borrowing for that purpose in addition to the $\$ 10,000$ already authorized a further sum of $\$ 2,500$.
4. To see if the town will vote to change the place of holding the annual Town Meetings and the biennial and primaries' elections from the Village of Etna to the Precinct of Hanover in said Town, upon petition of Edwin J. Bartlett, John M. Gile, Thomas W. D. Worthen and others.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote, raise, and appropriate to defray the expenses of observing Old Home Week.
6. To see if the town will vote to have a liquor agent for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, one hundred dollars of said sum toward the expense of lighting the streets of Hanover, and fifty dollars toward the expense of lighting the streets of Etna.
8. To see if the town will vote to reopen that portion of the highway leading from the residence of W. L. Wardrobe to the highway by the M. Woodward place.
9. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen, or pass any vote relating thereto and transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

## ENGINEER'S REPORT ON STATE HIGHWAY

At the last annual meeting the town voted to rase $\$ 4,000$ and to authorize the selecrmen to hire $\$ 10,000$ more for the purpose of completing, in part at least, that portion of the so-called "West Side State Road" lying within the limits of the town. As the Governor and Council and State Engineer were inclined to do all that they could to push the work along to completion the selectmen very wisely corcluded to finish the work if possible before the end of the working season and in accordance with the scheme as outlined at the last annual meeting.

The work was done under two contracts, but in each case by the same firm, the "Lane Construction Corpora. tion," and for a fixed unit price for each class of work. The prices seemed in some cases rather high but the unit prices of the contracting party were in general lower than those of the other bidders and the gross amount considerably lower. The first contract covered the territory from the town line on the West Lebanon road to the north end of Park St. in Hanover Village. For about 4510 feet of this distance the road is built of gravel obtained from the farm of C. W. Stone, adjacent to Mink Bronk. The remainder, about 2010 feet, was built of local stone macadam. The width of the hardened surface of this ruad was 15 feet and its depth in case of the macadam 6 inches and of the gravel 8 inches. On each side were wings of earth 4 feet wide, making the total width improved 23 feet. The extra sources of expense under this contract were for 219 square yards of telford base, 720 feet of side drains, and 965 feet guard rails.

The second contract covered the remaining portion of the distance from Park St. to the town line on the so-called County RJad, about 34755 feet, making the total length improved under both contracts about 7.84 miles and the total distance from the town line on the south to that on the north about 8.06 miles.

According to the plan as outlined and provided for financially at the annual meeting this portion of the road was to be built of gravel, but no suitable gravel being found for the lower end of the line it was found necessary to construct the first 16,000 feet of macadam. The stone for this purpose was taken from a ledge on the Jones' estate about 2 miles north of the village. This stone is of good quailty and it is predicted that this portion of the road will prove one of the best in the state. This change, added to the cost about $\$ 2.079$ per mile for the 16,000 feet and accounted in a large measure for the excess in cost over the estimate as presented at the annual meeting. The gravel used for the rest of the road was the best obtainable, and a marked improvement upon the old surface material. The road for the whole distance is much wider, is well graded transversely and the longitudinal grades are very much improved. It is a question in the mind of the writer, whether it would not have been more economical in the end to have continued the macadam at least as far as the junction of the River and County roads. The width and other dimensions of the hardened surface of this portion were the same as those of the first contract but the wings were each I foot narrower.

A gnod deal of attention was paid to drainage, a good many new culverts were put in and all except three of the old ones were rebuilt, or replaced by other forms In all there were 25 corrugated iron culverts put 1 n , having a combined length of 720 feet each with a concrete head wall at each end. Four dry masonry rulverts were rebuilt and 8 masonry culverts were rebuilt with a concrete top. A
foundation of 6 inches of sand was put under the macadam from sta. 4 to sta. 105 except where there are V.drains or telford. About 625 feet of so.called V-drains were put down, and 600 sq. yds. of telford base. About 2215 feet of of side drains were laid in the various wet places. One ronsiderable item of extra expense was for guard rails, of which there are about 6556 feet.

The work was begun about the first of May and ener. getically pushed by the contractors to completion, which practically occurred the first of November, eight months before the contract time expired. According to the report of the State Engineer just issued Hanover has the honor of being the only town on the West Side Road to complete its portion of the line within the year. The expense for this highway may seem to some large but it should be born in mind that it is much less per mile than is being expended in most states and ours is supposed to be a part of a trunk line from one end of the state to the other. The total cost of the road is given in the selectmen's report to which reference is herewih made.

J. V. HAZEN

Prof. J. V. Hazen, the local engineer, has kindly given a detailed report of the State Higwhay. The selectmen will only add that the expense would have easily come within the appropriation but for the absence of gravel. After consulting with a large number of our heaviest taxpayers it was the unanimous opinion that it was for the best interest of the town that the road should be completed; which was done by utilizing the trap rock near the Jones place and borrowing an additional $\$ 2500$. It was considered wise to do this when we had the men, machinery and tools all here rather than to be to the
expense of a new contract for a small job. The highway is now completed from the Lebanon line to the Lyme line. The town bills are all paid, there are no outstanding orders, and a small balance remains in the treasury.

## REPORT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1910

At the school meeting in March, 1910, Vesta F. Gile, Sidney B. Fay, and Harry E. Burton were elected members of the school board to take the places of retiring members: Elizabeth W. Worthen. Charles D. Adams, and D. Collin Wells. Two committees were appointed, one to consider the advisability of establishing a supervisory system, the other to consider the advisability of introducing a commercial course. The former committee will report at the school meeting in March, 1911 ; the latter has recommended to the school board the introduction of a commercial course.

In September, 1910, Mr. B. C. Merry, formerly principal of the Wareham (Mass.) High school, assumed charge of the school. Two new assistants had been appointed to fill vacancies in the High School. The four teachers in the grades had been reappointed. It was decided to have as a tentative arrangement a one-session day in the High School, lasting from 8.30 to 12.45 . The plan has proved to be eminently successful; both teachers and pupils are able to utilize their time to much greater advantage; the pupils now have ample time at home for the proper preparation of their work. An effort has been made in the arrangement of the High School courses to specialize as far as possible the work of the individual teachers.

The school year has been increased from thirty-six to thirty-seven weeks.

Both in scholarship and in discipline the High School and the grades are in admirable condition. The only thing which causes the Board any concern is the overcrowded
condition of the building and the consequent difficulty of carrying on the work properly and effectively. With the present facilities it appears to be impossible to introduce a commercial course and with only a slight increase in the present number of pupils it would be impossible to continue the work now being done. The need of a new building to accommodate the High School is urgent and should receive immediate consideration.
