To no one man are our schools so much indebted as to the late James W. Patterson. In 1878, through his influence, the School Committee was replaced by a Board of Education, and up to the time of his death he was Chairman of the Board, and with few exceptions, selected all the teachers employed in our schools.

. His solid good sense, mature experience, familiarity with educational systems and intimate acquaintance with the schools of the state, made the service rendered of especial value.

This service, as far as time permitted, he gave without stint, and few know the thought and labor involved.

It was for a long time his plan to extend the course of the High School, until this was found to be impracticable, and though the high ideal at which he aimed was never fully reached he took an especial pride in our schools, and on many occasions declared them to be the best in the state.

The vigorous impulse he gave to our schools will long be felt, as well as the wider influence exerted on the educational system of the state, which he did so much to reorganize and improve.

During the past year our schools have been in an unusually satisfactory condition, due largely to the fact that with but one exception we have been able to retain our old board of teachers. We should not have been able to do this, but for the liberality of our citizens in appropriating money at the last school meeting. No teacher, however experienced, can do her best work the first year, and as a rule the longer the service the more valuable it becomes.

The success attending the introduction of elementary science into the Intermediate Room, has led us to study the question of framing a connected course of science, beginning in the Primary Room and continuing throughout the schools.

It seems practical for the children in the Primary Room to learn the common terms and gain some clear notions of elementary science, and thus be able to enter more intelligently on the study of Physics and Botany in the Intermediate Room.

This instruction has already begun, carried on by means of pictures, the reading of easy books, and oral teaching, and we see no reason for its failing to prove a success.

Physiology is now begun in the Grammar Room and finished in the High School. It is proposed to finish it in the Grammar Room, and also to introduce into this room the elements of Chemistry. How far this experiment will prove a success remains to be determined. It will give a fairly systematic course of elementary science and is in line with what, is being done in the best schools in the country.

In our own experience it has been found that the facts of science sometimes arouse an interest in pupils who have showed no previous interest in study.

While desiring to emphasize the value of science study, it is not our purpose to give less attention to the essentials of the subjects already taught, though we think that some parts of these subjects have so little comparative value that they may be passed over lightly or omitted altogether.

The most approved science teaching is now carried on by the laboratory method in which most of the experiments are made by the pupils. So long as we have no laboratory, the work must be very elementary, and while valuable, only partially satisfactory.

We realize that however desirable it may be, a laboratory is out of the question for the present, but we hope that science teaching will be so successful and so far appreciated by our citizens that they will be glad to give the schools a laboratory in the near future.

Many of us never see our children assembled in the hall without thinking what might result in case of fire, or even an

alarm of fire. A moderate addition to our school building would give suitable stairs to our hall, beside cloak rooms, a library room and laboratory, thus giving the accommodations and facilities demanded by the times.

A few years ago we asked for an appropriation of twenty-five dollars to lay the foundation of a school library, and two similar appropriations have since been made. The library has been increased by the gifts of the Stockbridge [library and by gifts of books from various persons.

We have at present twenty dollars on hand, a gift from the ladies of the Hanover Book Club. The books purchased have been chosen with great care and the library has fully met the expectations formed in regard to it.

To some, the cost of maintaining our schools may seem large, but while we aim to economize as far as possible, and get an equivalent for every dollar expended, we know of no way of lessening the expense without cheapening our schools, which we believe our citizens would not approve.

The essentials for a good school are willing scholars and experienced and skillful teachers; such scholars and such teachers we have, hence the success of our schools. To secure teachers competent to do the high grade work which our citizens demand, a fair salary must be paid; we cannot get them without it, much less keep them.

Next in value to good teachers are the services of a competent and faithful janitor, such an one we have and we hope
to be able to keep him. Cleanliness throughout the entire
building has been constantly maintained, and the health and
comfort of teachers and pupils thus promoted.

Our citizens may congratulate themselves on our beautiful and convenient play ground, and the more as it is now fully paid for, and will be a source of income.

### REPORT OF THE TOWN DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD

At the beginning of the year we hoped to give the pupils better advantages in the shape of longer schools, but owing to seemingly unavoidable circumstances, this has not been done. Five schools have been maintained twenty two weeks, four schools twenty one, and two eleven and thirty weeks respectively. The last, the Tunis school, having been lengthened by the parents giving the board.

We have tried to give the scholars uniform advantages, and feel by reports of parents and pupils, and by the appearance of schools when visited, that we have been successful, in most cases, in our selection of teachers. Those who have taught our schools before, have worked hard to sustain their former good reputation; and our new teachers, with hardly an exception, have shown an aptness for, and a thoroughness in their work.

Hoping to incite new interest in geography and language, we have introduced Yaggy's Geographical Chart and a Primary Language Chart. We feel that they have thus far been a help in those schools where we have been able to place them.

Parents, we have a word for you. Many times you have been urged to coöperate with the teacher in her work. Some have cheerfully responded, while on the other hand there are many of you who have yet to see the wisdom of so doing, and to learn how much the success of the school depends upon you. We invite your special attention to the School Laws, that you may not, in ignorance, make remarks which are not true and which tend to weaken the schools. Ascribe to the teacher the powers that are legally due her; work with, instead of against her, and successful, profitable schools will surely result.
