THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Hayes Hall in said Hanover, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1st. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2nd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3rd. To see if the Town will vote to have a liquor agent for the ensuing year.

4th. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, one hundred dollars of said sum towards the expense of lighting the streets of Hanover, and fifty dollars towards the expense of lighting the streets of Etna.

5th. To determine to what amount the Town will vote to exempt from taxation property of Dartmouth College.

6th. To hear the report of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto, and transact any business that may legally come before said meeting.

ABSTRACT FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs at the hall of C. W. Hayes, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March, 1914, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harlow S. Person, the moderator; the warrant under which the meeting was called was read by the clerk, after which proceeded to the election of town officers and other business as follows:

For Town Clerk: George M. Bridgman.

For Selectmen: Don S. Bridgman, Frank I. Spencer, and Edwin P. Merrill.

For Treasurer, Daniel B. Russell.

For Auditors: Halsey C. Edgerton and John H. Foster.

For Library Trustee: Irving P. Fitts.

For Fence Viewers: William J. Boyd, Frank A. Adams, and Daniel O. Hoyt.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber: John J. Bond and William H. Hart.

For Sealer of Weights and Measures: John E. Cassin.

For Prosecuting Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Laws: Arthur P. Fairfield.

Voted:

That the town raise the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars to defray the various town expenses, and pay the interest on the notes of the town, and that the selectmen be instructed to use any balance to apply on the principal of the notes in such amounts as the treasury will warrant.

Voted:

To have a liquor agent for the ensuing year.

Voted:

To instruct the selectmen to apply for state aid for highways.

Voted:

To raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars; one hundred dollars of said sum towards the expense of lighting the streets of Hanover, and fifty dollars towards lighting the streets of Etna.

Voted:

To raise the sum of fifteen hundred dollars for the support of schools in excess of the amount required by law.

Voted:

To renew the action taken at the March meeting, 1913, namely:

To authorize the selectmen to borrow a sum of ten thousand dollars, the same to be appropriated towards the construction of a new granite and concrete bridge across Connecticut River at, or near the site of the present Ledyard Bridge, so-called, provided that said sum of ten thousand dollars shall be so borrowed and expended only on the specific condition that the full amount needed to pay for said bridge shall be otherwise secured without further expense to the town.

Voted:

To raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen hundred dollars for the maintenance of trunk line highways in order to take advantage of state's appropriation of two thousand three hundred and fifty dollars.

Voted:

That the Selectmen of the town of Hanover be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to prepare and issue, in pamphlet form, a full and complete statement of the assessed valuation of all real property in said town of Hanover, this statement to give such details and names of

owners as shall intelligibly describe each separate piece of real estate.

Voted:

That the first issue of this statement be made not later than July 1st, 1914, giving the valuation as stated above for the current year; and that a similar pamphlet shall be published not later than July 1st of each succeeding year, or until this action shall have been made nugatory by subsequent action.

Voted:

That this pamphlet shall be sent free of charge to all voters of the town of Hanover.

Voted:

That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of five per cent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15th, 1914, and a discount of three per cent be allowed the taxpayer if paid on or before September 15th, 1914.

Voted:

To accept and adopt the reports of town officers as published in the Annual Report.

Voted: to adjourn.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote for Senator, on the Tuesday next following the first Monday of November, 1914, at Grange Hall, in said town, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harlow S. THE STONE BRIDGES

The two bridges over Mink brook on main highways, had long been in a dangerous condition. The requirements of modern automobile travel, road rollers, Standard Oil Co.'s wagons, and the unknown requirements for traction engines in the future called for unusually wide and strong bridges. The foundation and abutments of the old bridges were only of dry masonry, had been heaved by frost and were in such bad shape that entire rebuilding was necessary from the bottom up. The problem was to get permanent bridges, good for all the future, if possible.

Wooden bridges in these days for such traffic are out of the question, because not durable enough and too costly to maintain. A price was asked for heavy steel plate girders, 40 ft. span for a concrete floor, and the figure given was \$1,775. The abutments and wing walls properly built, would cost \$1,000 or \$1,200 at least; total nearly \$3,000 for one. By courtesy of the College authorities the massive stone work in the foundation of the old bank building was offered free of cost if the town would haul it away. Then, as there was a considerable amount of stone under and near the old bridge, and plenty not far away, the writer proposed a stone arch, and drew a plan for the same. A study of the drainage area of Mink brook showed that a 40 ft. water-way was too much, and the span was fixed at 28 ft.

The Lane Construction Co. was then building the Tuck highway for the College and was asked to make a bid for building a stone bridge on the plans shown, having the benefit of the stone at hand. They wanted more than \$5,000. This was deemed too high. It was calculated that such a sum would almost build two bridges across the brook, and the Selectmen decided to use home talent,

buy for themselves, the material needed, and keep the money in town. This was done and the results have justified expectations.

There was no attempt to build nicely finished stonework, but simply rough and massive construction. Only the parapets are visible to those who merely cross the bridges; hence shaping and finishing on the arch and faces was not needed. Yet their appearance has been highly commended by those who have viewed them from upstream. No. 1, on W. Lebanon road, has a reinforced arch between the faces; No. 2, is built wholly of stone concrete. For the successful accomplishment of this work, sometimes under considerable difficulty and hardship, the town is indebted to the skill and perseverance of Mr. Henry, Supt., and Mr. Brisson and Mr. Jackson, masons, and the others whose labors have given to the town these truly monumental structures.

Acknowledgments are due also to Mr. Cutting, Mr. LaBombard and the late Chas. W. Stone for offer of stone on their premises and for friendly co-operation in carrying on the work.

As to comparative cost, it is believed that steel bridges would have cost nearly, and perhaps quite as much as the stone bridges. The difference for the new foundations, abutments and wingwalls would be that steel girders would have required higher abutments. The saving if any, would hardly have been more than \$500, and the interest on that sum would barely suffice to keep them painted and maintain the floors. The stone bridges are believed to be sufficient for any possible future load that will ever pass on the road. They are permanent for generations to come, cost nothing to maintain, and are more desirable, even if they cost more. These with the nine-foot stone arch over the spillway at the reservoir give Hanover the distinction of having the only stone highway bridges so far as we are aware, in all northern New Hampshire.

March 3, 1915

The selectmen have been advised by the State Tax Commission to call attention of the voters to the alarming increase in public expenditures in New Hampshire during the past ten years.

In 1903 the sum of all the taxes assessed by and within the State of New Hampshire was \$5,373,420.32.

In 1913 the sum of these taxes was \$8,765,039.07; an increase of \$3,391,618.85 in ten years.

This is an increase of 63%.

Meanwhile the population of the State has increased only 4½%.

In 1903 taxes averaged \$12.88 for each man, woman and child in the State.

In 1913 they averaged \$20.09.

The wage earner or the man of limited means may think that he is not paying taxes.

Taxes are hidden in the rent he pays; in the cost of his food; his clothes; his travel.

If the man fully realized this, his influence and his vote would more frequently make for economy and care in appropriations and expenditures.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT NUMBER ONE

For the past year the High School has had the advantage of having the same principal and two of the same teachers as last year. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Morton was filled by Miss Payson, a graduate of Brown University with three years' experience in teaching. Miss Hayes has been retained as teacher in the Commercial Course. Mr. Bushnell was engaged at the beginning of the year as teacher in Chemistry at a salary of \$150. This has formerly been paid from funds of Moor's Charity School; but the fund being no longer available this teacher must be paid this year and in the future from the regular appropriations of the district. Mr. Colley has until within a few weeks, given a weekly lesson in music to students in the High School.

At the beginning of the school year the number of students had so increased that a separate teacher was provided for each grade so that we now have eight teachers for the eight grades. To accommodate these eight grades in different rooms it was necessary to use the laboratory for one grade and the hall for another. While the board do not feel that this arrangement is ideal it is better than having two grades in one room and is the best that could be done. Miss Beverage, a normal school graduate of Gorham, with three years' experience in teaching was engaged to take Miss Hennessey's place who had resigned, and Miss Marshall, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School was engaged to teach the seventh grade. Until the middle of the year we were fortunate enough to retain the services of Miss Gilman. An offer of a higher salary elsewhere made her resign. With her resignation the school

sustained a serious loss as she was one of our best teachers. Her place has been filled by Miss Pearson, a graduate of Plymouth Normal School with two years' experience in teaching, and the work in the sixth grade seems to be going on satisfactorily. Miss Campbell and Miss Andrews have charge respectively of grades three and five, as last year. Miss Hall, who formerly taught both first and second grades was given grade two only, and two new teachers, Miss Jackson and Miss Riford, both graduates of the Concord Training School, were engaged to teach grades one and four. All of our teachers, both in High School and the grades, are certified teachers and as such the District received from the state, for each teacher, two dollars per week.

The singing during the year, in the grades, has been under the competent guidance of Mrs. Little, whose plan for grading the instruction in music promises to add greatly to the efficiency of this department.

Mr. Fay resigned from the school board in September, and in accordance with the law Mr. Musgrove was appointed to fill the position until the next annual meeting.

The statistics of attendance and scholarship are given in tables which follow.
