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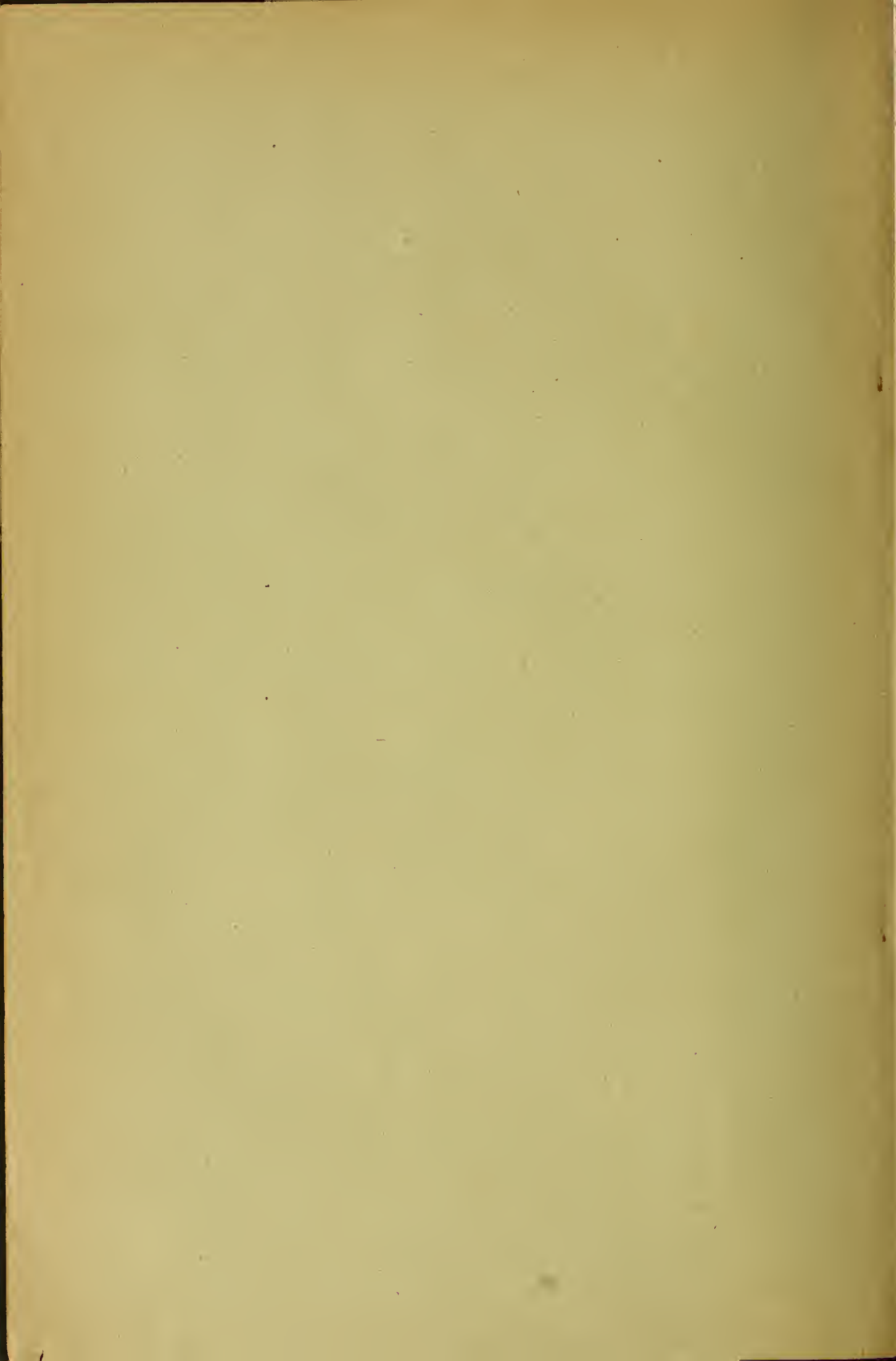



During the year, as for several years past, school has been maintained for three terms of fifteen, eleven and ten weeks respectively. The average attendance in the primary grade has been somewhat lower than usual, due to the fact that there have been several cases of mumps, diptheria and scarletina in the district. The latter have been confined to a very few families, thanks to the efficient action of the Board of Health.

Acknowledgment must be made of the continued faithful services of Mr. James Cunningham whose thorough and constant care of the building, as to the heating and cleanliness, has contributed in very large degree to the success of the schools.

A first class article, whatever it may be, is always in demand, and will always command a fair price, and besides it is often difficult to obtain.

There are plenty of teachers, good, bad and indifferent, and many more who wish to teach are seeking positions. Out of the large number only a comparatively few have had the necessary training and experience, and have proved themselves first class teachers such as our people demand. Training and experience alone cannot make a successful teacher, there must be a certain natural adaptation to the work.

Our teachers have been selected with the greatest care from a large number of available candidates, and have in each case proved the wisdom of their choice. For the past year we

have had the good fortune to retain all the old board of teachers, thanks to the liberal policy of our tax payers. Our people demand the very best teaching and have come to understand that it can only be secured by paying a fair compensation, and this the most are not only willing but glad to do. To pay low wages to teachers is not economy but waste.

It is safe to say that our schools have not fallen from the high standard of previous years. We should, however, aim to make an advance. How can this be done?

We reply, for any important advance, an enlargement of our school building is absolutely necessary. With our present school building a new era for our schools began. With the needed addition to our present building a great advance might be made. Good as our building is, unless an addition be made soon, we shall fall behind the times.

Elementary science is now recognized in the best schools as an important branch of instruction. We have given a good deal of thought and attention to this subject, and for the past three or four years the elements of the natural sciences have been successfully taught. We had hoped to make further progress in this direction, but at present it is not possible to do so.

To make the sciences interesting and profitable some simpler apparatus is essential. A few things have been purchased, and more are needed.

During the year we have bought almost nothing, because we had no suitable place either to use or store apparatus. If apparatus were given us we should hardly know whether it would be wise to accept it. When tools are to be used there must be a place to use and keep them. A blacksmith cannot well do his work in the family kitchen, nor a carpenter in the sitting room.

We need cloak rooms for the comfort and convenience of our children, but these are not essential; the outer garments can be put in the entries and scattered over the stairs as now, but is this satisfactory?

We need broader and better stairs that our school hall may be used without feeling that it is almost a crime to assemble our

children there. There are those in our midst who do not go to a school graduation on account of the danger to which they are exposed.

Should fire break out in the building when the hall is in use who could picture what the result might be?

We can get along without the changes necessary to make the hall safe and available and risk the chances, are we willing to do so longer?

In order to make further progress we must have a small laboratory for the sciences and a library room. Is it wise to keep putting off what we know should be done?

Let us consider this matter and do our duty to ourselves and our children.

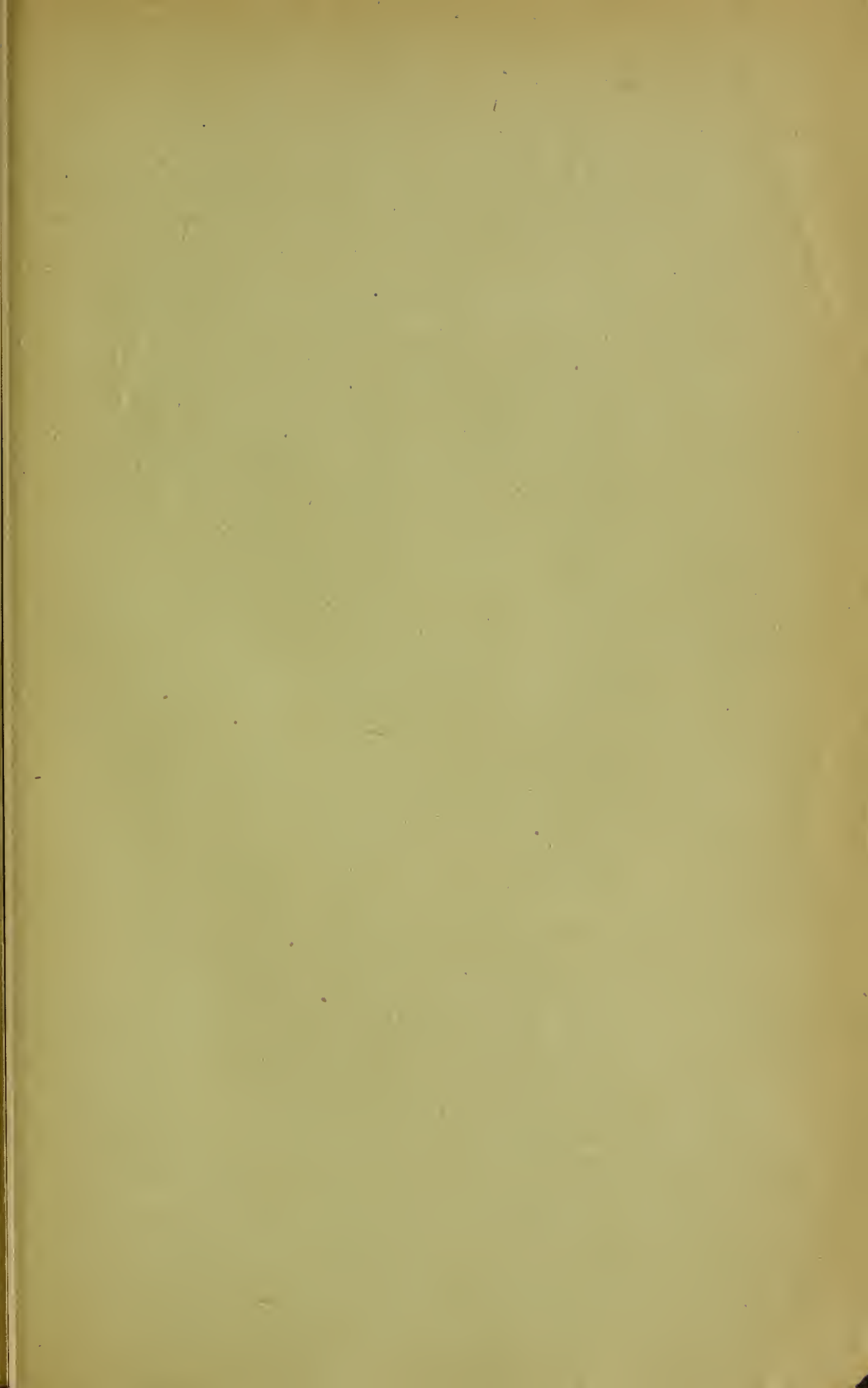
