## REPORT.

OF THE

# SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

1853.

### REPORT.

In one sense, we may report the Schools of Hanover, for the past twelve months, as doing well. We think they have taken a good step in advance of those of previous years. number of Districts are beginning to show a new and a warm interest, and are in the way of rapid improvement. Among them we would mention Districts No. 4.-13-17-5 and 7. The citizens visit the Schools in all these Districts. In No. 5 and 7 the past year two excellent school-houses have been built. They are both neat, tasteful and convenient buildings, and have been carefully used. No. 6 needs a new house, and it will probably be built the coming year. No. 9, 17 and some other Districts need better houses. We hope those Districts will talk this matter over. We say, that in one sense, the Schools have done well, still, the want of a zealous interest, of suitable houses in every District, of liberal wages, which the small means of the District do not allow to be paid, in many parts of the town, weigh heavily upon the Schools, and prevent their taking the conspicuous and useful position their importance demands. ing of the Schools, absolutely, with a few exceptions, we should make use of the terms, quiet, passable, fair, and not deserving strong praise or censure. The Schools in District No. 1 and 5 have been unusually well kept; and the teachers successful. Also, the winter Winter Schools of Nos. 3, 4, 6, 9, 13, 14, and 17. deserve to be particularly mentioned. Grammar was uncommonly well taught in the Summer School of No. 8, and Reading in the Winter School of No. 15.

Order, life and energy don't appear sufficiently in many of the Schools. Both Schools in No. 7, and the Summer School in No. 13, might have been much improved in this respect. Older and more mature and experienced teachers are desirable, those who have a greater knowledge of mankind, and see how to

maintain a closer discipline.

The appearance of the School Registers, as a general thing, has not been satisfactory. Five or six are well kept, the rest appear to have been hastily and carelessly filled. The Prudential Committee should always see that this is properly done, before the teacher is paid. The Register should be returned, at once, to the Superintending Committee, after the close of the

Teachers should not be allowed to commence their School. School, till they are duly qualified by certificate according to law.

Sufficient notice of the commencement and close of each school, should be sent to the School Committee. Owing to this neglect and to the absence of Mr. Tenney, one of the Superintending Committee, some of the Schools have not been visited.

Improved text-books and series of Readers, such as recommended by the Board of Education, have been, in many instances introduced, and with great advantage. When any new books are obtained, we hope they will always be those recommended by the Board of Education. Common Schools cannot take their

legitimate rank at once. Their rise must be gradual.

In the efforts of your Committee to elevate the Schools, and make them the fountains of intelligence, upright conduct and practical religion to the whole community, and to prepare all the youth, rich and poor, by a substantial education, together upon the common seats of the Common School-house, to meet each other in after life with strongly formed sympathies, and the happy intercourse of friends and acquaintances, in the efforts of your Committee to accomplish this, they might have urged on more rapidly, towards complete success, if all the citizens of Hanover had come up faithfully to their duty. Then, to you, and to each and every resident of Hanover, not attending School, and who could properly attend to any of these duties, we would propose the following questions: Did you inquire particularly after the condition of your school-house? Did you attend the District School meeting and discuss the subject, and try to have the house comfortable and suitable for the School? Did you attend to the subject town-meeting day, and insist on having a liberal sum raised for the support of Schools? Did you encourage your own children to respectful conduct and studious habits? Did you insist on their regular and punctual attendance at the school? Did you encourage the teacher? Did you encourage the deserving scholars? Did you visit the school? If you have done all this, you have done well; if not, you have left undone, something which might have conferred a great blessing on the community where you live, and been true patriotic service to your country.
